I noticed in the local newspaper that a mining permit for Mr. W. C. Fore is being considered for 115acres in Gulfport, MS located west of the railroad and North of 33rd Street. The excavated material is to be used as fill for a port expansion and the resulting excavation would become a lake and dedicated to the city. I have not seen anything describing what went on at the site other than it was a fertilizer plant. My concern for this project is the possibility of exposing toxic waste during excavation. I cannot, with certainty; tell you that there are toxic wastes products there but I can tell you what went on at the site and perhaps you could address my concerns appropriately. Perhaps the past 50 years have changed the qualities of this property. Although my concerns are health related, I see no reason for the city to have an unusable hole in the ground within the city limits.

The Fertilizer Plant was erected in 1904 and was the first industrial plant in Gulfport. The plant encompassed an area bounded on the south by what would have been 34th Street, on the east by the railroad and on the west by 34th Avenue. The plant was located on the northern portion of this property.

I was born in 1931 and my parents lived on this property for about five years. My father worked for the plant for as bookkeeper. I also worked there in the 1940s while attending High School

My comments refer to the attached photographs. Along the northern edge of the property (A) there were about six homes allocated to black employees permanently employed by the plant. Just south and slightly west was a sulfuric acid plant. This was a large facility. There were about 24 large furnaces (B) that burned sulfurous rocks carried to Gulfport as ballast by sailing ships. Later, when pure sulfur became available, only two furnaces were needed. The sulfur dioxide gas produced by burning the sulfur was collected in lead pipes and conveyed to the adjacent acid production facility (C). This section had a number of large lead tanks about 15 to 20 feet high. All of the pipes, tanks and vats were made of lead. There were craftsmen employed by the company who specialized in welding the soft lead. They were very skilled and repaired the plant as needed. At the time the plant closed it had been making acid for well over forty years.

Then next building south (D) was a large storage shed for machinery and equipment and a steam plant that provided power for the conveyers and hoists.

The next building (E) was the fertilizer production facility. This large building stored bulk phosphate, potash, and sand on the ground. When a batch was to be run, railroad tank cars would bring in ammonia. These ingredients would then be mixed to make the fertilizer. The ammonia smell was very strong during this process. The wet fertilizer mixture was stored on the ground under cover in large piles for curing. The cured fertilizer piles would become very hard and dynamite was used to loosen the mixture for grinding and bagging. The dynamite was kept in case lots in a small shed in the field between the office and the plant. One of my jobs was to dynamite the piles. This required one or two sticks each time. The piles were very hard but cracked well enough so the fertilizer could be moved to the grinder.

The next building (F) was a storage facility for bags of Chili Nitrate also known as ammonia nitrate.

The remaining property, south of the plant, contained an office, some garages, homes for white employees and a cotton gin.

South of the plant's property but not in the tract under consideration was the Gulfport Airport. The airport property was bounded, east and west by the railroad and 34th Avenue and north and south from where 34th Street would have been to about 29th Street. Today, 33rd Street cuts through the old airport property and connects 34th Avenue with 25th Avenue.

I remember that the property west of the plant was always desolate in appearance but I never knew of any specific reasons why this was the case. There were drainage ditches which ran east and west toward 34th Avenue.


I hope this will assist you in making an appropriate decision on the usage of this property.



EPD and Office of Geology staff have identified issues presented during the public hearing on September 30, 2003 to address prior to presenting the request for modification of the Geology surface mining permit and issuance of the individual NPDES wastewater discharge permit. Many of these issues have been addressed satisfactorily; however, there are two issues that require additional study by Department staff and additional information from other state and local agencies.

• Flooding of Brickyard Bayou and surrounding residential and commercial areas: Department staff has reviewed a drainage improvement study completed by an independent engineering firm for the city of Gulfport and compared the information contained in that document to the maximum discharge anticipated from the proposed mining site. Department staff does not anticipate flooding conditions in Brickyard Bayou from the discharge from the proposed mining site.

The city of Gulfport has designated the area south and southeast of the proposed mining area and surrounding Brickyard Bayou as a Special Flood Plain and has enacted ordinances governing the discharge into Brickyard Bayou. This city ordinance requires proposals to discharge into Brickyard Bayou to demonstrate a "no rise" impact to Brickyard Bayou. The Mississippi Emergency Management Agency is currently involved in a \$33 million dollar buy-out of residences impacted by the flooding of Brickyard Bayou. Mr. Al Goodman, State Flood Plain Coordinator for MEMA, intends to meet with the city's Flood Plain Coordinator on Monday, December 1, 2003. Department staff understands that MEMA will request that the city require Mr. Fore to complete a study to ensure no rise conditions related to the proposed discharge prior to granting approval of Mr. Fore's activity.

Environmental Justice:

Department staff is preparing an environmental justice review emphasizing the number of mining sites within residential communities in Harrison County and other counties within the state having similar populations based on 2000 census data for comparison with the racial distribution in the area of study. Additional information to be included in this review are the number of industrial discharges permitted within Harrison County and the location compared to majority non-white communities. This review is not complete nor has internal coordination with the Department's Environmental Justice Coordinator been completed.

• Adequate Notice to Interested Parties: The Department committed, at the public hearing regarding this project, that we would give interested parties adequate notice of the date this matter would be before the Permit Board. Typically, adequate notice has been interpreted as ten working days.

Because of the foregoing, we don't believe the staff can be adequately prepared to present the project to the Permit Board at their January meeting.

Proposed sand mine riles Gulfport residents

GULFPORT — Residents filled the gymnasium at the 28th Street Elementary School in Gulfport on Tuesday to say they don't want sand taken from a nearby property.

W.C. Fore, a local construction contractor, has applied for permits from the state Department of Environmental Quality to mine sand from 49 acres of a 115-acre tract of land he owns off 34th Avenue and 33rd Street.

Fore has an \$18 million contract to expand the State Port at Gulfport, and he wants to mine the property to provide fill for the expansion project. The mining project is scheduled to last three years.

At a City Council meeting in May, Fore proposed to transform the property into a lake with an adjoining park and donate it to the city once the material is excavated.

During Tuesday's public hearing, attended by more than 200, residents spoke against the park proposal and the excavation, saying the project will endanger their children and disrupt their community.

"I would like to say that we do not want this hole, we do not want this death trap," neighborhood resident Mary Wilson said to applause. "You can call it a lake or a pond, but it's a death trap for our children."

Residents expressed concern that the surface mine could cause flooding.

According to plans Fore submitted to the DEQ, the mine would drain an estimated 2 million gallons of wastewater into Brickyard Bayou per day.

Jerry Cain, chief of the environmental permits division for the DEQ, said 2 million gallons is not an overwhelming amount of water for the bayou to handle. The excavation project must be approved by city zoning and planning boards before the state could issue mining and wastewater permits.

Last month, the Zoning Board of Adjustment and Appeals approved the project, but the Planning Commission denied it,

Councilwoman Ella Holmes-Hines said the City Council will hear appeals from Fore and neighbors at its Oct. 20 meeting.

Below are some comments and suggestions:

1. Outfall description is needed on page 2. You told me it was wash water and storm water.

2. BOD_5 , COD and Oil & Grease may be inappropriate parameters. They should not be present and, therefore, an unreasonable expense for the permittee. The BOD_5 , COD and Oil & Grease values may be low, yet the discharge impact receiving waters with high TSS and turbidity.

3. I would recommend adding turbidity monitoring of the discharge and stream at upstream and downstream locations. Limits in accordance with the State Water Quality Standards should be included. If the stream is already impaired for turbidity, stricter limits may be warranted.

4. Since you mentioned the receiving stream is impaired, I would suggest we require a nodischarge operation, if possible. Many mines operate in this manner.

From the Water Quality Management Branch:

25. The Water Quality Management Branch staff has discussed the proposed project as currently presented with the Mobile District Corps of Engineers (COE). Based on this discussion, the COE has confirmed that a Section 404 (Dredge and Fill) permit is not required. Therefore, a Section 401 Water Quality Certification from the Department is not required. However, the Department is concerned about the relationship of your project to the State Port at Gulfport expansion project. The Port project's Section 404 Permit only allows for fill material from an upland source. The Mobile COF has written Mr. John Webb of the Mississippi State Port Authority (and provided you a copy dated July 22, 2003) regarding this issue. The COE advises that if additional wetlands impacts are proposed by the Port expansion, a re-evaluation of the project will be required. This would result in a modification of the COE permit to the State Port, including wetlands mitigation, and therefore, a delay in implementation of the project.

The required process for the issuance of an individual NPDES such as this involves an application review for completeness as well as a review for technical deficiencies in the information provided. The Department has conducted both the completeness and technical review and the comments outlined above are a result of those reviews. Once the application for permit issuance is deemed

The Department of Environmental Quality (Department) Environmental Permits Division (EPD) staff has reviewed your applications for coverage under the Mining Storm Water Discharge National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) General Permit and an individual NPDES permit for the discharge of process wastewater. Additionally, EPD staff has completed a review of your response to a Letter of Deficiency (LOD) issued by the Department on June 26, 2003. EPD has met internally with other Department divisions associated with this project; therefore, the following comments incorporate the regulatory requirements for permit issuance managed by the Environmental Permits Division, the Office of Geology, and the Water Quality Management Branch and represent a full review of the proposed project. The Department does not anticipate issuing any additional letters of deficiency regarding the currently proposed project, unless your response to the issues outlined herein requires further clarification.

The Department is aware of recent conversations between the Mobile District Corps of Engineers (COE) and W. C. Fore Trucking, Inc., regarding the avoidance of the wetlands located within the planned excavation area to address the COE concerns regarding the Port expansion project. Please be aware that any change in the proposed operations or project footprint currently on file with the Department, resulting in a modification of the project currently being considered by the Department for permit issuance, may result in an additional LOD to address the proposed modifications. Furthermore, regardless of whether a COE 404, Dredge and Fill permit is required by the COE, the Department has concerns regarding the protection of the wetlands and secondary adverse impacts to those wetlands on site, which must be adequately addressed prior to completing the permitting process.

Department comments are separated into the distinct office, division or branch from which the issue originated. Your response should be detailed and address every aspect of the offered comment. The comments may be related to completeness of the application or technical aspects of the required information.

Environmental Permits Division:

- 1. EPA Form 1 and Form 2D require the signature of a responsible official. A duly authorized representative signature is not acceptable as established by Chapter 1, Section II.C.1.a of the Mississippi Wastewater Regulations and 40 CFR 122.22(a)(1). Therefore, please complete and have the appropriate responsible official sign the enclosed Form 1 and Form 2D. The responsible official may be the president or vice-president of the company.
- 2. Section VII of EPA Form 1 requires the Standard Industrial Classification (SIC) Codes for the company and facility. Please add SIC code 1442 as a secondary code to represent the mining operation proposed at this location.
- 3. Section VIII of EPA Form 1 requires the name, as it is legally referred to, of the company or firm that operates the proposed facility. Please provide the full business name "W. C. Fore Trucking, Inc." in this section.
- 4. Section XI of EPA Form 1 requires the submittal of a topographic map that includes the following:
 - a. the area extending at least one (1) mile from the property boundary;
 - b. the legal boundaries of the property;
 - c. the boundaries of the mining operation;
 - d. location of the sedimentation/retention basin;
 - e. the process water discharge point to the receiving stream;
 - f. the route the discharged process water will flow from the basin to the discharge point.
- 5. Section I of EPA Form 2D requires the latitude and longitude of the discharge point. If the information provided does not refer to the discharge point from pipe to receiving stream, please provide that latitude and longitude.
- 6. Section III.A of EPA Form 2D requires the expected amount of process water to be discharged from each outfall. The values provided do not appear to include storm water. Please include the expected storm water to be collected and discharged from the basin. If you expect the amount from storm water to be negligible, please indicate that in this section.
- Section III.B of EPA Form 2D requires a line drawing of the facility and proposed operations. This line drawing should include the route taken by water in the proposed facility from intake to discharge. The drawing should also include all sources of wastewater including process/production areas, and storm water run-on/run-off.

The following comments refer to your response of July 7, 2003, to the LOD issued June 26, 2003:

- 8. Based on your response regarding the proposed location of the sedimentation/retention basin and the associated outfall/discharge point, a pipe will be installed from the basin to the receiving stream, an existing ditch located east of the railroad and south of your property. The installation of the pipe appears to involve the burrowing of the pipe under two (2) public roads. Please provide a copy of an authorization for this proposed activity from the City of Gulfport. Furthermore, it appears that this will also impact the railroad and/or the associated right-of-way. Please provide a copy of an authorization from the railroad owner for the proposed activity.
- 9. EPD staff requested that W.C. Fore Trucking acknowledge and accept the required buffer distances from the perennial stream located on this property. As indicated in the LOD issued June 26, 2003, this perennial stream runs first south to north and thence east to west, bisecting your property, including the proposed mining area, as determined by a review of the topographic map for this area. According to your response, the perennial stream runs east to west and is located north of the mining area in its entirety. Please provide a stream mapping report as prepared and certified by an independent consultant, such as a wetlands consultant, that indicates the actual location and flow direction of the perennial stream. Enclosed please find a copy of the topographic map that indicates the location of the stream for your information and review.
- 10. Your response indicated that an 8-inch (8") submersible pump will be utilized to maintain a low fluid level in the mining area so that a track hoe may be utilized for the mining method of operation. Please provide the manufacturer details related to the pump proposed, specifically the pumping rate.
- 11. Based on the scale provided on the survey map, the sedimentation basin does not meet the 150 foot buffer requirement on the southern edge. The measurement is made from the outer edge of the basin to the property line. Please confirm that the basin will be designed/constructed such that the 150-foot buffer requirement will be complied with or provide a letter of authorization for a reduction to the buffer distance from the City of Gulfport.
- 12. A review of the revised Storm Water Pollution Prevention Plan (SWPPP) states: "Storm water shall drain from the site through existing natural watercourses." The SWPPP also states: "The receiving waters will be Brickyard Bayou to the south of the project." Furthermore, you have indicated that all wastewaters will be collected and discharged to Brickyard Bayou. But "existing natural watercourses" will, apparently, flow to Turkey Creek. As indicated in the previous LOD, Turkey Creek is on the 303(d) list as an impaired waterbody. Therefore, the SWPPP should be updated and the management of all storm water originating from disturbed areas modified to address more adequately the prevention of adverse impacts to Turkey Creek.
- 13. The submitted SWPPP does not indicate anticipated storm water flow direction/patterns, storm water control methods, control method implementation schedule specific to the operation of this site, installation methods, and planned location of said control methods. The nature of this site requires the SWPPP to be very specific when addressing these issues. Furthermore, the scaled site map provided does not include the planned control methods or planned locations of the

control methods. Please revise the SWPPP and site map to address these issues. Again, because of the number of environmental concerns at this location, it is necessary that the SWPPP be very specific in addressing storm water control and groundwater flow control.

14. The final receiving stream for the anticipated wastewater is Bernard Bayou. A Total Maximum Daily Load study has been completed for this receiving stream. While the proposed discharge does not, apparently, have an immediate impact to Bernard Bayou, the confluence between Brickyard Bayou and Bernard Bayou may be impacted. Therefore, W.C. Fore Trucking, Inc., may be required to sample the groundwater and analyze the same for certain metals and/or toxics to ensure no further adverse impacts to Bernard Bayou. The Department will endeavor to complete this aspect of the permit review process in the very near future and provide you with guidance related to this possible groundwater sampling and analysis.

The following comments are related to the permit and associated application from the Office of Geology (Geology):

- 15. Geology staff has indicated that the proposed method of operation outlined in the surface mining application (open pit) does not appear to be a manageable operation method for this site because of the depth of the mining operation and the expected level of groundwater. Please address the planned method of operation for the proposed site. An adequate response may be similar to your response to Item #10 above.
- 16. Geology regulations require a 100-foot buffer distance between mining operations and any public road. The buffer zone distance is measured from the property boundary to the outer edge of the road right-of-way. Please confirm that the required buffer distance will be met or provide a letter from the City of Gulfport allowing a reduced buffer distance.
- 17. Geology regulations require a 300-foot buffer distance between the property and all occupied dwellings. An occupied dwelling is a dwelling occupied on a consistent basis by someone other than the permit applicant. Please confirm that the site complies with this criteria and that all dwellings that meet the aforementioned definition are considered.
- 18. Please provide the total acreage to be disturbed or otherwise impacted by the proposed mining operation. This acreage should include, but is not limited to, wastewater control measures, storage areas, stockpile areas, equipment staging areas, excavation areas, sedimentation/retention basin, and all site security measures to be installed. Please be aware that the aforementioned activities cannot be planned within the required buffer zones as established by the Geology Regulations. Please also provide the exact acreage to be mined and/or excavated.
- 19. Please provide an updated reclamation plan. This plan should detail the final planned condition of the excavated areas as well as the surrounding impacted areas. Please ensure that no high-walls are intended for the site and that the maximum slope of the banks and bed of the planned lake/pond is no greater than 3:1.
- 20. Currently, the planting frequency is once/year. Based on the information currently available regarding this proposed site, this frequency appears to be inadequate. Please increase the planting frequency and include a mulching rate during the planting and maintenance of the area. 18002 PER20030001

Furthermore, if W.C. Fore Trucking, Inc., believes that the currently proposed planting frequency is adequate, please provide a narrative explanation that supports the current planting frequency. However, mulching of the site is a necessary activity for the establishment of vegetative cover and must be included in the planting proposal for this site.

- 21. W.C. Fore Trucking, Inc., has indicated that the cost of reclamation for this site is \$300.00 per acre. The Geology Regulations require a minimum bond of \$500.00 per acre. Although W.C. Fore Trucking, Inc., has provided an adequate bond for this mining site above the \$500.00 per acre requirement, please update the cost of reclamation listed to reflect compliance with the established regulations.
- 22. Geology requires the re-submittal of a scaled site map. The site map should include the mining permit boundary (all impacted areas as identified in Item #18 above), the mining/excavation acreage, north direction arrow, and all other pertinent information related to the development of this proposed mining site. The site map submitted should match all other map/drawing submittals to other offices of the Department.
- 23. Please provide a copy of the issued or executed special exceptions and other required City of Gulfport permits.
- 24. Since the original application to Geology for a surface mining permit was submitted, the applicant has made changes in the mining and reclamation plans, the location of the pit, and the acreage affected. Because of these proposed changes, the surface mining permit issued by Geology will have to be presented to the Permit Board for modification and reissuance. Pursuant to the Geology regulations, a modification fee of \$50.00 is required for any modification or reissuance of a surface mining permit.

From the Water Quality Management Branch:

25. The Water Quality Management Branch staff has discussed the proposed project as currently presented with the Mobile District Corps of Engineers (COE). Based on this discussion, the COE has confirmed that a Section 404 (Dredge and Fill) permit is not required. Therefore, a Section 401 Water Quality Certification from the Department is not required. However, the Department is concerned about the relationship of your project to the State Port at Gulfport expansion project. The Port project's Section 404 Permit only allows for fill material from an upland source. The Mobile COE has written Mr. John Webb of the Mississippi State Port Authority (and provided you a copy dated July 22, 2003) regarding this issue. The COE advises that if additional wetlands impacts are proposed by the Port expansion, a re-evaluation of the project will be required. This would result in a modification of the COE permit to the State Port, including wetlands mitigation, and therefore, a delay in implementation of the project.

The required process for the issuance of an individual NPDES such as this involves an application review for completeness as well as a review for technical deficiencies in the information provided. The Department has conducted both the completeness and technical review and the comments outlined above are a result of those reviews. Once the application for permit issuance is deemed

complete and technically correct, a draft permit and permit rationale will be prepared by EPD staff. You will have the opportunity to review this draft permit and rationale. Once your review is complete, the Department will provide the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) with a copy of the proposed permit and rationale. The EPA must accept the draft permit and the requirements therein. The EPA has a minimum of thirty days to review the draft permit. Upon EPA approval of the draft permit, the Department will issue a 30-day Notice of Public Hearing to solicit comments regarding the proposed project and permit from the general public, prior to preparing any recommendation for the Mississippi Environmental Quality Permit Board (Permit Board). All comments received during the public comment period or the public hearing will be considered by Department staff, and modifications made to the draft permit as necessary will be completed, prior to presentation to the Permit Board. Please be aware that mining operations cannot be initiated until all required permits have been issued.

As you have been previously informed, an evidentiary hearing has been requested related to the mining permit issued to W.C. Fore Trucking, Inc. The requested hearing will not be scheduled until the Permit Board has acted on the NPDES application currently under review. Any evidentiary hearings necessary at that time concerning this project then will be consolidated into one formal hearing.

Please be aware that the Department does not intend to present this application for Permit Board consideration until such time as all local government approvals, variances and/or exceptions have been issued.

Billy Warden:

I received this packet of information this morning from the City of Gulfport; this copy is for your files. It documents their efforts to obtain the information they need from W. C. Fore for his Special Exception approval for the proposed surface mine in the city. Included is a map of the proposed route of the port connector road that would pass through part of the site. I first heard about this road in a telephone conversation with Kelvin Jackson of Gulfport last week.

I looked at the site from 34th Avenue and from 33rd Street on Saturday, July 19. The site is wooded, but not thickly, with pine trees up to about 30-40 feet and thick undergrowth. Two access "roads" have been cleared into the site from 33rd Street on the south. I did not go into the site to determine their extent. The area is sparsely developed with industrial buildings and some houses. The building close to the proposed sedimentation ponds at the southeast corner of the site is a trucking company and warehouse.

There is a roadbed cleared through the undeveloped land south of the site that runs three or four blocks north-south. It might be part of Mr. Fore's plan to use this route to the south with the trucks, with a zig-zag to 30th Avenue, which is a designated truck route that runs directly to the west pier of the Port of Gulfport.

Dear Mr. Bellande,

On May 16, 2003, we met to discuss your Map Amendment application. When that meeting ended, I mentioned your sand mining operation on 34th Ave, pointing out to you that the City Council approval of the project was contingent on you securing the required permits. This applies to appropriate local, state, and federal permits. A Special Exception approval is the first step in the approval process for any mining activity.

You were given an application for Special Exception approval with a deadline of June 3, 2003, for the July group of hearings. We discussed your plans to start expeditiously. I am concerned that we did not receive your application. That fact seriously delays your plans. We need this time to review the application and meet the publication deadlines prescribed by the zoning ordinance. The next deadline for the Special Exception approval is rapidly approaching. That date is July 8, 2003.

Since we last met, we have had two other discussions about the application for Special Exception approval; the last one was June 23, 2003. You stated your employer's position. Please keep in mind that the City Council's approval of the project was contingent on you securing the required permits. The required local permits included Special Exception approval and a tree permit. I have enclosed a copy of the chart of permitted uses as well as relevant sections of the Tree Protection section of the City of Gulfport's Code of ordinance.

On June 30, 2003 I talk to Mike Bograd at Mississippi Department of Environmental Quality. Mr. Bograd informed me that you were awarded a DEQ permit for surface mining. He pointed out that your DEQ Permit is contingent on you securing the required permits. I also contacted the Department of Marine resources on that same day and was informed that you only filed a letter of intent. Although the property is located in an Uplands area, three of the five soil types (Ponzer, Plummer, and Atmore) on the site are hydric soils indicative





of wetlands. These soil types force the application of a DMR permit and may force the Army Corps to revisit your approval as well.

If you need any further assistance please contact me at 228-868-5710. Your submittal will assist us in trying to accommodate your case and time table as soon as legally possible.

Thank you for your quick response to my July 2, 2003 letter. When you called on July 7, 2003 you acknowledged that you did not have every thing but wanted turn in as much as possible. Your expression of a willingness to work and obtain all appropriate local, state, and federal required permits was greatly received. I sent via facsimile the section detailing what the ordinance requires for Special Exception approval.

On July 7, 2003, we met to discuss your Special Exception application as you submitted. You gave this office proof of ownership; proof of authority; site plan and payment. In return, you received a copy of you cover sheet with the words "need to turn in supplemental application." You agreed to this quite readily.

This should included:

- We need copies of all appropriate local, state, and federal required permits with their respective conditions on file as called for by the City Council.
- Section VIII (A)(2)(c) requires a site plan, drawn to scale, showing the location and dimensions of existing and proposed structures with supporting open facilities, the ground area to be maintained for the proposed structure or structures.
- Section VIII (B)(2)(b)(4) requirements with close attention being paid to ingress and egress, circulation, and parking to name a few of the requirements. You received this section via facsimile.
- Fencing as we discussed in the context of site security.
- Verification that you contacted and received approval for any roads, drainage, etc. from public works and City Engineering. This along with permits must be accomplished before any work activity begins.

This information submittal will aid you in applying for the various permits you will need.

It is now understood that this Special Exception application <u>solely</u> applies to the Strip Mining activity. The recreation portion of the overall project will be accomplished at a later time through another permit process. This would involve a zoning change and Planning Commission Approval.

The required supplemental application information requested herein must be submitted to this office by July 21, 2003. If this is not met, you will be rescheduled for the September meetings. If you do not meet the deadline for the September Meetings August 5, 2003. You will need to reapply.

B. SCHEDULE OF COMPLIANCE

- 1. The permittee shall achieve compliance with the effluent limitations specified for discharge in accordance with the following schedule:
- a. Upon permit issuance.
- b. Permittee shall implement the submitted Storm Water Pollution Prevention Plan (SWPPP), with the Best Management Practices for the prevention of storm water contamination during development and operation of the mining area and associated buffer zones.
- 2. Within 14 days after either an interim or final date of compliance specified in Part I. B.1., the permittee shall provide the Permit Board with written notice of his compliance or noncompliance with the requirements or conditions specified to be completed by that date.

C. **DEFINITIONS**

- 1. "Monthly average" means the average of "daily discharges" over a calendar month, calculated as the sum of all "daily discharges" measured during a calendar month divided by the number of "daily discharges" measured during the month. The monthly average for fecal coliform bacteria is the geometric mean of "daily discharges" measured during the calendar month. In computing the geometric mean for fecal coliform bacteria, the value one (1) shall be substituted for sample results of zero.
- 2. "Daily discharge" means the "discharge of a pollutant" measured during a calendar day or any 24-hour period that reasonably represents the calendar day for purposes of sampling. For pollutants with limitations expressed in units of mass, the "daily discharge" is calculated as the total mass of the pollutant discharged over the day. For pollutants with limitations expressed in other units of measurements, the "daily average" is calculated as the average measurement of the discharge of the pollutant over the day.
- 3. "Daily maximum" means the highest "daily discharge" over a calendar month.
- 4. "Toxic pollutants" include, but are not limited to: (a) any toxic substance listed in Section 307(a)(1) of the Clean Water Act (CWA), any chemical listed in Section 313(c) of the Superfund Amendments and Reauthorization Act of 1986; and (b) any substance (that is not also a conventional or nonconventional pollutant) for which EPA or the State has published an acute or chronic toxicity criterion.
- 5. "Hazardous substances" are defined in 40 CFR 116.4.



D. MONITORING AND REPORTING

1. Representative Sampling

Samples and measurements taken as required herein shall be representative of the volume and nature of the monitored wastewater.

2. Reporting

a) Monitoring results obtained during the previous month shall be summarized and reported on a Discharge Monitoring Report Form (EPA No. 3320-1) POSTMARKED NO LATER THAN THE 28TH DAY OF THE MONTH FOLLOWING THE COMPLETED REPORTING PERIOD. THE FIRST REPORT IS DUE ON [month day, year] AND REPORTED MONTHLY THEREAFTER. Copies of these, and all other reports required herein, shall be signed in accordance with Chapter One Sections II.C. and II.E. of the Mississippi Wastewater Permit Regulations, and shall be submitted to the Mississippi Environmental Quality Permit Board at the following address.

- b) If the results for a given sample analysis are such that any parameter (other than fecal coliform) is not detected at or above the minimum level for the test method used, a value of zero will be used for that sample in <u>calculating</u> an arithmetic mean value for the parameter. If the resulting calculated arithmetic mean value for that reporting period is zero, the permittee shall <u>report</u> "NODI = B" on the DMR. For fecal coliform, a value of 1.0 shall be used in <u>calculating</u> the geometric mean. If the resulting fecal coliform mean value is 1.0, the permittee shall <u>report</u> "NODI = B" on the DMR. For each quantitative sample value that is not detectable, the test method used and the minimum level for that method for that parameter shall be attached to and submitted with the DMR. The permittee shall then be considered in compliance with the appropriate effluent limitation and/or reporting requirement.
- c) If the permittee monitors any pollutant as prescribed in the permit more frequently than required by the permit using test procedures approved under 40 CFR Part 136 or, in the case of sludge use or disposal, approved under 40 CFR Part 136 unless otherwise specified in 40 CFR Part 503, or as specified in the permit, the results of this monitoring shall be included in the calculation and reporting of the data submitted in the DMR or sludge reporting form specified by the Permit Board.



- d) Calculations for all limitations which require averaging of measurements shall utilize an arithmetic mean unless otherwise specified by the Permit Board in the permit.
- 3. Test Procedures

Test procedures for the analysis of pollutants shall conform to regulations published pursuant to Section 304(h) of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended or alternative procedures approved and/or promulgated by EPA. For those parameters listed in Exhibit D of the Mississippi Wastewater Permit Regulations, the permittee shall use approved methods with minimum quantification levels as sensitive as those found in Exhibit D of the regulations.

4. Recording of Results

For each measurement or sample taken pursuant to the requirements of this permit, the permittee shall maintain records of all information obtained from such monitoring including:

- a) The exact place, date, and time of sampling;
- b) The dates the analyses were performed;
- c) The person(s) who performed the analyses;
- d) The analytical techniques, procedures or methods used; and
- e) The results of all required analyses.
- 5. Records Retention

All records and results of monitoring activities required by this permit, including calibration and maintenance records, shall be retained by the permittee for a minimum of three (3) years, unless otherwise required or extended by the Permit Board, copies of which shall be furnished to the Department upon request.

6. Falsifying Reports

Any permittee who falsifies, tampers with, or knowingly renders inaccurate any monitoring device or method required by the Permit Board to be maintained as a condition in a permit, or who alters or falsifies the results obtained by such devices or methods and/or any written report required by or in response to a permit condition, shall be deemed to have violated a permit condition and shall be subject to the penalties provided for a violation of a permit condition pursuant to Section 49-17-43 of the Code.

- b) Other Noncompliance

The permittee shall report all instances of noncompliance not reported under paragraph (a)., at the time monitoring reports are submitted or within 30 days from the end of the month in which the noncompliance occurs. The reports shall contain the information listed in paragraph (a).

c) Other Information

Where the permittee becomes aware that it failed to submit any relevant facts in a permit application, or submitted incorrect information in a permit application or in any report to the Permit Board, it shall promptly submit such facts or information.

4. Proper Operation, Maintenance and Replacement

The permittee shall at all times properly operate, maintain, and when necessary, promptly replace all facilities and systems of collection, treatment and control (and related appurtenances) which are installed or used by the permittee to achieve compliance with the conditions of this permit. Proper operation and maintenance includes adequate laboratory controls and appropriate quality assurance procedures. Proper replacement includes maintaining an adequate inventory of replacement equipment and parts for prompt replacement when necessary to maintain continuous collection and treatment of wastewater. This provision requires the operation of back-up or auxiliary facilities or similar systems that are installed by a permittee only when the operation is necessary to achieve compliance with the conditions of the permit

5. Duty to Mitigate

The permittee shall take all reasonable steps to minimize or prevent any discharge or sludge use or disposal in violation of the permit that has a reasonable likelihood of adversely affecting human health or the environment.

6. Bypassing

The permittee shall comply with the terms and conditions regarding bypass found in 40 CFR 122.41(m).

7. Upsets

Permittee shall meet the conditions of 40 CFR 122.41(n) regarding "Upsets" and as follows:

- a) Definition. "Upset" means an exceptional incident in which there is unintentional and temporary noncompliance with technology based permit effluent limitations because of factors beyond the reasonable control of the permittee. An upset does not include noncompliance to the extent caused by operational error, improperly designed treatment facilities, inadequate treatment facilities, lack of preventive maintenance, or careless or improper operation.
- b) Effect of an upset. An upset constitutes an affirmative defense to an action brought for noncompliance with such technology based permit effluent limitations if the requirements of paragraph c) of this section are met. Any determination made during administrative review of claims that noncompliance was caused by upset, and before an action for noncompliance, shall not constitute final administrative action subject to judicial review.
- c) Conditions necessary for demonstration of upset. A permittee who wishes to establish the affirmative defense of upset shall demonstrate, through properly signed contemporaneous operating logs, or other relevant evidence that:
 - (1) An upset occurred and that the permittee can identify the cause(s) of the upset;
 - (2) The permitted facility was at the time being properly operated; and
 - (3) The permittee submitted notice of the upset as required in 40 CFR 122.41(L)(6)(ii)(B)(24-hour notice of noncompliance).
 - (4) The permittee complied with any remedial measures required under 40 CFR 122.41(d) (Duty to Mitigate).
- d) Burden of proof. In any enforcement proceeding the permittee seeking to establish the occurrence of an upset has the burden of proof.
- 8. Removed Substances

Solids, sludges, filter backwash, or other residuals removed in the course of treatment or control of wastewater shall be disposed of in a manner such as to prevent such materials from entering State waters and in a manner consistent with the Mississippi Solid Waste Disposal Act, the Federal Resource Conservation and Recovery Act, and the Mississippi Water Pollution Control Act.

9. Power Failures

If electric power is required, in order to maintain compliance with the conditions and prohibitions of the permit, the permittee shall either:

- a) Provide an alternative power source to operate the wastewater control facilities; or, if such alternative power source is not in existence, and no date for its implementation appears in the permit,
- b) Halt, reduce, or otherwise control production and/or all wastewater flows upon reduction, loss, or failure of the primary source of power to the wastewater control facilities.

B. RESPONSIBILITIES

1. Inspection and Entry

The permittee shall allow any authorized Commission representative to enter the permittee's premises at any reasonable time, to have access to and copy any applicable records, to inspect process facilities, treatment works, monitoring methods or equipment or to take samples, as authorized by Section 49-17-21 of the Code. In the event of investigation during an emergency response action, a reasonable time shall be any time of the day or night. Follow-up investigations subsequent to the conclusion of the emergency event shall be conducted at reasonable times.

2. Transfer of Ownership or Control

This permit is not transferable to any person except after proper notice and approval by the Permit Board. In the event of any change in control or ownership of facilities from which the authorized discharges emanate, the permittee shall notify the Mississippi Environmental Quality Permit Board at least thirty (30) days in advance of the proposed transfer date. The notice should include a written agreement between the existing and new permittees containing a specific date for the transfer of permit responsibility, coverage, and liability.

3. Signatory Requirements 40 CFR 122.41(k)

All applications, reports, or information submitted to the Permit Board shall be signed and certified.

- a) All permit applications shall be signed as follows:
 - (1) For a corporation: by a responsible corporate officer. For the purpose of this Section, a responsible corporate officer means: (1) a president, secretary, treasurer or vice president of the corporation in charge of a principal business function, or any other person who performs similar policy or decision-making function for the corporation, or (2) the manager of one or more manufacturing, production, or operating facilities employing more than

250 persons or having gross annual sales or expenditures exceeding 25 million (in second quarter 1980 dollars), if authority to sign documents has been assigned or delegated to the manager in accordance with corporate procedures.

- (2) For a partnership or sole proprietorship: by a general partner or the proprietor, respectively; or
- (3) For a municipality, State, Federal, or other public agency: by either a principal executive officer or ranking elected official.
- b) All reports required by the permit and other information requested by the Permit Board shall be signed by a person described above or by a duly authorized representative of that person. A person is a duly authorized representative only if:
 - (1) The authorization is made in writing by a person described above;
 - (2) The authorization specifies either an individual or a position having responsibility for the overall operation of the regulated facility or activity, such as the position of plant manager, operator of a well or a well field, superintendent, position having overall responsibility for environmental matters for the company. (A duly authorized representative may thus be either a named individual or any individual occupying a named position.); and
 - (3) The written authorization is submitted to the Permit Board.
- c) Changes to authorization. If an authorization under paragraph b) of this section is no longer accurate because a different individual or position has responsibility for the overall operation of the facility, a new authorization satisfying the requirements of paragraph b) of this section must be submitted to the Permit Board prior to or together with any reports, information, or applications.
- d) Certification. Any person signing a document under paragraphs a) or b) of this section shall make the following certification:

"I certify under penalty of law that this document and all attachments were prepared under the direction or supervision in accordance with a system designed to assure that qualified personnel properly gather and evaluate the information submitted. Based on my inquiry of the person or persons who manage the system, or those persons directly responsible for gathering the information, the information submitted is, to the best of my knowledge and belief, true, accurate, and complete. I am aware that there are significant penalties for submitting false information, including the possibility of fine and imprisonment for knowing violations."

4. Availability of Records

Except for data determined to be confidential under the Mississippi Water Pollution Control Law, all reports prepared in accordance with the terms of this permit shall be available for public inspection at the office of the Mississippi Department of Environmental Quality Office of Pollution Control.

5. Duty to Provide Information

The permittee shall furnish to the Permit Board within a reasonable time any relevant information which the Permit Board may request to determine whether cause exists for modifying, revoking and reissuing, or terminating the permit, or to determine compliance with the permit.

6. Toxic Pollutants

The permittee shall comply with any toxic effluent standard or prohibition (including any schedule of compliance specified in such effluent standard or prohibition) established under Section 307(a) of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act.

7. Toxic Pollutants Notification Requirements

The permittee shall comply with the applicable provisions of 40 CFR 122.42.

- 8. Civil and Criminal Liability
 - a) Any person who violates a term, condition or schedule of compliance contained within this permit or the Mississippi Water Pollution Control Law is subject to the actions defined by law.
 - b) Except as provided in permit conditions on "Bypassing" and "Upsets" (Part II. A.6 and 7), nothing in this permit shall be construed to relieve the permittee from civil or criminal penalties for noncompliance.
 - c) It shall not be the defense of the permittee in an enforcement action that it would have been necessary to halt or reduce the permitted activity in order to maintain compliance with the conditions of this permit.
- 9. Oil and Hazardous Substance Liability

Nothing in this permit shall be construed to preclude the institution of any legal action or relieve the permittee from any responsibilities, liabilities, or penalties to which the permittee is or may be subject to under Section 311 of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act and applicable provisions under Mississippi Law pertaining to transportation, storage, treatment, or spillage of oil or hazardous substances.



10. Property Rights

The issuance of this permit does not convey any property rights in either real or personal property, or any exclusive privileges, nor does it authorize any injury to private property or any invasion of personal rights, nor any infringement of Federal, State, or local laws or regulations.

11. Severability

The provisions of this permit are severable. If any provision of this permit, or the application of any provision of this permit to any circumstances, is challenged or held invalid, the validity of the remaining permit provisions and/or portions thereof or their application to other persons or sets of circumstances, shall not be affected thereby.

12. Expiration of Permit

At least 180 days prior to the expiration date of this permit pursuant to the State law and regulation, the permittee who wishes to continue to operate under this permit shall submit an application to the Permit Board for reissuance. The Permit Board may grant permission to submit an application later than this, but no later than the expiration date of the permit.

- 13. Protection of Confidential Information
 - a) Pursuant to Miss. Code Ann. '49-17-39 and 40 CFR 123.41, the Permit Board shall make available to the public all information contained on any form and all public comments on such information. Effluent data and information concerning air or water quality shall also be made available to the public. Information that is determined by the Commission to be trade secrets shall not be disclosed to the public without prior consent of the source of such information. When a claim of confidentiality is made by a person in accordance with the provisions of Miss. Code Ann. '49-17-39, a recommendation on the questions of confidentiality shall be made by the Commission and forwarded to the Regional Administrator (or his/her designee) of EPA for his concurrence in such determination of confidentiality.
 - b) A copy of a State, UIC, or NPDES permit application, public notice, fact sheet, draft permit and other forms relating thereto, including written public comment and other reports, files and information relating to the application not classified as confidential information by the Commission pursuant to Part II. B.13.a), shall be available for public inspection and copying during normal business hours at the office of the Department in Jackson, Mississippi.
 - c) Upon determination by the Commission that information submitted by a permit applicant is entitled to protection against disclosure as trade secrets, the information shall be so labeled and otherwise handled as confidential. Copies of the information and a notice of the Commission's action shall be forwarded to the Regional Administrator (or his/her designee). In making its determination of entitlement to protection as a trade secret, the Commission shall follow the procedure set forth in

Miss. Code Ann. '49-17-39. In the event the Commission denies the claim of confidentiality, the applicant shall have, upon notification thereof, the right to appeal the Commission's determination in the same manner provided for other orders of the Commission. No disclosure, except to EPA, shall be allowed until any appeal from the determination of the Commission is completed.

14. Spill Prevention and Best Management Plans

Any permittee which has above ground bulk storage capacity, of more than 1320 gallons or any single container with a capacity greater than 660 gallons, of materials and/or liquids (including but not limited to, all raw, finished and/or waste material) with chronic or acute potential for pollution impact on waters of the State and not subject to Mississippi Hazardous Waste Management Regulations or 40 CFR 112 (Oil Pollution Prevention) regulations shall provide secondary containment as found in 40 CFR 112 or equivalent protective measures such as trenches or waterways which would conduct any tank releases to a permitted treatment system or sufficient equalization or treatment capacity needed to prevent chronic/acute pollution impact.





Part III.

A. **REOPENER CLAUSE**

This permit shall be modified, or alternately, revoked and reissued, to comply with any applicable effluent standard, limitation or storm water regulation issued or approved under Section 301(b)(2)(C), and (D), 304(b)(2), 307(a)(2) and 402(p) of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act if the effluent standard, limitation or regulation so issued or approved:

- 1. Contains different conditions or is otherwise more stringent than any effluent limitation in the permit; or
- 2. Controls any pollutant not limited in the permit.

B. CLOSURE REQUIREMENTS

Should the permittee decide to permanently close and abandon the premises upon which it operates, it shall provide a Closure Plan to the Permit Board no later than 90 days prior to doing so. This Closure Plan shall address how and when all manufactured products, by-products, raw materials, stored chemicals, and solid and liquid waste and residues will be removed from the premises or permanently disposed of on site such that no potential environmental hazard to the waters of the State will be presented. Closure plan(s) submitted to and approved by Mississippi Department of Environmental Quality for compliance with other environmental regulations will satisfy the closure requirements for those items specifically addressed in the closure plan(s) as long as the closure does not present a potential for environmental hazard to waters of the State.

C. REQUIREMENTS REGARDING COOLING AND BOILER WATER ADDITIVES

Notification shall be made to the permitting authority in writing not later than sixty (60) days prior to initiating the addition of any chemical product to the cooling water and/or boiler water which is subject to discharge, other than those previously approved and/or used. Such notification should include, but not be limited to:

- 1. Name and composition of the proposed additive,
- 2. Proposed discharge concentration,
- 3. Dosage addition rates,
- 4. Frequency of use,
- 5. EPA registration, if applicable, and
- 6. Aquatic species toxicological data.

Written approval must be received from the permitting authority prior to initiating use.

D. OTHER CONDITIONS

- 1. The Permittee shall comply with all other local and federal laws, ordinances, regulations and permit conditions.
- 2. The Permittee shall install security measures as proposed within the submitted application and SWPPP upon initial development of the site.
- 3. The Permittee shall regularly inspect the areas surrounding the discharge point for erosion, sediment accumulation in the ditch and other possible adverse impacts and shall immediately remediate or otherwise repair all impacted areas.
- 4. The Permittee shall maintain and regularly update the approved Storm Water Pollution Prevention Plan (SWPPP) for the site and all associated areas. The permittee shall evaluate the applicability of the SWPPP for each change in operation at the site and all associated areas.
- 5. A buffer zone shall be maintained between the edge of the mining activity and the highest point of the top bank of the stream. The buffer zone widths shall be the same as those set forth in Section IV.C3.a(1), (2) and (3) of Chapter Three of the State of Mississippi Wastewater Regulations. The buffer zone shall not be disturbed by any of the facility's activities.

As several of us discussed in Sandy Baylor's office a short time ago, it was agreed that Urban Development would accept the information your group presented for review and passed it on to the other appropriate City departments for their review and comments. This step was accomplished, and a meeting/telephone conversation was held between appropriate City departments August 26, 2003.

It was agreed by all those involved on August 26, 2003 that a <u>conditional</u> special exception use regarding your strip mining project would be recommended to the Zoning Board and Planning Commission at the special meetings of both boards on September 9, 2003. The Zoning Board will meet at 3:00 P.M. and the Planning Commission will meet at 5:30 >

P.M. I want to again reiterate that this conditional use is being recommended so the State of Mississippi, Department of Environmental Quality can begin their review process which was specifically outlined in their July 30, 2003 letter to Mr. Fore with a copy to the Urban Development Department.

In addition, this Department called DEQ at the request of Ms. Baylor, and asked if a <u>conditional</u> special exception use would be acceptable to begin their process. The answer was that a <u>conditional</u> special exception use would be acceptable, and upon receiving this information from the Zoning Board and Planning Commission, they could begin their process.

Your ability to proceed will be evidenced by your applying for and obtaining a City construction permit through the Building Code Service Division. Until this step is completed, no work of any kind is to begin on this project until the Urban Development Department receives all necessary and approved permits from appropriate State and Federal agencies and you have complied with the following requests from the various City departments a result of our joint review meeting of your information received to date. The joint departments' comments are outlined as follows:

> 1. The proposed location of the highway project which will possibly cut across the southwest corner of your project shall be shown on your site plan as previously requested. Even though this thoroughfare is not completely official at this point, there has been enough field work and various investigations to show that this highway could very possibly be located in this area.

The City does not want to approve any project that could interfere with the Highway Department, City Engineering, Public Works, etc. until this important situation is properly coordinated. Due to this situation, the Planning and Zoning Division will call MDOT and request their comments in letter form. This information will be forwarded to you and others. As you know, the location of a highway in this area would not only affect your pit area but would affect the City's water, sewer and related infrastructure facilities, roadway/right-ofway, drainage conditions, existing homes, etc.

- 2. The City's Engineering Department forwarded a letter to Mr. W. C. Fore on August 5, 2003. This was a very important and technical letter requesting various engineering inputs, drawings, etc. which must be submitted, reviewed and approved by the Engineering Department. A copy of this August 5, 2003 letter to Mr. Fore is enclosed.
- 3. The August 27, 2003 letter to Mr. W. C. Fore from the Building Code Services division within the Urban Development Department is enclosed. This letter outlines the last permit you must obtain before you start your project.
- 4. Also enclosed is a copy of a July 22, 2003 letter to Mr. Webb from Mr. Ronald Krismann, Chief of the Regulatory Branch, Operations Division (COE), requesting coordination between your project and his office. This needs to be addressed unless it has already been accomplished. Two points in this letter specifically states: "If you wish to proceed with the Gulfport borrow pit proposed by Mr. Fore, please advise at the earliest so we can issued a public notice and begin our re-evaluation

Also, be advised that of your DOA permit. additional impacts to wetlands will require mitigation." It further states: appropriate "Pending our evaluation and permit modification, the Gulfport site shall not be used as a source of fill for the port expansion." I am assuming that the proper coordination has been completed regarding this July 22, 2003 letter to Mr. Webb, however, this office has received no further information other than a copy of the enclosed letter as to the Please provide us with your present status. response.

5. Mr. Fore stated during our previous meeting that within the 100 to 150-foot buffer strips around the pit area, a road with a structure and possibly some recreational facilities was being considered for construction within this area. You should check with DEQ or other appropriate agencies to find out whether this type of development can take place within these buffer areas. Also, your site plan shows a 100-foot buffer strip on the 34th Avenue side and a 150-foot buffer along the sediment basins. Please re-check and make sure that all buffer strips, as shown, meet DEQ requirements.

This letter outlines that the review process has taken place, a special meeting was called between City agencies, review comments have been addressed accordingly, a special Zoning Board and Planning Commission meeting has been established for September 9, 2003 as set forth in this letter, and it is the general consensus of all City departments involved that a recommendation will be made for the issuance of a <u>conditional</u> Special Exception Use permit. This will enable the State Department of procedure Environmental Quality to begin their review process as set

forth in their July 30, 2003 letter to Mr. Fore (copy enclosed).

The City wants to thank Mr. W. C. Fore for his quick response and working with Mr. Brion Capo, the City's tree advisor. The tree permit application has been approved.

Reference is made to your DOA permit to expand the State Port at Gulfport, Harrison County, Mississippi.

It has come to our attention that Mr. W. C. Fore proposes to open a borrow pit (Harreld Pit) located in Gulfport to provide fill for the Port's expansion. It appears that wetlands comprise approximately 42 percent of borrow pit property.

Please be advised that the evaluation of your permit to expand the port was based on borrow material being obtained only from "upland sources", that is, <u>no impact to wetlands</u>. The utilization of the new borrow pit proposed by Mr. Fore, or any other borrow pit which impacts wetlands will require additional coordination and evaluation of your DOA permit prior to use.

If you wish to proceed with the Gulfport borrow pit proposed by Mr. Fore, please advise at the earliest so we can issue a public notice and begin our reevaluation of your DOA permit. Also be advised that additional impacts to wetlands will require appropriate mitigation.

Pending our evaluation and permit modification, the Gulfport site shall not be used as a source of fill for the Port expansion.

The Department of Environmental Quality (Department) Environmental Permits Division (EPD) staff has reviewed your applications for coverage under the Mining Storm Water Discharge National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) General Permit and an individual NPDES permit for the discharge of process wastewater. Additionally, EPD staff has completed a review of your response to a Letter of Deficiency (LOD) issued by the Department on June 26, 2003. EPD has met internally with other Department divisions associated with this project; therefore, the following comments incorporate the regulatory requirements for permit issuance managed by the Environmental Permits Division, the Office of Geology, and the Water Quality Management Branch and represent a full review of the proposed project. The Department does not anticipate issuing any additional letters of deficiency regarding the currently proposed project, unless your response to the issues outlined herein requires further clarification.

The Department is aware of recent conversations between the Mobile District Corps of Engineers (COE) and W. C. Fore Trucking, Inc., regarding the avoidance of the wetlands located within the planned excavation area to address the COE concerns regarding the Port expansion project. Please be aware that any change in the proposed operations or project footprint currently on file with the Department, resulting in a modification of the project currently being considered by the Department for permit issuance, may result in an additional LOD to address the proposed modifications. Furthermore, regardless of whether a COE 404, Dredge and Fill permit is required by the COE, the Department has concerns regarding the protection of the wetlands and secondary adverse impacts to those wetlands on site, which must be adequately addressed prior to completing the permitting process.

Department comments are separated into the distinct office, division or branch from which the issue originated. Your response should be detailed and address every aspect of the offered comment. The comments may be related to completeness of the application or technical aspects of the required information.

Environmental Permits Division:

- 1. EPA Form 1 and Form 2D require the signature of a responsible official. A duly authorized representative signature is not acceptable as established by Chapter 1, Section II.C.1.a of the Mississippi Wastewater Regulations and 40 CFR 122.22(a)(1). Therefore, please complete and have the appropriate responsible official sign the enclosed Form 1 and Form 2D. The responsible official may be the president or vice-president of the company.
- 2. Section VII of EPA Form 1 requires the Standard Industrial Classification (SIC) Codes for the company and facility. Please add SIC code 1442 as a secondary code to represent the mining operation proposed at this location.
- 3. Section VIII of EPA Form 1 requires the name, as it is legally referred to, of the company or firm that operates the proposed facility. Please provide the full business name "W. C. Fore Trucking, Inc." in this section.
- 4. Section XI of EPA Form 1 requires the submittal of a topographic map that includes the following:
 - a. the area extending at least one (1) mile from the property boundary;
 - b. the legal boundaries of the property;
 - c. the boundaries of the mining operation;
 - d. location of the sedimentation/retention basin;
 - e. the process water discharge point to the receiving stream;
 - f. the route the discharged process water will flow from the basin to the discharge point.
- 5. Section I of EPA Form 2D requires the latitude and longitude of the discharge point. If the information provided does not refer to the discharge point from pipe to receiving stream, please provide that latitude and longitude.
- 6. Section III.A of EPA Form 2D requires the expected amount of process water to be discharged from each outfall. The values provided do not appear to include storm water. Please include the expected storm water to be collected and discharged from the basin. If you expect the amount from storm water to be negligible, please indicate that in this section.
- 7. Section III.B of EPA Form 2D requires a line drawing of the facility and proposed operations. This line drawing should include the route taken by water in the proposed facility from intake to discharge. The drawing should also include all sources of wastewater including process/production areas, and storm water run-on/run-off.

The following comments refer to your response of July 7, 2003, to the LOD issued June 26, 2003:

- 8. Based on your response regarding the proposed location of the sedimentation/retention basin and the associated outfall/discharge point, a pipe will be installed from the basin to the receiving stream, an existing ditch located east of the railroad and south of your property. The installation of the pipe appears to involve the burrowing of the pipe under two (2) public roads. Please provide a copy of an authorization for this proposed activity from the City of Gulfport. Furthermore, it appears that this will also impact the railroad and/or the associated right-of-way. Please provide a copy of an authorization from the railroad owner for the proposed activity.
- 9. EPD staff requested that W.C. Fore Trucking acknowledge and accept the required buffer distances from the perennial stream located on this property. As indicated in the LOD issued June 26, 2003, this perennial stream runs first south to north and thence east to west, bisecting your property, including the proposed mining area, as determined by a review of the topographic map for this area. According to your response, the perennial stream runs east to west and is located north of the mining area in its entirety. Please provide a stream mapping report as prepared and certified by an independent consultant, such as a wetlands consultant, that indicates the actual location and flow direction of the perennial stream. Enclosed please find a copy of the topographic map that indicates the location of the stream for your information and review.
- 10. Your response indicated that an 8-inch (8") submersible pump will be utilized to maintain a low fluid level in the mining area so that a track hoe may be utilized for the mining method of operation. Please provide the manufacturer details related to the pump proposed, specifically the pumping rate.
- 11. Based on the scale provided on the survey map, the sedimentation basin does not meet the 150 foot buffer requirement on the southern edge. The measurement is made from the outer edge of the basin to the property line. Please confirm that the basin will be designed/constructed such that the 150-foot buffer requirement will be complied with or provide a letter of authorization for a reduction to the buffer distance from the City of Gulfport.
- 12. A review of the revised Storm Water Pollution Prevention Plan (SWPPP) states: "Storm water shall drain from the site through existing natural watercourses." The SWPPP also states: "The receiving waters will be Brickyard Bayou to the south of the project." Furthermore, you have indicated that all wastewaters will be collected and discharged to Brickyard Bayou. But "existing natural watercourses" will, apparently, flow to Turkey Creek. As indicated in the previous LOD, Turkey Creek is on the 303(d) list as an impaired waterbody. Therefore, the SWPPP should be updated and the management of all storm water originating from disturbed areas modified to address more adequately the prevention of adverse impacts to Turkey Creek.
- 13. The submitted SWPPP does not indicate anticipated storm water flow direction/patterns, storm water control methods, control method implementation schedule specific to the operation of this site, installation methods, and planned location of said control methods. The nature of this site requires the SWPPP to be very specific when addressing these issues. Furthermore, the scaled site map provided does not include the planned control methods or planned locations of the

control methods. Please revise the SWPPP and site map to address these issues. Again, because of the number of environmental concerns at this location, it is necessary that the SWPPP be very specific in addressing storm water control and groundwater flow control.

14. The final receiving stream for the anticipated wastewater is Bernard Bayou. A Total Maximum Daily Load study has been completed for this receiving stream. While the proposed discharge does not, apparently, have an immediate impact to Bernard Bayou, the confluence between Brickyard Bayou and Bernard Bayou may be impacted. Therefore, W.C. Fore Trucking, Inc., may be required to sample the groundwater and analyze the same for certain metals and/or toxics to ensure no further adverse impacts to Bernard Bayou. The Department will endeavor to complete this aspect of the permit review process in the very near future and provide you with guidance related to this possible groundwater sampling and analysis.

The following comments are related to the permit and associated application from the Office of Geology (Geology):

- 15. Geology staff has indicated that the proposed method of operation outlined in the surface mining application (open pit) does not appear to be a manageable operation method for this site because of the depth of the mining operation and the expected level of groundwater. Please address the planned method of operation for the proposed site. An adequate response may be similar to your response to Item #10 above.
- 16. Geology regulations require a 100-foot buffer distance between mining operations and any public road. The buffer zone distance is measured from the property boundary to the outer edge of the road right-of-way. Please confirm that the required buffer distance will be met or provide a letter from the City of Gulfport allowing a reduced buffer distance.
- 17. Geology regulations require a 300-foot buffer distance between the property and all occupied dwellings. An occupied dwelling is a dwelling occupied on a consistent basis by someone other than the permit applicant. Please confirm that the site complies with this criteria and that all dwellings that meet the aforementioned definition are considered.
- 18. Please provide the total acreage to be disturbed or otherwise impacted by the proposed mining operation. This acreage should include, but is not limited to, wastewater control measures, storage areas, stockpile areas, equipment staging areas, excavation areas, sedimentation/retention basin, and all site security measures to be installed. Please be aware that the aforementioned activities cannot be planned within the required buffer zones as established by the Geology Regulations. Please also provide the exact acreage to be mined and/or excavated.
- 19. Please provide an updated reclamation plan. This plan should detail the final planned condition of the excavated areas as well as the surrounding impacted areas. Please ensure that no high-walls are intended for the site and that the maximum slope of the banks and bed of the planned lake/pond is no greater than 3:1.
- 20. Currently, the planting frequency is once/year. Based on the information currently available regarding this proposed site, this frequency appears to be inadequate. Please increase the planting frequency and include a mulching rate during the planting and maintenance of the area.

Furthermore, if W.C. Fore Trucking, Inc., believes that the currently proposed planting frequency is adequate, please provide a narrative explanation that supports the current planting frequency. However, mulching of the site is a necessary activity for the establishment of vegetative cover and must be included in the planting proposal for this site.

- 21. W.C. Fore Trucking, Inc., has indicated that the cost of reclamation for this site is \$300.00 per acre. The Geology Regulations require a minimum bond of \$500.00 per acre. Although W.C. Fore Trucking, Inc., has provided an adequate bond for this mining site above the \$500.00 per acre requirement, please update the cost of reclamation listed to reflect compliance with the established regulations.
- 22. Geology requires the re-submittal of a scaled site map. The site map should include the mining permit boundary (all impacted areas as identified in Item #18 above), the mining/excavation acreage, north direction arrow, and all other pertinent information related to the development of this proposed mining site. The site map submitted should match all other map/drawing submittals to other offices of the Department.
- 23. Please provide a copy of the issued or executed special exceptions and other required City of Gulfport permits.
- 24. Since the original application to Geology for a surface mining permit was submitted, the applicant has made changes in the mining and reclamation plans, the location of the pit, and the acreage affected. Because of these proposed changes, the surface mining permit issued by Geology will have to be presented to the Permit Board for modification and reissuance. Pursuant to the Geology regulations, a modification fee of \$50.00 is required for any modification or reissuance of a surface mining permit.

From the Water Quality Management Branch:

25. The Water Quality Management Branch staff has discussed the proposed project as currently presented with the Mobile District Corps of Engineers (COE). Based on this discussion, the COE has confirmed that a Section 404 (Dredge and Fill) permit is not required. Therefore, a Section 401 Water Quality Certification from the Department is not required. However, the Department is concerned about the relationship of your project to the State Port at Gulfport expansion project. The Port project's Section 404 Permit only allows for fill material from an upland source. The Mobile COE has written Mr. John Webb of the Mississippi State Port Authority (and provided you a copy dated July 22, 2003) regarding this issue. The COE advises that if additional wetlands impacts are proposed by the Port expansion, a re-evaluation of the project will be required. This would result in a modification of the COE permit to the State Port, including wetlands mitigation, and therefore, a delay in implementation of the project.

The required process for the issuance of an individual NPDES such as this involves an application review for completeness as well as a review for technical deficiencies in the information provided. The Department has conducted both the completeness and technical review and the comments outlined above are a result of those reviews. Once the application for permit issuance is deemed

complete and technically correct, a draft permit and permit rationale will be prepared by EPD staff. You will have the opportunity to review this draft permit and rationale. Once your review is complete, the Department will provide the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) with a copy of the proposed permit and rationale. The EPA must accept the draft permit and the requirements therein. The EPA has a minimum of thirty days to review the draft permit. Upon EPA approval of the draft permit, the Department will issue a 30-day Notice of Public Hearing to solicit comments regarding the proposed project and permit from the general public, prior to preparing any recommendation for the Mississippi Environmental Quality Permit Board (Permit Board). All comments received during the public comment period or the public hearing will be considered by Department staff, and modifications made to the draft permit as necessary will be completed, prior to presentation to the Permit Board. Please be aware that mining operations cannot be initiated until all required permits have been issued.

As you have been previously informed, an evidentiary hearing has been requested related to the mining permit issued to W.C. Fore Trucking, Inc. The requested hearing will not be scheduled until the Permit Board has acted on the NPDES application currently under review. Any evidentiary hearings necessary at that time concerning this project then will be consolidated into one formal hearing.

Please be aware that the Department does not intend to present this application for Permit Board consideration until such time as all local government approvals, variances and/or exceptions have been issued.

Dear Mr. Fore:

On August 4, 2003 you came by my office to request a letter from the City granting you permission to utilize the existing ditch on the west side of the KCS railroad right-of-way as an outfall for the effluent from your sedimentation basin/detention pond. According to the Clifford Crosby survey dated June 3, 2003, the location of this discharge point is noted as "OUTFALL" on the drawing, and is located in an apparent City easement, at the southeast corner of Parcel "C". You provided me with a copy of the Clifford Crosby survey.

You stated that you planned to pipe the entirety of the outfall from the sedimentation basin to the outfall ditch, and that W.C. Fore Trucking, Inc., would be the owner of this line and therefore responsible for all operation and maintenance.

Your request is approved, contingent on the following understandings, terms and conditions:

- 1. All effluent from your outfall must meet all requirements of your Stormwater Pollution Prevention Plan, and must be in conformance with all water quality requirements of the City ordinances and the Mississippi Department of Environmental Quality.
- 2. W. C. Fore Trucking, Inc. will be the owner of the outfall line in its entirety, from the sedimentation basin north of 33rd Street to its discharge, and will be responsible for all operation and maintenance of the outfall line.
- 3. Engineering drawings showing all proposed work in City easements and public rights-of-way must be submitted for approval by the Engineering Department and

Public Works Department prior to beginning construction. These drawings should be prepared by a Registered Professional Engineer and should show all relevant data, including but not limited to grades, elevations, topographic features, existing utilities, erosion control methods, pavement repair materials and specifications for all work.

- 4. For work within the City right-of-way, only reinforced concrete pipe is permitted. For the discharge point at the KCS railroad ditch, permanent erosion control must be provided.
- 5. Any improvements to the existing City storm drainage required as a result of the proposed outfall discharge will be done by W.C. Fore Trucking, Inc. at its cost. The engineer for W. C. Fore Trucking shall provide to the City the estimated flow volumes at the discharge point.

6. Following the completion of the work, W. C. Fore Trucking will submit as-built record drawings to the Engineering Department.

The purpose of this letter is solely to provide approval in principle of the proposed discharge to the City storm drainage system. Approval to construct will be granted only after all of the above requirements have been met. Failure to comply with the terms and conditions of this letter, including all reasonable requirements of the City, will result in the invalidation of this contingent approval.

RENTAL AGREEMENT FOR USE OF SCHOOL FACILITIES

TERMS AND CONDITIONS

The Gulfport School District shall grant non-school use of school buildings/facilities to civic groups or organizations according to prescribed school board policy. The following policy is set forth by the Board of Irustees:

- School facilities may be used only when they are not needed for instructional or I. – school related activities.
- II. School facilities may be used by the public in accordance with Board policy, local codes, state and federal laws.

III. Any individual group or organization using school facilities shall protect, defend, indemnify and hold the Gulfport School District, its governing board and all district officers and employees free and harmless from any loss, damage, liabilities, cost or expense that may arise during or be caused in any way by such use or occupancy of school property. The Gulfport School District in its sole discretion, may require such group or organization to furnish proof of liability insurance and/or other evidences of its financial ability to satisfy this requirement.

- IV. Person(s) renting buildings or facilities shall be responsible for the protection of school property and/or the welfare/safety and security of person(s) using the school facility. Included in these responsibilities are the following:
 - A. Behavior and conduct of person(s) in attendance;

 - B. Enforcement of "No Smoking" policy;
 C. Prohibiting the possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages;
 - D. Prohibiting the consumption of food or beverage in auditoriums;
 - E. Prohibiting the use or possession of drugs; and,
 - F. Prohibiting the possession of weapons or explosive materials and/or devices.
- V. No group or organization may sublet the use of building or facilities to any other group or organization.
- VI. Any time a group or organization outside the school district is renting/leasing buildings or facilities, a paid school district employee must be on site to open, close and assist in cleaning and maintaining building/facility security.
- VII. A rental fee must be paid to the principal prior to facility use (see rental schedule). The rental fee is based on the following:
 - A. Payment of school personnel for opening and closing of school facilities.
 - B. Payment of custodial services required.
 - C. Payment for utilities (electricity, gas, and water) required.

Pursuant to your request, and based on our conversation yesterday, this letter contains additional information still needed by this office in order to properly review everything and pass it on to the other City response agencies, such as, Engineering, Public Works, etc.

Depending on when you can return this material, it is possible that a conditional special exception use could be considered by the Zoning Board and Planning Commission at specially called meetings. Once the Planning Division receives all of the aforementioned requested materials and this information is passed on to the response agencies (Engineering, Public Works, etc.), the Planning Division will submit their findings to both the Zoning Board and Planning Commission. Our response agencies may request more technical documents after reviewing the items currently requested. Whatever the recommendation will be from the Planning Division regarding the special exception use, the Planning Commission and Zoning Board will make the final decision.

If these Boards grant a conditional use, it shall be expressly understood that no work of any kind is to begin on this project until all necessary permits are approved by the appropriate local, state and federal agencies. Upon the Planning Division





receiving all permits and our requested material, the conditions will be met and the project can proceed ahead.

The reason the Planning Division could not complete its review of your project is all the material that was requested was never submitted to the Planning Division. The items that are still needed based on my past letters (which are enclosed), and current discussions, include:

- 1. A current project site plan (same as submitted to other agencies) is needed, if it differs from what has been submitted.
- 2. Only the cover sheet of the permit was submitted. We need the rest of the permit and related documents, as indicated in the letter to you dated August 4, 2003.
- 3. The current site plan does not show the proposed pit area in relationship to the proposed possible highway location. This is needed.
- 4. The utility crossing which you are proposing under 33rd Street should be shown in detail.
- Submit the most recent information requested from D.E.Q., which outlines 25<u>+</u> items you must accomplish in order to meet different criteria from state and/or federal agencies.
- Show "supporting open facilities" in letter dated July 9, 2003. This includes drainage and/or swales, which are not shown.
- 7. Show detailed parking arrangements on site plan.
- 8. All buffers should comply with D.E.Q. requirements.
- 9. A tree permit application has not been submitted.

Since you cannot meet the Zoning Board and/or Planning Commission meetings in August, either a special meeting for both Boards may be considered for September or, you can be placed on the regularly scheduled September meeting dates which are September 18th for the Zoning Board and September





25th for the Planning Commission. This situation depends on when you return the requested information.

Even though the City Council has given their approval for the project, it was with the understanding that all needed permits would be secured by you from the necessary agencies and that the appropriate City departments would review the material.

The Urban Development Department is doing everything possible to assist you based on the enclosed letters that you have received from me. If you have any questions, please contact our office and we will meet at your convenience.

Dear Mr. Bellande,

On May 16, 2003, we met to discuss your Map Amendment application. When that meeting ended, I mentioned your sand mining operation on 34th Ave, pointing out to you that the City Council approval of the project was contingent on you securing the required permits. This applies to appropriate local, state, and federal permits. A Special Exception approval is the first step in the approval process for any mining activity.

You were given an application for Special Exception approval with a deadline of June 3, 2003, for the July group of hearings. We discussed your plans to start expeditiously. I am concerned that we did not receive your application. That fact seriously delays your plans. We need this time to review the application and meet the publication deadlines prescribed by the zoning ordinance. The next deadline for the Special Exception approval is rapidly approaching. That date is July 8, 2003.

Since we last met, we have had two other discussions about the application for Special Exception approval; the last one was June 23, 2003. You stated your employer's position. Please keep in mind that the City Council's approval of the project was contingent on you securing the required permits. The required local permits included Special Exception approval and a tree permit. I have enclosed a copy of the chart of permitted uses as well as relevant sections of the Tree Protection section of the City of Gulfport's Code of ordinance.

On June 30, 2003 I talk to Mike Bograd at Mississippi Department of Environmental Quality. Mr. Bograd informed me that you were awarded a DEQ permit for surface mining. He pointed out that your DEQ Permit is contingent on you securing the required permits. I also contacted the Department of Marine resources on that same day and was informed that you only filed a letter of intent. Although the property is located in an Uplands area, three of the five soil types (Ponzer, Plummer, and Atmore) on the site are hydric soils indicative of wetlands. These soil types force the application of a DMR permit and may force the Army Corps to revisit your approval as well.

If you need any further assistance please contact me at 228-868-5710. Your submittal will assist us in trying to accommodate your case and time table as soon as legally possible.

Thank you for your quick response to my July 2, 2003 letter. When you called on July 7, 2003 you acknowledged that you did not have every thing but wanted turn in as much as possible. Your expression of a willingness to work and obtain all appropriate local, state, and federal required permits was greatly received. I sent via facsimile the section detailing what the ordinance requires for Special Exception approval.

On July 7, 2003, we met to discuss your Special Exception application as you submitted. You gave this office proof of ownership; proof of authority; site plan and payment. In return, you received a copy of you cover sheet with the words "need to turn in supplemental application." You agreed to this quite readily.

This should included:

- We need copies of all appropriate local, state, and federal required permits with their respective conditions on file as called for by the City Council.
- Section VIII (A)(2)(c) requires a site plan, drawn to scale, showing the location and dimensions of existing and proposed structures with supporting open facilities, the ground area to be maintained for the proposed structure or structures.
- Section VIII (B)(2)(b)(4) requirements with close attention being paid to ingress and egress, circulation, and parking to name a few of the requirements. You received this section via facsimile.
- Fencing as we discussed in the context of site security.
- Verification that you contacted and received approval for any roads, drainage, etc. from public works and City Engineering. This along with permits must be accomplished before any work activity begins.

This information submittal will aid you in applying for the various permits you will need.

It is now understood that this Special Exception application <u>solely</u> applies to the Strip Mining activity. The recreation portion of the overall project will be accomplished at a later time through another permit process. This would involve a zoning change and Planning Commission Approval.

The required supplemental application information requested herein must be submitted to this office by July 21, 2003. If this is not met, you will be rescheduled for the September meetings. If you do not meet the deadline for the September Meetings August 5, 2003. You will need to reapply.

The Department of Environmental Quality (Department) Environmental Permits Division (EPD) staff has reviewed your applications for coverage under the Mining Storm Water Discharge National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) General Permit and an individual NPDES permit for the discharge of process wastewater. Additionally, EPD staff has completed a review of your response to a Letter of Deficiency (LOD) issued by the Department on June 26, 2003. EPD has met internally with other Department divisions associated with this project; therefore, the following comments incorporate the regulatory requirements for permit issuance managed by the Environmental Permits Division, the Office of Geology, and the Water Quality Management Branch and represent a full review of the proposed project. The Department does not anticipate issuing any additional letters of deficiency regarding the currently proposed project, unless your response to the issues outlined herein requires further clarification.

The Department is aware of recent conversations between the Mobile District Corps of Engineers (COE) and W. C. Fore Trucking, Inc., regarding the avoidance of the wetlands located within the planned excavation area to address the COE concerns regarding the Port expansion project. Please be aware that any change in the proposed operations or project footprint currently on file with the Department, resulting in a modification of the project currently being considered by the Department for permit issuance, may result in an additional LOD to address the proposed modifications. Furthermore, regardless of whether a COE 404, Dredge and Fill permit is required by the COE, the Department has concerns regarding the protection of the wetlands and secondary adverse impacts to those wetlands on site, which must be adequately addressed prior to completing the permitting process.

Department comments are separated into the distinct office, division or branch from which the issue originated. Your response should be detailed and address every aspect of the offered comment. The comments may be related to completeness of the application or technical aspects of the required information.

Environmental Permits Division:

- 1. EPA Form 1 and Form 2D require the signature of a responsible official. A duly authorized representative signature is not acceptable as established by Chapter 1, Section II.C.1.a of the Mississippi Wastewater Regulations and 40 CFR 122.22(a)(1). Therefore, please complete and have the appropriate responsible official sign the enclosed Form 1 and Form 2D. The responsible official may be the president or vice-president of the company.
- 2. Section VII of EPA Form 1 requires the Standard Industrial Classification (SIC) Codes for the company and facility. Please add SIC code 1442 as a secondary code to represent the mining operation proposed at this location.
- 3. Section VIII of EPA Form 1 requires the name, as it is legally referred to, of the company or firm that operates the proposed facility. Please provide the full business name "W. C. Fore Trucking, Inc." in this section.
- 4. Section XI of EPA Form 1 requires the submittal of a topographic map that includes the following:
 - a. the area extending at least one (1) mile from the property boundary;
 - b. the legal boundaries of the property;
 - c. the boundaries of the mining operation;
 - d. location of the sedimentation/retention basin;
 - e. the process water discharge point to the receiving stream;
 - f. the route the discharged process water will flow from the basin to the discharge point.
- 5. Section I of EPA Form 2D requires the latitude and longitude of the discharge point. If the information provided does not refer to the discharge point from pipe to receiving stream, please provide that latitude and longitude.
- 6. Section III.A of EPA Form 2D requires the expected amount of process water to be discharged from each outfall. The values provided do not appear to include storm water. Please include the expected storm water to be collected and discharged from the basin. If you expect the amount from storm water to be negligible, please indicate that in this section.
- Section III.B of EPA Form 2D requires a line drawing of the facility and proposed operations. This line drawing should include the route taken by water in the proposed facility from intake to discharge. The drawing should also include all sources of wastewater including process/production areas, and storm water run-on/run-off.

The following comments refer to your response of July 7, 2003, to the LOD issued June 26, 2003:

- 8. Based on your response regarding the proposed location of the sedimentation/retention basin and the associated outfall/discharge point, a pipe will be installed from the basin to the receiving stream, an existing ditch located east of the railroad and south of your property. The installation of the pipe appears to involve the burrowing of the pipe under two (2) public roads. Please provide a copy of an authorization for this proposed activity from the City of Gulfport. Furthermore, it appears that this will also impact the railroad and/or the associated right-of-way. Please provide a copy of an authorization from the railroad owner for the proposed activity.
- 9. EPD staff requested that W.C. Fore Trucking acknowledge and accept the required buffer distances from the perennial stream located on this property. As indicated in the LOD issued June 26, 2003, this perennial stream runs first south to north and thence east to west, bisecting your property, including the proposed mining area, as determined by a review of the topographic map for this area. According to your response, the perennial stream runs east to west and is located north of the mining area in its entirety. Please provide a stream mapping report as prepared and certified by an independent consultant, such as a wetlands consultant, that indicates the actual location and flow direction of the perennial stream. Enclosed please find a copy of the topographic map that indicates the location of the stream for your information and review.
- 10. Your response indicated that an 8-inch (8") submersible pump will be utilized to maintain a low fluid level in the mining area so that a track hoe may be utilized for the mining method of operation. Please provide the manufacturer details related to the pump proposed, specifically the pumping rate.
- 11. Based on the scale provided on the survey map, the sedimentation basin does not meet the 150 foot buffer requirement on the southern edge. The measurement is made from the outer edge of the basin to the property line. Please confirm that the basin will be designed/constructed such that the 150-foot buffer requirement will be complied with or provide a letter of authorization for a reduction to the buffer distance from the City of Gulfport.
- 12. A review of the revised Storm Water Pollution Prevention Plan (SWPPP) states: "Storm water shall drain from the site through existing natural watercourses." The SWPPP also states: "The receiving waters will be Brickyard Bayou to the south of the project." Furthermore, you have indicated that all wastewaters will be collected and discharged to Brickyard Bayou. But "existing natural watercourses" will, apparently, flow to Turkey Creek. As indicated in the previous LOD, Turkey Creek is on the 303(d) list as an impaired waterbody. Therefore, the SWPPP should be updated and the management of all storm water originating from disturbed areas modified to address more adequately the prevention of adverse impacts to Turkey Creek.
- 13. The submitted SWPPP does not indicate anticipated storm water flow direction/patterns, storm water control methods, control method implementation schedule specific to the operation of this site, installation methods, and planned location of said control methods. The nature of this site requires the SWPPP to be very specific when addressing these issues. Furthermore, the scaled site map provided does not include the planned control methods or planned locations of the

control methods. Please revise the SWPPP and site map to address these issues. Again, because of the number of environmental concerns at this location, it is necessary that the SWPPP be very specific in addressing storm water control and groundwater flow control.

14. The final receiving stream for the anticipated wastewater is Bernard Bayou. A Total Maximum Daily Load study has been completed for this receiving stream. While the proposed discharge does not, apparently, have an immediate impact to Bernard Bayou, the confluence between Brickyard Bayou and Bernard Bayou may be impacted. Therefore, W.C. Fore Trucking, Inc., may be required to sample the groundwater and analyze the same for certain metals and/or toxics to ensure no further adverse impacts to Bernard Bayou. The Department will endeavor to complete this aspect of the permit review process in the very near future and provide you with guidance related to this possible groundwater sampling and analysis.

The following comments are related to the permit and associated application from the Office of Geology (Geology):

- 15. Geology staff has indicated that the proposed method of operation outlined in the surface mining application (open pit) does not appear to be a manageable operation method for this site because of the depth of the mining operation and the expected level of groundwater. Please address the planned method of operation for the proposed site. An adequate response may be similar to your response to Item #10 above.
- 16. Geology regulations require a 100-foot buffer distance between mining operations and any public road. The buffer zone distance is measured from the property boundary to the outer edge of the road right-of-way. Please confirm that the required buffer distance will be met or provide a letter from the City of Gulfport allowing a reduced buffer distance.
- 17. Geology regulations require a 300-foot buffer distance between the property and all occupied dwellings. An occupied dwelling is a dwelling occupied on a consistent basis by someone other than the permit applicant. Please confirm that the site complies with this criteria and that all dwellings that meet the aforementioned definition are considered.
- 18. Please provide the total acreage to be disturbed or otherwise impacted by the proposed mining operation. This acreage should include, but is not limited to, wastewater control measures, storage areas, stockpile areas, equipment staging areas, excavation areas, sedimentation/retention basin, and all site security measures to be installed. Please be aware that the aforementioned activities cannot be planned within the required buffer zones as established by the Geology Regulations. Please also provide the exact acreage to be mined and/or excavated.
- 19. Please provide an updated reclamation plan. This plan should detail the final planned condition of the excavated areas as well as the surrounding impacted areas. Please ensure that no high-walls are intended for the site and that the maximum slope of the banks and bed of the planned lake/pond is no greater than 3:1.
- 20. Currently, the planting frequency is once/year. Based on the information currently available regarding this proposed site, this frequency appears to be inadequate. Please increase the planting frequency and include a mulching rate during the planting and maintenance of the area.

Furthermore, if W.C. Fore Trucking, Inc., believes that the currently proposed planting frequency is adequate, please provide a narrative explanation that supports the current planting frequency. However, mulching of the site is a necessary activity for the establishment of vegetative cover and must be included in the planting proposal for this site.


- 21. W.C. Fore Trucking, Inc., has indicated that the cost of reclamation for this site is \$300.00 per acre. The Geology Regulations require a minimum bond of \$500.00 per acre. Although W.C. Fore Trucking, Inc., has provided an adequate bond for this mining site above the \$500.00 per acre requirement, please update the cost of reclamation listed to reflect compliance with the established regulations.
- 22. Geology requires the re-submittal of a scaled site map. The site map should include the mining permit boundary (all impacted areas as identified in Item #18 above), the mining/excavation acreage, north direction arrow, and all other pertinent information related to the development of this proposed mining site. The site map submitted should match all other map/drawing submittals to other offices of the Department.
- 23. Please provide a copy of the issued or executed special exceptions and other required City of Gulfport permits.
- 24. Since the original application to Geology for a surface mining permit was submitted, the applicant has made changes in the mining and reclamation plans, the location of the pit, and the acreage affected. Because of these proposed changes, the surface mining permit issued by Geology will have to be presented to the Permit Board for modification and reissuance. Pursuant to the Geology regulations, a modification fee of \$50.00 is required for any modification or reissuance of a surface mining permit.

From the Water Quality Management Branch:

25. The Water Quality Management Branch staff has discussed the proposed project as currently presented with the Mobile District Corps of Engineers (COE). Based on this discussion, the COE has confirmed that a Section 404 (Dredge and Fill) permit is not required. Therefore, a Section 401 Water Quality Certification from the Department is not required. However, the Department is concerned about the relationship of your project to the State Port at Gulfport expansion project. The Port project's Section 404 Permit only allows for fill material from an upland source. The Mobile COE has written Mr. John Webb of the Mississippi State Port Authority (and provided you a copy dated July 22, 2003) regarding this issue. The COE advises that if additional wetlands impacts are proposed by the Port expansion, a re-evaluation of the project will be required. This would result in a modification of the COE permit to the State Port, including wetlands mitigation, and therefore, a delay in implementation of the project.

The required process for the issuance of an individual NPDES such as this involves an application review for completeness as well as a review for technical deficiencies in the information provided. The Department has conducted both the completeness and technical review and the comments outlined above are a result of those reviews. Once the application for permit issuance is deemed

As you have been previously informed, an evidentiary hearing has been requested related to the mining permit issued to W.C. Fore Trucking, Inc. The requested hearing will not be scheduled until the Permit Board has acted on the NPDES application currently under review. Any evidentiary hearings necessary at that time concerning this project then will be consolidated into one formal hearing.

Please be aware that the Department does not intend to present this application for Permit Board consideration until such time as all local government approvals, variances and/or exceptions have been issued.

Pursuant to your letter of July 30,2003 regarding our Notice of Intent application and our revised package transmitted to Mr. Billy Warden on July 11, 2003 and page revisions sent to Mr. Ross Williams on July 14, 2003, members of your staff, you for the above captioned permit the following is offered to correct revise our NOI, EPA Form 1, EPA Form 2D and the obligatory drawing submittals that are required by regulations.

To avoid confusion, we are submitting a completely new EPA forms 1 and 2D. These forms have been corrected in accordance with the comments in your aforementioned letter.

In your letter you make reference to the Corps of Engineers, Mobile District and the project that we have at the State Port at Gulfport. Their requirement that all fill materials for this project shall come from an uplands source shall not be compromised. All wetlands excavated materials, mined according to the requirements set forth in the Tullock Rule and stockpiled on-site for other uses or moved to an uplands disposal area.

To address your specific concerns the following is offered:

Paragraphs 1 through 7 (inclusive) shall be addressed/corrected in the new EPA forms 1 and 2D and associated drawings, data sheets and attached correspondence.

Paragraph 8 addresses the mining pit and the outfall. The 24" diameter outfall to the receiving ditch affects only one public road. A City of Gulfport Drainage Easement abuts the east property line of Parcel C. This is west of the railroad right of way(row) and in no way affects railroad property. The outfall line and its terminus is depicted on the enclosed. Also attached for you information and use is a copy of Mr. William Powell's authorization letter dated August 5, 2003. Mr Powell is the Director of Engineering for the City of Gulfport.

Paragraph 9: We have attached a copy of a letter from Mr. Patrick Chubb, Senor Biologist with Covington and Associates, our wetlands consultant, regarding the perennial stream issue.

We acknowledge the buffer zone requirement and locate a perennial stream bisecting the property t the most northern end of the property north of the mining area.

Paragraph 10 Attached is a copy of the pump data and the pump curves for the 8" centrifugal pump we intend to use to maintain the water level in the mining area.

Prior to commencement of any construction or mining activity silt fence shall be placed, erosion checks and other erosion control devices shall be installed and maintained along with the installation of the safety fence.

The surface mining pit shall be constructed in three phases. Each phase shall be approximately 400 feet in the south to north direction. Each phase will consist of the following activities:

- a. Clearing and stripping
- b. Construct containment levee
- c. Mining
- d. Groundwater/stormwater control
- f. Erosion control

While Phase One is being constructed, Phases Two and Three will remain in its natural, undisturbed state. Drainage from these undisturbed areas will follow its natural watercourse Subsequent phases of construction and mining shall be accomplished by the same method.

In the undeveloped state, for the most part, all storm water drains to the north of the property or to perimeter ditches paralleling 33rd Street to the south and 34th Avenue on the west. Ultimately this stormwater flow is in a northerly direction with the receiving stream being Turkey Creek.

With each phase of work, more of the stormwater will be redirected to the south, with the receiving body of water being Bayou Bernard.

The sedimentation basin site is located at the southeast corner of the mining permit area. The sedimentation basin has been configured to comply with the 150-foot buffer zone requirements at each property line. The sedimentation basin is divided into two ponds, Pond 1 and Pond 2. A treated timber baffle will divide Ponds 1 and 2. The installation of this baffle will allow more suspended particles to precipitate out allowing a cleaner discharge to the outfall from Pond 2. To preclude extensive silt buildup in Pond 1, monitoring activities shall be performed on a regular basis. Pond 2 shall be monitored at the same time as the Pond 1 activities. The outfall from Pond 2 shall be 24" diameter HDPE pipe. Any crossing of City of Gulfport property, rights of way etc require the use of reinforced concrete drainage pipe.

Paragraph 11: The proposed sedimentation basin will be so constructed to meet the criteria of a 150-foot buffer zone. This is reflected in the attached drawings.

Paragraph 12: This is addressed by Mr. Chubb's letter referenced in paragraph nine above.

Paragraph 13: Based upon observations made during and after severe weather conditions in the area we have determined the stormwater flow patterns. These flow patterns are depicted on the attached drawings.

The entire mining site shall be encompassed with silt fence and erosion checks as necessary.

Locations of the silt fencing and the erosion checks are noted on the attached plans.

Paragraph 15: See response for paragraph 10 above,

Paragraph 16: Our attached referenced drawings indicate the required 100-foot buffer zone and this zone will be maintained.

Paragraph 17: Our attached referenced drawings indicate the required 300-foot buffer zone and occupied dwellings requirement. This buffer zone shall be maintained.

Paragraph 18: Total acreage disturbed	:
Mining Area	48.3127 acres
Sedimentation Basin	0.2689
Access Road	0.0689
Total	49.2669 acres

Paragraph 19: Revised Reclamation Plan dated August 5, 2003 provided.

Paragraph 20: As stated in our SWPPP disturbed areas shall be mulched and seeded as incidents occur. Maintenance seeding and mulching will be ongoing on a as needed basis.

Paragraph 21 The reclamation cost per acre of \$300.00 per acre is increased to \$500.00 per acre.

Paragraph 22: A scaled site map is submitted with this letter.

Paragraph 23: The City of Gulfport Planning Commission meets again August 28, 2003. This is the earliest meeting that we could get on the agenda. Upon approval of the Special Exception, a copy will be forwarded to you.

Paragraph 25: This item is addressed in at the opening of this letter .:







On August 4, 2003 you came by my office to request a letter from the City granting you permission to utilize the existing ditch on the west side of the KCS railroad right-of-way as an outfall for the effluent from your sedimentation basin/detention pond. According to the Clifford Crosby survey dated June 3, 2003, the location of this discharge point is noted as "OUTFALL" on the drawing, and is located in an apparent City easement, at the southeast corner of Parcel "C". You provided me with a copy of the Clifford Crosby survey.

You stated that you planned to pipe the entirety of the outfall from the sedimentation basin to the outfall ditch, and that W.C. Fore Trucking, Inc., would be the owner of this line and therefore responsible for all operation and maintenance.

Your request is approved, contingent on the following understandings, terms and conditions:

- 1. All effluent from your outfall must meet all requirements of your Stormwater Pollution Prevention Plan, and must be in conformance with all water quality requirements of the City ordinances and the Mississippi Department of Environmental Quality.
- 2. W. C. Fore Trucking, Inc. will be the owner of the outfall line in its entirety, from the sedimentation basin north of 33rd Street to its discharge, and will be responsible for all operation and maintenance of the outfall line.
- 3. Engineering drawings showing all proposed work in City easements and public rights-of-way must be submitted for approval by the Engineering Department and

These drawings should be prepared by a Registered Professional Engineer and should show all relevant data, including but not limited to grades, elevations, topographic features, existing utilities, erosion control methods, pavement repair materials and specifications for all work.

- 4. For work within the City right-of-way, only reinforced concrete pipe is permitted. For the discharge point at the KCS railroad ditch, permanent erosion control must be provided.
- 5. Any improvements to the existing City storm drainage required as a result of the proposed outfall discharge will be done by W.C. Fore Trucking, Inc. at its cost. The engineer for W. C. Fore Trucking shall provide to the City the estimated flow volumes at the discharge point.

6. Following the completion of the work, W. C. Fore Trucking will submit as-built record drawings to the Engineering Department.

The purpose of this letter is solely to provide approval in principle of the proposed discharge to the City storm drainage system. Approval to construct will be granted only after all of the above requirements have been met. Failure to comply with the terms and conditions of this letter, including all reasonable requirements of the City, will result in the invalidation of this contingent approval.

Please accept this response relative to Items Number 9 and 12 referenced in a letter dated July 30, 2003 from your office to Mr. Fore. W.C. Fore Trucking Inc. retained Covington Associates Corporation (CAC) as a wetland consultant for the proposed project in April 2003. CAC conducted the assessment and provided subsequent permitting assistance relative to wetlands.

Response to Item 9:

Based on our field investigations of the proposed site, along with other adjacent projects that CAC has been involved with in the past, I am inclined to disagree with the illustration provided on the USGS – Gulfport North Quadrangle (7.5 Minute Series) dated 1994. The "blue line" in question, running in a north-south orientation along the eastern property boundary cannot be classified as a "perennial stream". Historically, this may have been a straight-line ditch. In current times, there is a ditch running in this general area, however, it does not extend as far south as illustrated.

I have had communications with Mr. Frank Hubiak, US Army Corps of Engineers, regarding this issue. Mr. Hubiak has concurred that, at best, this would be considered a "ditch" and not a perennial stream, based on the straight-line illustration and the contour elevation data.

CAC and the Corps are in agreement that the only perennial stream located within the project area is one that runs in an east-to-west orientation across the northern part of the property. The distance of the proposed pit far exceeds the Department's requirements for buffering a perennial stream.

Response to Item 12:

The project will occur in three (3) phases. Starting in the southern third of the proposed pit, all surface water (rainfall) that falls within the pit as well as produced water from the pit (ground water) will be collected/pumped to the 2-phase sedimentation pond(s) located in the southeastern corner of the proposed project site. These waters will be treated and piped southward to a discharge point that will eventually empty to Brickyard Bayou. In the meantime, the northern 2/3rds of the pit will remain in a natural state. Thus, and runoff will follow its natural watercourse. When Phase 2 is initiated, all waters within this zone will be taken southward and the last phase will remain natural. Finally, Phase 3 will be initiated and all waters within the project area will be taken southward and discharged into Brickyard Bayou until a time when the excavation is complete and the pit is ready to be made into a City approved lake within a recreation area.

I hope that this information satisfies your need for additional information concerning Items 9 and 12 of your response letter. If you have further questions or comments, please contact me at anytime.

Pursuant to your letter of June 28,2003 regarding our Notice of Intent application on the above captioned permit and the apparent inconsistencies, please accept my sincere apologies if our application has caused any confusion. It is my intent to clarify our intentions and remedy any inconsistencies.

The general configuration of the surface mining area has been modified to minimize any impact to the adjacent wetlands by increasing the buffer zones and to conform to the comments of your aforementioned letter and Mr. Patrick Chubb, Covington and Associates Corporation (our wetlands consultant) wetlands determination. Mr. Chubb's' report does not depict the north most wetlands. This acreage was omitted in his report that was transmitted to the Corps of Engineers office in Mobile, Alabama. Our revised site plan generally conforms to Mr. Chubb's site drawing. Our revised site plan includes the wetlands area to the north. Your comments and concerns will be addressed in this correspondence and our attached revised site plan.

To address your specific concerns the following is offered:

The sedimentation basin site submitted with our SWPPP has been relocated to the southeast corner of the permit area. The sedimentation basin has been configured to comply with the 150-foot buffer zone requirements. The sedimentation basin is divided into two ponds, Pond 1 and Pond 2. A treated timber baffle will divide Ponds 1 and 2. The installation of this baffle will allow a cleaner discharge from Pond 2. To preclude extensive silt buildup in Pond 1, monitoring activities shall be performed on a regular basis. Pond 2 shall be monitored at the same time as the Pond 1 activities. The outfall from Pond 2 shall be 18" diameter HDPE pipe.

For security, the entire perimeter of the pit site, including the sedimentation basin shall be enclosed by a 6'-0" high chain link security fence with three strands of barbed wire. Ingress and Egress to the site shall be through a pair of 12'-0" wide lockable gates.

There will be no dredging performed at this pit location. All mining activities shall be accomplished with a tracked excavator with a 5 cubic yard bucket. Ground water and incidental rainwater shall be controlled by an 8" submersible pump with liquid level controls to maintain the water level. The infiltrated ground water will be pumped to the sedimentation ponds. Velocity breaks shall be installed as required.

Erosion controls, sediment controls and the reclamation of the site will be through the prudent use of best management practices, silt fencing and other control measures outlined in our Storm Water Pollution Prevention Plan for the control and mitigation of pollutants in storm water discharges.

Our permit application and our reclamation plan shall be amended to agree with the attached site plan and this correspondence.

We have reviewed your comments regarding The U. S. Army Corps of Engineers and their determination that we will not require a wetlands dredge and fill permit. On May 19, 2003 Messrs. Patrick Chubb of Covington and Associates (our wetlands consultant) and Mr. Bob Gavin, of my staff, met with Mr. Art Hosey of the Mobile District, U. S. Army Corps of Engineers and discussed the Harreld Pit project.

On June 11, 2003 Messrs. Patrick Chubb of Covington and Associates (our wetlands consultant) Frank Hubiak of the Mobile District, U. S. Army Corps of Engineers and myself met at the Harreld Pit site project concerning the proposed activities.

The outcome of these meetings resulted in the Jurisdictional Determination; Wetlands Determination report by Covington and Associates dated May 23, 2003. This report was then transmitted to the Mobile Corps office for review and approval. I have attached a copy of Covington's assessment of the Harreld pit for your review.

We received notification from Mr. Ronald Kriztman of the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers, Mobile District; via his letter of June 11, 2003 stating that a U. S. Army Corps of Engineers permit will not be required. All excavation performed at this site will be in accordance with the <u>Tullock Rule</u>. Runoff will be prevented from commingling by the use of erosion checks, hay bales and or silt fence. A copy of Mr. Kritzman's letter was conveyed to Mr. Stan Thieling, Mr. Robert Seyfarth and yourself on June 18, 2003.

As noted above, the entire site shall be encompassed with a 6'-0" chain link security fence. Warning notice signs shall be placed at strategic locations to warn and inform the public

Our investigations indicate that the receiving stream of the sedimentation pond discharges will be south to Brickyard Bayou. The perennial stream identified on the attached revised site plan is to be located approximately 565 feet north (buffer zone) of any mining activities. The observed flow of this stream is a westerly direction. Erosion and sediment controls shall be placed north of the surface mining pit, south of the perennial ditch. These controls, along with earthen berms comprised of the topsoil stripped overburden around the periphery of the excavated areas shall avert the mingling of the storm water and the groundwater from the excavation. The northern boundary of the surface mining pit will be approximately 986 feet south of the north property line. The new arrangement outlined in the attached site plan also includes 100-foot buffer vegetative zones to the west, to the south and a 50-foot vegetative buffer on the east side.

These buffer zones shall remain in their natural state of vegetation. Storm water in the buffer zones will follow the natural watercourse. Only those trees and other vegetative growth shall be removed to enable the installation of the 6'-0" high security fence and certain construction events. Disturbed areas caused by construction or mining activities shall be temporarily or permanently seeded as the situation directs.

I have taken the liberty of enclosing an engineering report by Mr. John Oliver, PE, of Quality Engineering Services, Long Beach, Mississippi regarding his site analysis of the Harreld pit.



- 3. Perform stripping activities. Topsoil and overburden shall be used to construct the berms around the perimeter of the mining site. Topsoil and overburden shall be used to construct the sedimentation pond. The sedimentation shall be located in the southeast area of the surface mining operation.

Erosion and Sediment Controls:

Other controls of importance may include, but are not limited to:

TERMINATION of REPORTING and PERMIT COVERAGE






ATTACHMENT 1 STORM WATER POLLUTION PREVENTION PLAN


SITE LOCATION MAP

RECLAMATION SITE MAP











Reference is made to your the request for a jurisdictional determination and field review of a wetland delineation map via Covington and Associates Corporation, (consultant) concerning a proposed approximately 45-acre surface mining operation (Harreld Pit) on a 86-acre tract of property adjacent to 34th Avenue and 33rd Street, Gulfport, Mississippi (see enclosed copy of map). Specifically, the property is located in Section 33, Township 7 South, Range 11 West, Harrison County, Mississippi. Further reference is made to the on-site meeting of June 11, 2003, between Messrs. W. C. Fore (property owner) and Patrick Chubb (consultant) and Mr. Frank Hubiak, a member of my staff, concerning the proposed activity.

The review disclosed that a portion of the property is considered wetlands and is subject to our Federal permitting authority pursuant to Section 404 of the Clean Water Act of 1977 (33 USC 1344). See enclosed copy of Basis For Jurisdictional Determination form. Section 404 prohibits the placement of dredged or fill material into waters of the United States, including wetlands, unless the work has been authorized by a Department of the Army (DOA) permit.



On behalf of my client, *Mr. W.C. Fore*, please accept the following letter request for a jurisdictional determination.

Covington and Associates (CAC) conducted a wetlands delineation of the parcel in May 2003, in accordance with the 1987 Corps of Engineers Manual. Our findings indicate that approximately 35.5 acres of the 86-acre parcel are wetlands. Mr. Fore has applied for a dirt mine permit from the Mississippi Department of Environmental Quality. In support of this permit application, this wetlands delineation was conducted.

Mr. Fore proposes to excavate the 40-acre pit over the next several years to provide fill materials for a Mississippi State Port Authority (Gulfport) expansion project. Mr. Fore has already made arrangements to deed the property to the City of Gulfport when the project is complete. The City of Gulfport has accepted a resolution for such a project and intends to utilize the pit for an urban storm water detention basin and recreational facility.

The excavation of the wetland habitat will be done in accordance with guidelines referencing the Tullock Rule. It is understood that bulldozers will not be used to "push" any wetlands. The excavated materials will be hauled away and/or if temporary storage is required, no deposits will be made on existing wetlands. Best Management practices will be utilized to preserve the integrity of the adjacent wetlands habitat. In pit, retention/detention basins will be used to manage the "closed" system water that may come from ground water and/or storm water runoff. MSDEQ regulates these actions and is currently reviewing the Mine Application submitted by W.C. Fore Trucking.






Figure 2. Soil Survey of Project Area

Designates Proposed Pit





Figure 3. USGS Topo Quad

A CULTURAL RESOURCES ASSESSMENT OF SECTION 33 IN GULFPORT NORTH QUADRANGLE, HARRISON COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI

INTRODUCTION




Figure 1. Project Map, Section 33, T7S, R11W, Gulfport North Topographic Quad

On May 30, 2003, a cultural resource inventory was undertaken of an area totaling five acres in Harrison County. The survey area was located on land east of 28th Avenue in Gulfport, Mississippi (Figure 1). Currently, the area is heavily forested with pines and hardwoods. The area had not been used for nearly 50 years. To the north of the area is a swampy tributary of Turkey Creek. To the east is U.S. Highway 49; while mixtures of residential and commercial properties are scattered on all four sides of the property.

Robert E. Reams and Kelly McClave conducted the survey in order to identify and evaluate any archaeological sites that would be impacted by proposed burrow pit on the property. Two isolated finds were located during the survey.

METHODOLOGY

This assessment conforms to the guidelines established by the State Historic Preservation Officer, Mississippi Department of Archives and History, Jackson, Mississippi. The assessment included a state site file search, historic literature search, and an on-site survey with subsurface testing.

No previous archaeological surveys have been conducted within a mile radius of the project.

As a system of surveying areas, the principal investigator used a mixed subsurface testing and ground survey technique within the proposed area. From a topographic map of the area, transects were drawn encompassing different areas of the map. These transects were walked on the ground, while shovel tests were dug at randomly chosen locations within each transect. Each shovel test was approximately 1½-shovel blades wide (30x30 centimeters) and 30 centimeters deep. When ground visibility was good (60% or greater clear of surface clutter), a surface survey was employed until artifacts were located, then subsurface tests were performed. When a site was located (a shovel test with artifacts or artifacts found on the surface), shovel tests were dug at five-meter intervals in the major compass directions (N, E, S, W) or the directions of the landform. In any direction, the site boundary was reached after digging two consecutive empty shovel tests.

During the survey, the weather was warm and partially cloudy. The ground visibility was poor to fair in most of the area (5-45%), while the line-of-sight visibility was fair to good (40-80%). Two isolated finds were found.

BACKGROUND PREHISTORY AND HISTORY

The project area is located in Gulfport. Gulfport lies on the gulf coast in the area called the Coastal Meadows (Kelley 1973). The Coastal Meadows covers south Mississippi from the Louisiana line to the Alabama border and northward from the coast as much as 15 to 20 miles. This region is generally covered with mixed stands of longleaf and slash pines and hardwoods (Radford, Ahles and Bell 1968). There are more swamps and low-lying areas than in the more northern Piney Woods region. The soils are composed of recent deposits of fine sand and sandy loams (Kelley 1973).

Archaeological research in this portion of Mississippi has lagged behind other areas of the state such as the Mississippi River alluvial valley and the Tombigbee drainage (Blitz 1982, 1983; Jackson *et al.* 2002). Even though archaeological research has been lacking, the region is known for its cultural distinctiveness to the well-known cultures to the east (Mobile Bay and Florida) and the west (Lower Mississippi Valley). Most of the research in the area has taken place on site excavations and surveys conducted by the U.S. Forest Service and the University of Southern Mississippi. For this report, a composite prehistoric chronology for the coastal Louisiana area, the Mississippi Valley, and the Mobile Bay was employed (Table 1).

PaleoIndian Period (ca. 12,500-8,000 B.C.) This period represents the initial spread of humans into the area, so "in order to understand the spatial distribution and stylistic variation of stone tools, it is necessary to interpret the artifacts as an adaptive response to the natural environment" (Blitz 1982:17). Before 12,500 B.C., the Mississippi environment was probably colder and wetter than today (Pielou 1991). Much of the Deep South [Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, southern Georgia, South Carolina, and Florida] was a broadleaf forest dominated by beech and hickory (Goodyear 1991). To the north, there were forests dominated by a mixture of spruce and pine and further north periglacial tundra (Butzer 1971; Meltzer and Smith 1986). Between 12,000 and 8,000 B.C. there seems to have been a general warming trend of an average of five to eight degrees F. (Davis 1976), broadening the hardwood dominated forest to the north (Bense 1994). An oak-hickorypine forest developed south of the 33rd parallel by 6,500 B.C. (Goodyear 1991).

Meltzer and Smith (1986) believe that the major difference in PaleoIndian life ways between the southeastern and the northeastern United States was one of subsistence strategies or forest versus tundra adaptations.

Species-rich environments [e.g. forests] will rarely have one or two resources that are available and reliable and that occur in sufficient quantity to provide the requisite biomass and energy for human groups to make dietary specialization an efficient and viable option (Meltzer and Smith 1986:7).

The tools and locations of the sites seem to reflect these types of strategies. In the tundra environment, projectile points, scrapers, bifacial knives, and drills dominate the tool kits. All of the tools are highly modified with reuse common and indicate highly systematic and efficient lithic reduction. There tends to be more non-local lithic raw materials used than in forests environments. Moreover, there are more sites and fewer isolated fluted points. Sites are concentrated in river valleys or lake plains.

In the forested environments to the south, however, simple flake tools with little functional specificity are dominated (Meltzer and Smith 1986). The production of tools tends to be poorly executed. A great deal of unusable debitage was produced when cores were made, and these cores were blocky and irregular. Many of the points show wear patterns suggesting that these served multiple purposes such as hafted penetrating implements and as processing/butchering implements (Meeks 2000:11). There was a greater reliance on local raw materials. Relatively few sites have been found, but isolated fluted points seem to be relatively abundant.

Goodyear (1991) divided the PaleoIndian Period in the southeast into four sub-periods, each sub-period signifying change in tool morphology. There does not seem to be convincing proof for the first subperiod between 12,500 and 9,500 B.C. in the southeast. The second subperiod, the Clovis (9,500-8,900 B.C.) is noted for the presence of fluted projectile points. The frequency of Clovis and other fluted point diminished "from central latitude [33rd parallel] of Mississippi and Alabama southward onto the Gulf Coastal Plain" (Goodyear 1991:9). The fluted points are found in concentrations in the Interior Low Plateau of northern Alabama, Tennessee, and Kentucky close to high quality cryptocrystalline lithic materials. Muto and Gunn (1981) found that distance to a cryptocrystalline source seemed to be an important factor in early site location in northeast Mississippi, along with a preference for floodplains and well-drained sandy soils. McGahey (1987) found that in Mississippi the reliance on particular local raw materials changed through time. During the Clovis sub-period, more exotic or non-local lithics were used while later, more local lithics were used.

The third sub-period, the Middle PaleoIndian (8,900-8,500 B.C.), is noted for the occurrence of fluted and unfluted points in the mid-south region and unfluted points on the coastal plain (Goodyear 1991). Floodplains in the southeast appear to have been the preferred locations (Dincauze 1993; Smith 1986; Steponaitis 1986). The distance to cryptocrystalline lithic sources apparently also was still important.

By the fourth sub-period, the Dalton (8,500-8,000 B.C.), the hardwood forests continued to spread further north, and the pines spread north from the coastal areas. The Dalton projectile point seems to be a more general-purpose tool then previous point (Meltzer and Smith 1986; Smith 1986). The associated tool assemblages are also generalized items that are easily carried and readily maintained. The only apparent differences with earlier assemblages are the appearance of the Dalton adze and the Dalton projectile point. Although rive floodplains were still used, coastal zones and heavily wooded regions also were inhabited (Goodyear 1991).

Archaic Period (c.a. 8,000-500 B.C.)

Generally, during the Archaic Period, conditions were warmer and drier than the PaleoIndian Period as the weather became similar to that of today (Bense 1994:22). After 2,000 B.C. the temperature cooled and the sea reached its present level (Davis 1976). By 2,000 B.C. the Coastal Plain was dominated completely by pine forests.

Early Archaic

The tool complexes of the Early Archaic appear to be continuations from the earlier Dalton (McGahey 1996). In the western and central Gulf Coastal Plain, the San Patrice projectile point is a late local Dalton manifestation, which is also found during the Early Archaic. During the entire period for the Southeast, there does not appear to be any measurable increase in assemblage frequencies of plant food processing tools, only increases in the number of tools (Meltzer and Smith 1986). It has been suggested that foraging adaptations changed from more logistical during the PaleoIndian to more residential mobility during this period (Cable 1996). This adaptive change was noted by examining differences in curated versus expedient lithic tools. Steponaitis (1986) suggests that there was a general population growth over many parts of the southeast. General site location preferences change as well.

In northeast Mississippi, there was a shift from a "strict concentration on major rivers to [use of] interriverine areas and uplands between drainages" "Muto and Gunn 1981:4). Brown (1973) also noted a concentration of sites upon the lower reaches of interior drainages, avoiding the broad floodplains. In southeastern Mississippi, the settlement system consisted of the movement of small bands within resource territories with large sites near key resources and smaller sites surrounding the larger ones (Blitz 1982). Muto and Gunn (1981) noted three types of sites: base camps, satellite camps, and specialized localities. The base camps were located near the mouths of drainages, while the smaller satellite camps were located farther upland. Middle Archaic

The Hypsithermal, a period of increased warmth and changes in the weather patterns, influenced the area during the Middle Archaic (Brookes and Reams 1996). Bifaces apparently were larger and cruder, while unifacial tools virtually disappeared (McGahey 1996). Although the three site types observed during the Early Archaic have a bearing on site location, two new resources were exploited extensively: freshwater shellfish and hickory nuts (Brookes and Reams 1996; Peacock 1988). Many of the base campsites are located where there was an abundant supply of shellfish (Ford and Willey 1941; Jennings 1952; Phillips 1970; Phillips, Ford, and Griffin 1951). In addition, earthen mounds associated with the major base camps appear in the Middle Archaic (Gibson 1994; Russo 1994). Late Archaic

The Late Archaic continued the same settlement and subsistence pattern as the previous period. Many of the tool assemblages are similar to those in the Middle Archaic. The practice of horticulture in the southeast can be traced to this time. These first cultigens were apparently cucurbits, squashes or gourds (Steponaitis 1986). There are also indications of increasing extra-regional exchange of exotic materials, peaking during the Gulf Formational (Blitz 1982).

<u>Gulf Formational</u>

The Gulf Formational is considered the intermediate cultural development between the Archaic and the Woodland Period, but only applies to the gulf coast (Reams 1995). During this time, ceramics first appear on the gulf coast.

In the immediate area, three influential cultures have been identified: Wheeler, Poverty Point, and Bayou La Batre. The Wheeler Culture is most commonly found in northern Alabama, and its most recognizable feature is the presence of fiber-tempered pottery (Reams 1995).

The Poverty Point Culture (2,000-800 B.C.), also a period, greatly influenced the inhabitants of the area (Blitz and Mann 1993). The culture complex was named from the Poverty Point site in northeast Louisiana, but there are several large sites in Louisiana, Arkansas, and Mississippi such as the Claiborne site near the mouth of the Pearl River (Gibson 1994; Webb 1977). The Poverty Point "may be characterized as a culture involved in a highly organized and viable religious system, a developed social hierarchy, an elaboration of arts and crafts, and a far-flung interaction sphere" (Brain 1971:45). This interaction sphere was associated with a complex exchange system. For example, the Claiborne site is a semi-circular shell ring with a large number of Poverty Point objects, tubular pipes, clay figurines, a cache of steatite vessels, hematite and magnetite plummets, stone beads, '2-hole' gorgets, pendants, boatstones, quartz butterfly bannerstones, bar weights, and fibertempered Wheeler ceramics.

The Bayou La Batre Culture (700-100 B.C.) from Mobile Bay and the Lower Tombigbee River Valley is characterized by coiled, sand and grittempered ceramics (Blitz 1982; Walthall 1980). According to Walthall 1980:95), Bayou La Batre ceramics are either "flaring-side cup or beaker" or "globular pot" in shape, both of which "have either annular bases or four small wedge or mammiform-shaped feet". There seems to have been an extensive use of freshwater oyster and mussel beds at these sites. *Tchefuncte Period* (700-100 B.C.)

In Louisiana, parts of Alabama, and south Mississippi, the Tchefuncte Period replaces the Poverty Point (Jenkins *et al.* 1993). The Tchefuncte material culture has been defined as a lackluster development with declining social complexity and interaction (Sims 1997:12). The sites located on the coast exhibit marine adaptations with the exploitation of brackish water for clams and fish (Shenkel 1984). Sites located inland reflect the exploitation of the available flora and fauna with heavy concentration on nuts. Brown (1973) noted that in the Natchez Bluff area, people preferred the upland regions to the floodplains and overlooking ridges. These upland sites exhibit very light artifact densities and a lack of organic staining and represented a generalized foraging economy (Asch et al. 1979).

The ceramics are considered 'crude' with a somewhat limited range of shapes. The pots can be "globular...with shoulders, constricted necks, and flaring rims, or with straight expanding walls and rims" (Neuman 1984:126). A typical vessel would be "a rather tubby jar, with or without a constricted neck, with a slight swelling in the middle and lower walls converging to a small rectangular base" (Phillips 1970).

Marksville Period (200 B.C.-A.D. 400)

Marksville is either a southern expression of the larger northern Hopewellian complex (Neuman 1984:167) or the "inhabitants of the Lower Valley appear to have had brief contact with northern Hopewell, adjusted to new ideas, and resumed indigenous cultural traditions" (Toth 1988:211). Whichever the case may be, there was an extensive trading network encompassing most of the Lower Mississippi Valley, as well as southeast Mississippi. The networks reflected social relations between sites, but the nature (kinds of relations) and strength of such social connections varied (Braun 1985).

Conical earthen burial mounds were constructed at this time. Subsistence strategies did not seem to change much from earlier periods except for the increased use of cultivated foods (Braun 1985, 1988). The use of maize increased, although the people did not rely substantially on it (Nassaney and Cobb 1991). There was an apparent increase in the use of native cultigens such as the starchy seeds of chenopodium in Tennessee and Kentucky (Gremillion 1993). The settlement strategy tended to utilize all available resources (Johnson 1988:57).

Although embracing many sophisticated aspects of Hopewell style decoration, the early Marksville ceramics of the Lower Valley do not represent a significant advance in ceramic technology when compared to late Tchefuncte manufacture (Toth 1988:42).

According to Brown (1978), the ceramics are grog-tempered wares. The outer surface decorations are made with 'broad U-shaped incisions' as well as different types of stamping. Typical Marksville vessel shapes have been identified as large, small, and shallow bowls, jars, beakers, globular, and 'tubby' pots (Phillips 1970). The bases of the vessels are flat, round, or square with isolated cases of basal supports. The Santa Rosa Culture (100 B.C.-A.D. 400) covered the same territory as the Bayou La Batre. There seems to be close parallels between the Santa Rosa ceramics and Marksville ceramics from the Lower Mississippi Valley (Milanich 1994). These vessels were sand and clay tempered with zoned decorations containing stamping or punctations with broad incisions (Fuller 1979).

Baytown Period (A.D. 450-800)

The Baytown developed in the Lower Mississippi Valley and consists of two cultures: Baytown and Troyville (Sims 1997). Baytown covers the northern valley, while the Troyville covers the southern valley. Fewer exotic materials are found on Baytown and Troyville sites then on early Marksville sites. Conical earthen burial mounds continue to be constructed. The bow and arrow were first introduced at this time (Blitz 1983). There seemed to have been a significant population increase as well as an increase in site size (Brown 1973; Nassaney and Cobb 1991), and all ecological zones were utilized (Braun 1988; Brown 1973). On the average, there seemed to be a general reduction in the floor area of households, which Braun (1988) feels it indicates stronger intra-village, rather than inter-village economic ties.

The basic Baytown vessel consists of jars, beakers, bowls, and plates with thickened rounded rims and round, flat, or squared (Phillips 1970). The ceramics are clay-tempered with cord marking, incisions, stamping, or red painting as outer surface decorations.

During this time, the Weeden Island Culture (A.D. 400-1,000) influences the area from northwestern Florida. For the most part, Weeden Island existed from Mobile Bay to central Florida along the gulf coast (Jenkins 1978). "Occasional Weeden Island potsherds are recognized in ceramic collections from south and east Florida, the Atlantic Coast of Georgia, and the Lower Mississippi Valley" (Milanich *et al.* 1984:10).

Willey (1945) first noted similarities between Weeden Island and Lower Mississippi Valley ceramic assemblages, i.e. Troyville and Coles Creek. He believed that there was a parallel development, which indicated the exchanging of stylistic elements (Milanich 1994).

Coles Creek Period (A.D. 800-1,000)

This culture developed in the Lower Mississippi Valley and spread eastward (Blitz 1983). Generally, there was a shift of large sites away from interior regions to areas closer to the floodplains of major drainages, which reflected an increase in residential sedentism (Brown 1973). Some of these large floodplain sites developed with temple mounds and plaza arrangements. The population increased with an intensification of horticulture (Blitz 1983; Braun 1988). The ceramics are fine grog-tempered with the predominance of encircling incised lines under the lip (Sims 1997). Phillips (1970) identifies several shapes including bowls, jars, beakers, bottles, and globular pots. The bases tend to be round, flat, or square, while the rims are broad, flat, thickened, thinned, polished, and lugged (Phillips 1970).

Mississippian Period (A.D. 1,000-1,700)

The emergence of the Mississippian from earlier periods included a shift to intensive agriculture and changes in storage facilities, ceramics, and residential architecture. Along with these changes, there was a development of a hierarchical social organization with a high degree of centralization of power (Smith 1986; Steponaitis 1986). One of the dominating features of sites during this period is the large mound complex situated along large floodplains. Population densities and dependence on maize increased, helping to support stratified societies (Blitz 1983; Blitz and Mann 1993). There was widespread production and exchange of exotic resources such as marine shell beads, salt, and copper (Blitz and Mann 1993).

Mississippian sites were generally located where both intensive maize agriculture and/or the hunting of few selected animal species could occur. Not only were the best, most productive agricultural land sought, but also areas with marked physiographic and ecological complexity (Peebles and Kus 1977:441). The reasons for the collapse of the Mississippian life way by A.D. 1500 (except the Natchez which were dispersed by the French in the early 1700s) still remain unknown to archaeologists. However, several factors have been the focus of much research. These factors include over-reliance on maize agriculture, slight changes in certain critical environmental variables, and increase of political conflicts (Steinen 1992; Steponaitis 1986:170).

Historic Period

The area was lightly occupied during most of the historic period. The timber industry was a major aspect of south Mississippi life since the Civil War. During most of the 1800s, most of the timber in the area was brought to the coast along the major drainages, i.e. Pascagoula River and Leaf River (Hickman 1958). Large mills operated on the coast such as the Griffin and Dantzler mills in Moss Point (Reams and Cramer 1998). This changed with the completion of railroads connecting New Orleans to Jackson and the Gulf Coast in the early 1880s (Revels 1973:603). "Settlers went to work as section hands, helping first to build and then to maintain the new railways" (Napier 1986:20).

Another industry, very much related to the timber industry, was the naval store industry, which was named by its principal use in caulking wooden ships (Reams and Cramer 1998). This industry had its beginnings in the 1700s in New England. Pitch and tar, an end product of the cooked pine sap, were gathered from the abundant stands of longleaf pine. The pine sap was collected in various types of clay and metal vessels: the Herty cup, ca. 1904-1920s; arc-shaped clay cups such as the Pringle cup from the Gulf Coast, ca. 1910-1920s; arc-shaped and box-shaped tin cups such as the Pringle and McKoy cups, ca. 1920-1930s; and arc-shaped aluminum cups, ca. 1930-1950s (Butler 1998; Drew 1992; Forney 1985). With the advent of metal ships, the turpentine industry shifted towards other uses instead of caulking. By the mid to late 1800s, the Carolinas became the center of the naval store industry spread to other states in the South including Mississippi.

REPORT OF FINDINGS




Figure 2. The Isolated Finds in the Project Area

When the project survey was planned out, the possibility of finding a large number of eligible archaeological sites was low because of the area's proximity to the swampy water. The project area was surveyed on May 30, 2003. Principal Investigator Robert E. Reams conducted the assessment with the help of Kelly McClave. The survey results were disappointing. Only two isolated finds were found (Figure 2). The ground over the survey area was flat, with low wet bogs along the northern edge. Most of the project area was covered with pines and hardwoods. The soils consisted of fine sandy loams and sand.

Newly discovered sites

Isolated find #1 is a single shard of amethyst bottle glass (ca. 1885-1920) on the surface of the ground. The soil was a gray-brown sandy loam for the first 10 centimeters. Below this sandy loam was yellow-brown sand. This isolated find is not considered eligible for the National Register of Historic Places.

<u>Isolated find #2</u> is a single sherd of stoneware on the surface of a heavily disturbed area. Subsurface testing did not reveal any more artifacts. The find is not considered eligible for the National Register of Historic Places. No protective measures should be implemented.

SUMMARY AND RECOMMENDATIONS

This report describes a cultural resource assessment of the east of 28th Avenue in Gulfport, Mississippi. The assessment included a review of the archaeological literature, historic literature, and records review, and an on site survey with subsurface testing.

Two isolated finds were found, but neither were eligible or potentially eligible for the National Register of Historic Places. No further archaeological testing is necessary.

This agency is in receipt of your June 18, 2003 letter to Charles Chisolm requesting an evidentiary hearing regarding the surface mining permit issued to W. C. Fore to mine an area within your district and within the City of Gulfport. As we discussed on the telephone last week, this project requires additional permits from this agency's Office of Pollution Control (stormwater and, possibly, water discharge permits). MDEQ also is in contact with the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers concerning wetlands issues on the site.

Billy Warden:

I received this packet of information this morning from the City of Gulfport; this copy is for your files. It documents their efforts to obtain the information they need from W. C. Fore for his Special Exception approval for the proposed surface mine in the city. Included is a map of the proposed route of the port connector road that would pass through part of the site. I first heard about this road in a telephone conversation with Kelvin Jackson of Gulfport last week.

I looked at the site from 34th Avenue and from 33rd Street on Saturday, July 19. The site is wooded, but not thickly, with pine trees up to about 30-40 feet and thick undergrowth. Two access "roads" have been cleared into the site from 33rd Street on the south. I did not go into the site to determine their extent. The area is sparsely developed with industrial buildings and some houses. The building close to the proposed sedimentation ponds at the southeast corner of the site is a trucking company and warehouse.

There is a roadbed cleared through the undeveloped land south of the site that runs three or four blocks north-south. It might be part of Mr. Fore's plan to use this route to the south with the trucks, with a zig-zag to 30th Avenue, which is a designated truck route that runs directly to the west pier of the Port of Gulfport.

Dear Mr. Bellande,

On May 16, 2003, we met to discuss your Map Amendment application. When that meeting ended, I mentioned your sand mining operation on 34th Ave, pointing out to you that the City Council approval of the project was contingent on you securing the required permits. This applies to appropriate local, state, and federal permits. A Special Exception approval is the first step in the approval process for any mining activity.

You were given an application for Special Exception approval with a deadline of June 3, 2003, for the July group of hearings. We discussed your plans to start expeditiously. I am concerned that we did not receive your application. That fact seriously delays your plans. We need this time to review the application and meet the publication deadlines prescribed by the zoning ordinance. The next deadline for the Special Exception approval is rapidly approaching. That date is July 8, 2003.

Since we last met, we have had two other discussions about the application for Special Exception approval; the last one was June 23, 2003. You stated your employer's position. Please keep in mind that the City Council's approval of the project was contingent on you securing the required permits. The required local permits included Special Exception approval and a tree permit. I have enclosed a copy of the chart of permitted uses as well as relevant sections of the Tree Protection section of the City of Gulfport's Code of ordinance.

On June 30, 2003 I talk to Mike Bograd at Mississippi Department of Environmental Quality. Mr. Bograd informed me that you were awarded a DEQ permit for surface mining. He pointed out that your DEQ Permit is contingent on you securing the required permits. I also contacted the Department of Marine resources on that same day and was informed that you only filed a letter of intent. Although the property is located in an Uplands area, three of the five soil types (Ponzer, Plummer, and Atmore) on the site are hydric soils indicative of wetlands. These soil types force the application of a DMR permit and may force the Army Corps to revisit your approval as well.

If you need any further assistance please contact me at 228-868-5710. Your submittal will assist us in trying to accommodate your case and time table as soon as legally possible.

Thank you for your quick response to my July 2, 2003 letter. When you called on July 7, 2003 you acknowledged that you did not have every thing but wanted turn in as much as possible. Your expression of a willingness to work and obtain all appropriate local, state, and federal required permits was greatly received. I sent via facsimile the section detailing what the ordinance requires for Special Exception approval.

On July 7, 2003, we met to discuss your Special Exception application as you submitted. You gave this office proof of ownership; proof of authority; site plan and payment. In return, you received a copy of you cover sheet with the words "need to turn in supplemental application." You agreed to this quite readily.

This should included:

- We need copies of all appropriate local, state, and federal required permits with their respective conditions on file as called for by the City Council.
- Section VIII (A)(2)(c) requires a site plan, drawn to scale, showing the location and dimensions of existing and proposed structures with supporting open facilities, the ground area to be maintained for the proposed structure or structures.
- Section VIII (B)(2)(b)(4) requirements with close attention being paid to ingress and egress, circulation, and parking to name a few of the requirements. You received this section via facsimile.
- Fencing as we discussed in the context of site security.
- Verification that you contacted and received approval for any roads, drainage, etc. from public works and City Engineering. This along with permits must be accomplished before any work activity begins.

This information submittal will aid you in applying for the various permits you will need.

It is now understood that this Special Exception application <u>solely</u> applies to the Strip Mining activity. The recreation portion of the overall project will be accomplished at a later time through another permit process. This would involve a zoning change and Planning Commission Approval.

The required supplemental application information requested herein must be submitted to this office by July 21, 2003. If this is not met, you will be rescheduled for the September meetings. If you do not meet the deadline for the September Meetings August 5, 2003. You will need to reapply.



The Mississippi Department of Environmental Quality (MDEQ) has received your Notice of Intent (NOI) for coverage under the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Mining General Permit for the discharge of storm water from a mining site located in Section 33, Township 7 South, Range 11 West, Harrison County, Mississippi. MDEQ staff has coordinated internally with MDEQ's Office of Geology (Geology) and externally with federal agencies in a review of this NOI. This review has revealed a number of apparent inconsistencies in the description of the project as you have proposed it to these various entities. Because of these inconsistencies, we are unable to ascertain the details of the project that is being proposed and what permits or approvals may be required. It is absolutely imperative that the project be clearly defined and that every reviewing agency is reviewing the same set of facts. We strongly suggest that after reviewing this correspondence and consulting with your engineer, you meet with MDEQ staff to be sure that we have effectively communicated on these issues.

Review of the information regarding this proposed project indicates that an individual NPDES permit will be required instead of a general permit. As with all individual NPDES permits, public notice of the permit prior to a decision by the Mississippi Environmental Quality Permit Board (Permit Board) is required and, depending on the level of public interest, a public hearing may be required.

Specifically, our review of the various submittals has generated the following concerns:

1. The Storm Water Pollution Prevention Plan (SWPPP) submitted indicates that a sedimentation basin is to be located in the northwest corner of the property outside of the mining area. The Surface Mining Permit Application (Mining Application) submitted to Geology indicates that a sedimentation basin is to be located in the northeast corner of the property within the mining area. Please address this inconsistency.

2. According to the Gulfport North USGS topographic map, a perennial stream bisects the planned mining area. Chapter 3, Section IV.3.a.2 of the Wastewater Regulations requires a minimum of a 150 foot buffer distance between the mining area and the upper banks of perennial streams. Please provide documentation that W.C. Fore Trucking, Inc., will comply with this regulatory requirement.

- 3. According to the NOI and the Mining Application, dredging will not be part of the mining operation of this site. However, these documents also indicate that groundwater is at a depth of five (5) feet below natural grade and that the final depth of the mining operation will terminate at approximately 25 feet below natural grade. These facts appear to indicate that dredging and accompanying discharges will be required to mine the site. Please provide MDEQ with an operations plan that specifically details the method(s) to be employed to mine this site.
- 4. Section C of the Mining Application indicates that the site will be reclaimed through the establishment of grass cover. Information presented through media outlets and obtained by Geology indicates that the mined area will be converted to a large lake/pond. Additionally, the site plans provided to Geology do not account for the presence of the perennial stream located on site. Therefore, please provide a specific reclamation plan for this mining site. Please be aware that the reclamation plan must be amended through Geology, which is a separate submittal from your response to this letter.
- 5. MDEQ is aware that the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (Corps) has made a determination that no wetlands dredge and fill permit is required for your planned activities at this site. The project described by the Corps in its determination letter, however, does not appear to be consistent with the project for which you have made application to MDEQ. Please provide MDEQ with a copy of all information submitted to the Corps regarding the wetlands permit. Please be aware that although the Corps did not require a permit for the mining of the wetland area, all surface waters, including wetlands, within the State of Mississippi are waters of the state and are regulated as such. Therefore, you may be informed of other regulatory requirements with which you must comply regarding the mining of the wetland area upon MDEQ review of the requested documentation. Also, the Corps' own analysis may change once MDEQ and the Corps are supplied with consistent and complete information on the project.
- 6. Pursuant to Chapter 1, Section I.C.2.a of the Wastewater Regulations, all wastewater treatment facilities must be at least 150 feet from the property boundary. Any sedimentation basins located on site must comply with this regulatory siting criteria. Furthermore, Chapter 1, Section I.C.1.d of the Wastewater Regulations requires that all wastewater treatment facilities otherwise accessible to the general public must be made inaccessible and identified by signs posted in a reasonable manner. Please provide MDEQ with a plan for compliance with these criteria.
- 7. Based on information provided by MDEQ's Water Quality Assessment Branch, the proposed receiving stream, Turkey Creek, is currently listed as an impaired water body on the state's Clean Water Act § 303(d) list. As such, discharge of any type of wastewater may not be permitted to the Turkey Creek without a site-specific assessment of the stream.

- 8. The discharge of mixed storm water and groundwater is not allowed through a storm water general permit. Therefore it appears an individual NPDES Discharge Permit application will be required for the discharge of mixed stormwater and groundwater. Please find enclosed EPA Form 1, EPA Form 2D and EPA Form 2C for your consideration (you will need to complete and submit Form 2C six months after permit issuance). This individual permit is required in addition to storm water discharge coverage as storm water may leave the site without going into the sedimentation basin first.
- 9. The submitted SWPPP appears to be generic in nature and does not specifically address the environmental issues at this site. Please prepare and submit a site-specific SWPPP that addresses the protection of wetlands, site security, perennial stream protection, specific storm water flow control for each area of the site, including all access roads to and from the mining area, storm water/process wastewater receiving stream identification, and the discharge route from the sedimentation basin to the receiving stream.
- 10. Please provide MDEQ with a scaled site map that indicates the location of all anticipated sedimentation basins, anticipated points of discharge from the sedimentation basins, location of the rain gauge, planned location of all storm water controls to be implemented at the site, property lines, specific mining areas (including acreage amount) within the total property acreage, planned storage and stockpile areas, buffer distances for all surface waters and storm water control measures, and all anticipated access roads into the total property. Additionally, please include the storm water flow direction for each area of the site to further indicate the points of discharge from the site.

Upon receipt of this information, the Environmental Permits Division will continue the permitting process for your project. Please be advised the discharge of storm water or process water without written notification of coverage or issuance of an individual NPDES Storm Water Permit is a violation of state law. MDEQ suggests that a meeting may be beneficial in order to discuss and, if possible, to streamline these issues prior to permitting.

Additionally, please find enclosed a copy of a request for an evidentiary hearing before the Permit Board regarding your surface mining permit filed by Representative Frances Fredericks and a copy of MDEQ's response to that request, noting that any evidentiary hearings concerning the project will be consolidated after all pertinent permitting actions are taken by the Permit Board.

This agency is in receipt of your June 18, 2003 letter to Charles Chisolm requesting an evidentiary hearing regarding the surface mining permit issued to W. C. Fore to mine an area within your district and within the City of Gulfport. As we discussed on the telephone last week, this project requires additional permits from this agency's Office of Pollution Control (stormwater and, possibly, water discharge permits). MDEQ also is in contact with the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers concerning wetlands issues on the site.

Because this project ultimately will require multiple permits from the Mississippi Environmental Quality Permit Board, and because mining at the project cannot begin until all permits are issued, we will hold your request for an evidentiary hearing during the Permit Board's consideration of these additional permits. We will keep you informed of any public comment period or public hearings scheduled on those permits. If the applicant obtains the other permits it needs for this project, we will then consolidate any additional requests for evidentiary hearing with your request. In this way, the Permit Board can hold one evidentiary hearing regarding the project instead of several.

General Requirements

This Storm Water Pollution Prevention Plan consists of certain controls appropriate for surface mining activities. These Controls shall:

- Construct the sediment ' detention pond with the spoils from the excavation to be used in berms.
- 2. Divert upslope surface water around disturbed areas of the site as shown in figure 1, Diversion Dikes.
- 3. Limit the exposure of the disturbed area to the shortest amount of time as practicable.
- 4. Minimize the amount of surface area that must be disturbed at one time.
- 5. Implement the best management practices to mitigate adverse impacts from storm water runoff. Shown in Figures 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6.

Erosicn and sediment controls consisting of vegetative and structural practices shall be designed to preserve vegetation or timely revegetated disturbed areas and divert from exposed soils or otherwise limit runoff from exposed areas.

Post construction control measures shall include on-site nfiltration, flow attenuation in vegetated swales and natural depressions and retantion structures. Velocity dissipation devices may be required at the outfall of these structures and along the outfall channels provide non-erosive flows. Controls shall be placed to minimize off-site vehicle tracking of sediments.

Controls shall be implemented as needed to retain storm water in an on-site detention pond to prevent adverse impact to receiving streams. When work is not being performed in a disturbed area, appropriate temporary and / or vegetative and structural practices shall be initiated.

A rain gauge shall be set up on site during mining operations. Within twenty-four hours after commencement of a rainfall event greater than or equal to a Two Year 24 Hour Storm Event (6 inches), an inspection of all controls and other SWPPP requirements shall be performed cluring the permit coverage in compliance with Part IV.B of the permit.

Other controls of importance may include, but are not limited to:

- 1. Topsoil will be removes from the area to be mined and used to construct diversion dikes and berms.
- 2. Preserving existing vegetation and revegetating disturbed soil as soon as possible to limit the exposure time of the disturbed area.
- 3. Surface area that must be disturbed will be minimized.

- 4. Management practices to mitigate adverse impacts from storm water runoff are, but not limited to, interceptor dikes and swales, hay bales, brush barriers, silt fences and sediment traps. Figures 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6.
- 5. Structurally sound dams and levees will be constructed for impoundments.
- 6. Encompassing various stockpiles such as fill or topsoil materials with hay bales or silt fence.
- 7. Properly maintaining, cleaning, repairing the site and ercision prevention controls.

INSPECTION REQUIREMENTS:

Inspection of all temporary and vegetative, erosion and sediment controls and other protective measures and SWPPP requirements will be performed ouring the permit coverage.

At least once every month.

- 1. Within twenty-four hours after commencement of a rainfall event greater than or equal to a Two Year 24 Hour Storm Event (6 inches).
- 2. As often as necessary ensure that appropriate erosion and sediment controls have been properly constructed and maintained.

REPORTING

These inspections will be reported on copies of the forms provided. The report form shabby be submitted semi-annually, postmarked not later than the 218th day of July or January for each six month period. All records, reports and information resulting from activities required by this permit shall be re4tained of at least three years from the date of the MNOI, inspection or report.

NONCOMPLIANCE REPORTING

1. <u>Anticipated Noncompliance</u>: The Mississippi Office of Pollution Control (OPC) will be given at least ten days advance notice, if possible, before any planned noncompliance with permit requirements.

2. <u>Linanticipated Noncompliance:</u> The Mississippi Office of Pollution Control (OPC) shall be notified orally within 24 hours from the time that W. C. Fore Trucking, Inc. becomes aware of the unanticipated noncompliance. A written report will be provided the OPC within five working days from the time the operator becomes aware of the circumstances. The report shall describe the cause, the exact dates and times, steps taken or planned to reduce, eliminate, or prevent reoccurrence and, if the noncompliance has not ceased, the anticipated time for correction.

TERMIN'ATION of REPORTING and PERMIT COVERAGE

Upon successful completion of all permanent erosion control and sediment controls for a covered project, a certification of the same will be submitted to the Mississippi Office of Pollution Control. Inspections shall continue for at least two months beyond completion. If controls have been successful during these two months, reporting and permit coverage is automatically terminated unless notifies by OPC within thirty days of receiving the final inspection report.





ATTACHMENT 1 STORM WATER POLLUTION PREVENTION PLAN SITE LOCATION MAP


RECLAMATION SITE MAP

E. ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS

The following described fee, documents and information, as required by the Mississippi Surface Mining and Reclamation Act, must be submitted to the Bureau of Geology before the application can be processed:

- 1. APPLICATION FEE: Amount varies according to material being mined and size of the permi area. See Appendix A of the Rules and Regulations for the Fee Schedule.
- 2. CERTIFICATE OF INSURANCE: Available from the applicant's insurance agency; must indicate that the applicant has sufficient liability insurance in an amount not less than \$100,000/300,000 for Bodily Injury and \$100,000 for Property Damage
- 3. PERFORMANCE BOND: Must be at least \$500/acre and not more than \$2500/acre and is based on the applicant's estimate of the reclamation cost. The "TOTAL AREA TO BE PERMITTED" in A-7, page 1, is the number of acres to be bonded. A Certificate of Deposit may be substituted.
- 4. PROOF OF THE APPLICANT'S LEGAL RIGHT TO MINE: A lease, deed, or agreement that includes a legal description of the permit area.
- 5. MAPS, AERIAL PHOTOGRAPHS, OR DRAWINGS of the mine area:
 - A. On a USGS Topographic Map:
 - 1. locate water wells within 0.5 mile of the permit area
 - 2. outline boundaries of both the permit area and the entire mine area (if different)
 - 3. Draw access to the nearest public road from the mine
 - 4. illustrate how surface drainage will be conducted or changed
 - B. Additional Drawings or Maps
 - 1. location of excavations, spoil piles, settling ponds, plant, etc.
 - 2. a yearly mining plan (showing area to be mined each year)
 - 3. a minimum of two (2) cross-sections (one generally in a N-S direction and one in an E-W direction) showing the present configuration and the configuration upon completion of reclamation
 - 4. a yearly reclamation plan (showing area to be reclaimed each year)
 - 5. a diagramatic illustration of the site upon completion of the reclamation



FACT SHEET 20: Results of Dioxin Sampling -- Off-Base Results

Introduction

Fact Sheets 5 and 14 discussed the results of two earlier rounds of off-base sampling at the Seabee Center. This fact sheet provides a brief summary of the results of sampling completed in May 1997.

Background

The earliest rounds of sampling showed that dioxin may be moving through the storm drainage ditches on the base. This stormwater eventually drains off the base through "outfalls" shown on Figure 1 on the last page of this fact sheet.

The current sampling program is designed to test the soil and water in the ditches to find out if contamination is present. This program is divided into two phases. The first phase, reported here, looked at a large area to determine where more study is needed. The second phase, to begin in the fall of 1997, will focus on areas where higher levels of contamination were found in the first phase. A more complete evaluation of the data will follow the second phase of the study.

The Sampling Program

The sampling program was broken up into six ditches and streams known to receive water from Seabee Center. The one's that were looked at included:

- Canal No. 1
- Turkey Creek
- Brickyard Bayou
- Bernard Bayou
- Outfall 3 Swamp
- Outfall 4 Ditch

The locations of these samples within each drainage area are shown on the map on the last page of this fact sheet.

How Samples Were Selected

The sampling program is designed to find the highest concentrations of dioxin as quickly as possible. Seabee Center samplers are now able to predict where dioxin will be found because of a recent discovery. Scientists have found that dioxin concentrations are usually highest in rich, dark soils, particularly in slow-moving water where dioxin can settle out. They also know that *nearby locations with lighter colored sandy soils or soils in areas of faster moving water may not contain dioxin*. Using this information, samples were collected from rich sediment in slow-moving areas of streams and ditches.

What Was Found

The results of the sampling for each drainage pathway are shown on the next two pages. The results are shown in parts per trillion, or ppt. A part per trillion of dioxin is equal to one particle of dioxin in 1,000,000,000 particles of soil or sediment.

Next Steps

A Phase II investigation will be conducted in the fall of 1997. It will include additional sampling in these areas:

- Bernard Bayou and Brickyard Bayou, to make sure that the extent of dioxin in sediments has been identified;
- Outfall 3 Swamp, to determine if dioxin contamination extends beyond the swamp area; and
- the new ditch along 28th Street, to confirm that dioxin has not moved from Outfall 3 North.

The results of the Phase II investigation should be available in the spring of 1998.

BRICKYARD BAYOU DRAINAGE IMPROVEMENT STUDY prepared for THE CITY OF GULFPORT, MISSISSIPPI

INTRODUCTION

Brown & Mitchell, Inc., was retained by the City of Gulfport, Mississippi, in May 1993 to investigate and recommend solutions to drainage problems on Brickyard Bayou, between Bernard Bayou and 30th Avenue. The study reach was later reduced to cover only the area between Courthouse Road and 28th Street, as most of the flooding and the causes of the flooding are located within this reach. This report presents the results of the study and includes hydraulic calculations, cost estimates, and recommendations for making drainage improvements.

Brickyard Bayou originates in Southwest Gulfport near the U.S. Naval Reservation, approximately 4000 feet north of the Gulf, and flows northeastward generally parallel to the beach for a distance of 6.65 miles to its entrace to Bernard Bayou 9000 feet north of the Gulf. The drainage area at the mouth is 6.09 square miles. Almost all of the Brickyard Bayou channel and adjacent floodplain has been cleared of vegetation and is maintained in a clean condition between Bernard Bayou and Courthouse Road. Between Courthouse Road and 28th Street, the channel down to normal low water elevation and almost all of the adjacent floodplain is heavily vegetated with trees and brush, except for the cleared airport area between Hewes Avenue and Strawberry Road.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Mobile District, completed a Section 205 Initial Appraisal Report for flood control on Brickyard Bayou in April, 1986. The study area consisted of a 4.2 mile reach of stream beginning at Mill Road and extending upstream to U.S. Highway 49. This study was undertaken soon after the major storm of July 5-6, 1985, which produced 9.8 inches of rainfall within a 24-hour period and flooded approximately 180 houses in Gulfport. Most of these houses were flooded by Brickyard Bayou. The Gulfport Engineering Department recovered high water elevations of 10.73 feet from the foundation of the house at 3317 Jeffrey Circle and 11.14 feet from a small building at the north end of Brookwood Avenue following this flood. A total of 103 structures located between 8th Avenue and 28th Street were reported to have been flooded. No other serious flooding was reported in the study area.

The Corps of Engineers considered several alternative plans for flood damage reduction and selected clearing and snagging of the channel between Courthouse Road and 28th Street as the most practical alternative. The estimated total project first cost was \$356,000 and the estimated annual cost was \$34,200. The estimated total average annual flood damages under existing conditions were \$25,200. Based on these figures, the Corps of Engineers found that a practical and economically feasible plan for flood protection on Brickyard Bayou could not be implemented at that time.

The Corps of Engineers is now preparing a Section 205 Reconnaissance Report for flood control in Hancock, Harrison, and Jackson Counties. This report should be completed in late 1994 or early 1995, and will include an updated study on Brickyard Bayou. If the Corps finds an economically feasible flood control method for Brickyard Bayou as a result of this study, a more detailed study will be made. This more detailed study will take about one year to complete.

Gee & Jenson, Engineers, Architects, Planners, Inc., completed a flood insurance study for the City of Gulfport on July 4, 1988. This report presented a Brickyard Bayou Hydrologic Analysis and flood profiles extending from Bernard Bayou to 24th Avenue.

The City of Gulfport Engineering and Public Works Departments provided files for use that included July 5, 1985, flood high water mark locations and elevations and property ownership maps along Brickyard Bayou.

HYDROLOGIC ANALYSIS

The 1991 U.S. Geological Report "Flood Characteristics of Mississippi Streams," prepared in cooperation with the Mississippi Department of Transportation, was used to determine peak discharge - flood frequency relationships for Brickyard Bayou. This report shows the coastal region to be in Flood-Frequency Region 1 (Coastal Plains Upland), but neither the Mississippi Department of Transportation nor the U.S. Geological survey consider the regional flood-frequency equations developed for Region 1 to be fully representative of the flat coastal region of the State extending roughly 20 miles inland from the Gulf of Mexico. The flood characteristics of the coastal streams lie somewhere between the characteristics of those in Region 1 and those in the flatter Region 3 (Delta Area).

The median slope of streams used to develop the equations in Region 1 was 10.2 feet per mile and the median slope used to develop the equations in Region 3 was 1.0 foot per mile (see Table 5 on page 38 of "Flood Characteristics of Mississippi Streams"). The slope (as defined in "Flood Characteristics of Mississippi Streams") of Brickyard Bayou in the study reach is approximately 6 feet per mile.

Based on this slope comparison, the peak discharge - flood frequency relationship for Brickyard Bayou was determined by averaging the peak discharges computed using equations developed for Region 1 with the peak discharges computed using equations developed for Region 3. This peak discharge - flood frequency relationship is shown in Table 1.

The Brickyard Bayou peak discharge - flood frequency relationship developed as discussed above was adjusted for effects of urbanization by using the seven-parameter equations developed by V. B. Sauer and others, as presented in "Flood Characteristics of Urban Watersheds in the United States: U.S. Geological Survey Water Supply 2207" and discussed in the report "Flood Characteristics of Mississippi Streams". This method of adjusting flood-frequency equations for the effects of urbanization considers the percentage of the drainage basin occupied by impervious surfaces, such as houses, buildings, streets, and parking lots, and a basin development factor which is determined by considering the following parameters:

- 1. Percentage of main drainage channels and principal tributaries within the basin that have been improved by straightening, enlarging, deepening, and clearing.
- 2. Percentage of main drainage channels and principal tributaries within the basin that have been lined with an impervious material.
- 3. Percentage of secondary tributaries within the basin that consist of storm sewers or storm drains.
- 4. Percentage of the basin that is covered by residential, commercial, and/or industrial development having streets and highways constructed with curb and gutter and storm sewers.

Brickyard Bayou peak discharge - flood frequency relationship adjusted for urbanization is also shown in Table 1.

HYDRAULIC ANALYSIS

Flood profiles were computed along Brickyard Bayou from Courthouse Road to 28th Street using the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Hydrologic Engineering Center (HEC-2) Water-Surface Profiles computer program.

Brickyard Bayou cross-sections taken at 11 locations from the City of Gulfport contour maps (developed from 1979 aerial photographs) were compared with cross-sections surveyed at the same locations. This comparison showed that the cross-sections taken from the contour maps were not accurate enough for flood profile calculations. Therefore, 29 additional cross-sections (for a total of 40) were surveyed between Courthouse Road and 28th Street.

Roughness coefficients (Mannings "n") used in the hydraulic calculations were assigned along the cross-sections based on field observations. The main channel n values vary from 0.04 to 0.08, and floodplain n values vary from 0.04 to 0.250.

The starting water surface elevations at the downstream side of Courthouse Road used in the profile calculations were determined from a stage-discharge relation developed from flood profile elevations and corresponding discharges given in the City of Gulfport Flood Insurance Study. The computed profiles are shown on the drawing entitled "Brickyard Bayou Flood Profiles". Computed 100-year and 25-year flood profiles with existing channel and floodplain conditions are shown along with a 25-year flood profile calculated with a channel n value of 0.03 (estimated n value with one year growth after clearing and snagging) and a channel n value of 0.04 (estimated n value with 2 to 3 year growth after clearing and snagging).

The profile calculations show that clearing and snagging will lower a 25-year flood at Eighth Avenue 2.2 feet with n=0.03 and 1.3 feet with n=0.04.

At 28th Street, clearing and snagging will lower a 25-year flood by 3.1 feet with n=0.03 and 2.0 feet with n=0.04.

The most flood prone house on the Brickyard Bayou floodplain is at 3368 Johnson Circle with a floor elevation of 10.61. This house is plotted at Station 15730 on the Brickyard Bayou flood profiles. The Brickyard Bayou flood of July 5, 1985, crested at an elevation of 11.14 feet near this location. The following flood elevations were computed for this house location:

The most severe street flooding on the Brickyard Bayou floodplain occurs on Johnson Circle in Bayou View West Subdivision. The profile of Johnson Circle is plotted on the "Brickyard Bayou Flood Profiles." These profiles show that the depth of a 25-year flood with existing channel conditions at the west end of Johnson Circle is 3.5 feet. The 25-year flood depth would be 1 foot with the channel n value reduced to 0.03 and 2 feet with the channel n value reduced to 0.04.

CHANNEL IMPROVEMENT ALTERNATIVES

Three channel improvement alternatives for reducing flooding on Brickyard Bayou were evaluated. These alternatives are as follows:

Alternative No. 1 - Clear and Snag Channel from Courthouse Road to near 28th Street (except for already clean airport area between Hewes Avenue and Strawberry Road).

As discussed in the previous section, "Hydraulic Analysis", house flooding at a 25-year flood level would be eliminated by clearing and snagging, if the channel was maintained to keep the roughness coefficient below about 0.04. Streets in the west part of Bayou View West Subdivision would still flood to a depth of about 2 feet with channel n values of 0.04. Elimination of street flooding at the 25-year flood level would require channel improvements in addition to channel cleaning.

The total cost estimate for this project is \$600,000 and a breakdown of the cost estimate of Alternate No. 1 is given in Table No. 2.

Alternate No. 2: Earthen channel widening from Washington Avenue to near 28th Street and clearing and snagging of existing channel from Washington Avenue down to Courthouse Road.

Both house flooding and street flooding along Brickyard Bayou from a 25-year flood could be eliminated by clearing and snagging the existing channel from Courthouse Road to Washington Avenue and by increasing the size of the earthen channel from Washington Avenue to 28th Street. The required bottom width of the improved channel would vary from 55 feet at Washington Avenue to 40 feet at 28th Street. The depth would be about 9 feet and the sides would be sloped back on a 3 horizontal to 1 vertical slope. A channel roughness coefficient of 0.04 was used to determine the above required channel sizes.

The total cost estimate for this project is \$1,190,000 and a breakdown of the cost estimate of Alternate No. 2 is given in Table No. 3.

<u>Alternate No. 3: Concrete paved channel from Washington Avenue to near 28th Street and clearing and snagging of existing channel from Washington Avenue down to Courthouse Road.</u>

A relatively maintenance free alternative for eliminating both house and street flooding along Brickyard Bayou at the 25-year flood level is concrete paving the channel from Washington Avenue to near 28th Street and clearing and snagging the existing channel from Courthouse Road to Washington Avenue. The required bottom width of the paved channel would vary from 20 feet at Washington Avenue to 15 feet at 28th Street. The depth would be about 9 feet and the side slopes 2 horizontal and 1 vertical.

The total cost estimate for this project is \$5,365,000 and a breakdown of the cost estimate of Alternate No. 3 is given in Table No. 4.

CONSTRUCTION AND MAINTENANCE ROADWAY

Brickyard Bayou water depth between Courthouse Road and Hewes Avenue may be sufficient for clearing and snagging operations to be conducted from within the channel banks and construction of a roadway along the channel may not be required in this area. Upstream from Strawberry Road a construction roadway will probably be required. This roadway could be either a temporary roadway constructed to meet minimum requirements for construction operations, or it could be a well graded, aggregate surfaced, permanent maintenance roadway.

A roadway would not be needed in a 900 foot reach east of Washington Avenue where Canal Street is adjacent and parallel to Brickyard Bayou and in the airport area between Hewes Avenue and Strawberry Road.

The best roadway locations appear to be as follows:

- 1. Courthouse Road to 900 feet east of Washington Avenue The roadway should be on the south bank of Brickyard Bayou.
- 2. Washington Avenue to Hewes Avenue Roadway along south bank.
- 3. Strawberry Road to 34th Street Roadway along north bank.
- 4. 34th Street to 8th Avenue Roadway along south bank.
- 5. 8th Avenue to west side of Bayou View West Subdivision Limited space for construction of roadway in this area because of development on both sides of Brickyard Bayou. The best location is probably along the north bank through Bayou View West Subdivision.
- 6. Between west side of Bayou View West Subdivision and about 400 feet north of 28th Street Roadway along north bank.
- 7. Between 400 feet north of 28th Street and 28th Street Roadway along east bank of Brickyard Bayou.

Cost estimates for both a temporary roadway and permanent roadway are shown in Table No. 5.

DRAINAGE IMPROVEMENT RECOMMENDATIONS


Alternate No. 1, clearing and snagging of channel between Courthouse Road and Hewes Avenue and between Strawberry Road and 28th Street, is the recommended first phase method of drainage improvement for Brickyard Bayou.

A 30 foot wide permanent easement should be acquired along one side of the channel to provide access for clearing and snagging operations and for future channel maintenance. Within this easement the contractor should, at his expense, construct the minimum roadway required to conduct the clearing and snagging operations.

Easements will be required on approximately 67 parcels if the roadway is constructed through Bayou View West Subdivision. About 43 easements will be required if the roadway is constructed along the south bank of Brickyard Bayou across from Bayou View West Subdivision.

On an overall basis, we recommend the following program to solve short term and long term flooding problems in the Brickyard Bayou drainage basin:

- (1) Clearing and Snagging
- (2) Concrete channel improvements in phases from downstream to upstream with available funds (i.e., \$1,250,000/year will complete the concrete channel improvements in approximately four (4) years).

The permit being requested by W.C. Fore Trucking should not be granted as noted in my comments at the hearing. I live near a dirt pit located three blocks from my residence. I have visited my with neighbors who live much closer to the pit, and they constantly complain about Fore Trucking Company vehicles speeding along the streets and the amount of dust they create, have all but destroyed their quality of life and safety.

Vehicles travel this road daily, (see enclosed photo) from early morning to late evening. The neighbors feel helpless to stop the problem because neither the city nor Mr. Fore will control the situation.

At another inactive pit, there is a lot of trash and a dangerous situation for residents. (see enclosed photo) This pit is within 50 feet of a large residential subdivision, and is a breeding area for mosquitoes that might carry the West Nile virus. To allow the situation that exists in the Orange Grove area to be created in the North Gulfport Community, a community already stressed with problems such as flooding, drainage, traffic, safety, and sewer overflow, should not happen.

I recommend the commission visits these areas and observe the current sites being mined, and those proposed to be mined believe they would come to the conclusion that the permit should be denied.



2	Before we begin, I would like to
3	identify some elected officials that I
4	recognize in the audience. Excuse me,
5	Representative Frances Fredericks is here.
6	Councilwoman Ella Holmes-Hines. Senator
7	Deborah Dawkins. And Chris LaGarde is here
8	representing Representative Taylor's office.
9	Whenever you do this, you always risk not
10	seeing someone, so if I have overlooked someone
11	I will be happy to recognize you now. Okay.
12	Thanks. Let's go ahead and get started.
13	Ladies and gentlemen, as I said,
14	I am ready to begin this hearing. I am Jerry
15	Cain, the head of the environmental permits
16	division of the state pollution control office.
17	This hearing by the State Department of
18	Environmental Quality regards the proposed
19	issuance of a wastewater discharge permit and
20	the modification of the mining permit
21	associated with the operation of the W.C. Fore
22	Trucking, Inc. Harreld Pit.
23	This hearing is to receive your
24	comments on any proposed permits and related
25	permitting issues. I want to emphasize that

these are draft permits and were created as a 1 basis for the purpose of discussion and 2 3 evaluation. This hearing follows a review by staff engineers and geologists that has taken 4 5 over six months. 6 At the table with me tonight are 7 Mr. Billy Warden, Mr. Phil Bass, Ms. Michelle Vinson, Mr. Michael Bograd, and Mr. Roy Furrh. 8 All of these staff members and a number of 9 others that participate in the development of 10 11 these draft permits. 12 The decision in these matters will be made by the environmental quality 13 permit board. The permit board is created by 14 Mississippi law for the purpose of issuing or 15 denying under such conditions and limitations 16 17 as it may prescribe environmental protection permits to control or prevent the release of 18 19 contaminants into the air and waters of the 20 state. 21 None of us here are on the permit We are the staff to the permit board. 22 board. 23 The composition of the permit board is established by law. As I said, none of the 24 25 permit board members are here tonight, and I

1	can later this evening, if you care to,
2	identify those positions that compose the
3	permit board, but in an interest of time I
4	think we will go on.
5	As the hearing begins tonight,
6	Mr. Warden of the pollution control staff will
7	briefly describe the draft permits. After Mr.
8	Warden's presentation we will then begin
9	receiving comments.
10	MR. BILLY WARDEN:
11	As Mr. Cain just mentioned, the
12	purpose of this hearing is to take comments
13	from the public regarding the permit
14	application submitted by W.C. Fore Trucking,
15	Incorporated regarding a proposed mining
16	project. The proposed project is located in
17	Gulfport near the intersection of 33rd Street
18	and 34th Avenue and it's referred to as the
19	Harreld Pit.
20	All surface mines in Mississippi
21	that affect four acres or more must obtain a
22	surface mining permit from the Mississippi
23	Environmental Quality Permit Board. In
24	addition, a national pollutant discharge
25	elimination system water permit is also

required for the management of all wastewater 1 associated with mining operations. 2 3 The applicant's property on which 4 the proposed mine is located consists of approximately 112 acres located north of 33rd 5 Street and east of 34th Avenue. 6 The actual mining area is limited to approximately 49 7 acres located on the southern portion of this 8 9 property. 10 Natural drainage from this property flows to two different receiving 11 12 Approximately one half to two-thirds streams. of the property flows to the north into an 13 unnamed tributary of Turkey Creek. 14 The southernmost portion of the property drains to 15 16 the south into an unnamed tributary of 17 Brickyard Bayou. 18 The applicant also owns approximately 40 acres just south of 33rd 19 20 The mining permit application requires Street. 21 the applicant to submit operational and design details describing the method by which the 22 mining will be conducted and how the land will 23 be reclaimed after mining activities have been 24 25 completed.

W.C. Fore Trucking, Incorporated 1 proposes to excavate sand by utilizing a 2 tracked excavator which will load the sand 3 4 directly into trucks. The mining material will then be transported off site primarily to the 5 6 Port Authority property in Gulfport. The 7 mining operation is anticipated to be completed in approximately three years. 8 9 Upon completion the applicant 10 proposes to reclaim the mine as a lake. The banks of the lake will be appropriately sloped 11 12 and all other areas disturbed by the surface mining operation will be graded and planted 13 14 with grass. The mining permit does require 15 that a performance bond be maintained for 16 reclamation costs. The bond will not be fully 17 released until at least two years after reclamation is complete. 18 19 Second permit required of this

operation is a national pollutant discharge elimination system permit, or NPDES permit which regulates both storm water and wastewater associated with mining activities. The storm water is the rainfall which comes into contact with the disturbed areas. And the wastewater

is the groundwater that will be pumped out of 1 2 the excavation during mining operations. The primary water contaminant 3 associated with mining operations is sediment. 4 5 The permit application contains a design which directs all water runoff into sedimentation 6 7 ponds be constructed at the southeast corner of the property so that the sediment will be 8 allowed time to settle before the water is 9 10 discharged off site. The water from the sediment pond is proposed to be piped under 11 33rd Street and then approximately 1500 feet to 12 the southeast where it will be discharged into 13 14 an unnamed tributary of Brickyard Bayou. No discharge from this disturbed area of the 15 operation will be directed towards Turkey 16 Creek. 17

The proposed draft NPDES permit 18 requires that the company implement a storm 19 water pollution prevention plan which includes 20 21 the use of berms, silt fences, hay bales, and 22 other approved best management practices to control storm water runoff. The draft permit 23 also requires that the discharge from the 24 sedimentation pond be sampled and analyzed for 25

biological oxygen demand, total suspended solids, oil and grease, and PH. Sampling and analysis will occur twice per month and reported monthly. The facility must also report the discharge flow rate at the time of sampling.

7 The proposed mining area has been 8 configured to minimize the number of acres of 9 wetlands that will be impacted. The wetlands which are impacted will be excavated only. 10 No filling of wetlands has been proposed, 11 12 therefore, the Corps of Engineers has determined that a wetlands permit will not be 13 required for this project. 14

15 In May of 2003, W.C. Fore 16 Trucking, Incorporated submitted its surface 17 mining permit application to the department. The application was reviewed by the 18 19 department's office of geology staff. The application was determined to be complete and 20 was presented to the environmental quality 21 permit board in June. The permit board granted 22 the surface mining permit, however, it's 23 24 conditioned on the applicant obtaining other 25 environmental permits prior to beginning

operation.

As allowed by state law, an evidentiary hearing was requested regarding the issuance of this permit. The hearing will be conducted by the permit board prior to the initial decision becoming final.

7 Since the surface mining permit was issued, the proposed project has been 8 9 altered including a reduction in the number of 10 acres proposed from 55 to 49, and the submittal of a revised reclamation. An amended 11 application has been submitted to the office of 12 geology. Again, the purpose of this hearing is 13 to receive comments regarding the permit 14 15 actions requested by W.C. Fore, Incorporated, which I just described. All comments received 16 17 here tonight and those received in writing will be thoroughly considered before any 18 recommendation by the staff is made to the 19 environmental quality permit board. 20 Thank you. MEMBER OF THE AUDIENCE: 21 When will the comment hearing be 22 held? 23 MR. JERRY CAIN: 24 25 At the end of this hearing.

6	the week, Friday. Councilman Jenkins, I think

9	comments. Because many people want to comment,
10	we ask that you keep your comments as brief as
11	possible and that you focus on the
12	environmental issues, since that's the subject
13	of this hearing. We will take comments in the
14	order that you registered. We will take first
15	comments of those individuals who indicated
16	they would like to comment on the registration
17	form. After that we will receive comments from
18	anyone who wishes to comment that has not
19	already commented. Finally, we will open the
20	floor to anyone who may want to have additional

12	MR. JERRY CAIN:
13	Just your name.

15	Deborah McGee. And I have in my
16	hand a folder of information I want included in
17	the minutes. And they are one, a May 25th
18	article that was in The Sun Herald titled
19	Gulfport contractor wants to build park. And
20	in that article, I highlighted some areas, I
21	will not read everything in my hand, that's why
22	I'm giving them to you to include. It says
23	that he plans, which is Mr. Fore, to turn the
24	resulting hole after he has mined it into a
25	lake surrounded by a 40-acre park. Fore said

he would install a fence around the property, provide landscaping, and build a pavilion. The city would have to pay for other amenities, such as a tennis court, a ball field, he said. Also, he said he would have little use for the one million dollar property once the dirt is excavated, and he believes the surrounding community would benefit from a park.

9 A hole in the ground, and this is his quote, a hole in the ground doesn't have 10 any value, he said. 11 A park has value. That's 12 in there. On August the 8th, 2003, there was a meeting between Mr. Fore that he presented his 13 ideas of the excavation area to representatives 14 15 of the community, also DEQ was there, the Corps 16 of Engineers, Representative Gene Taylor's 17 office, Trent Lott, and I think Thad Cochran's office was in attendance there. And in that 18 19 meeting the community didn't have anything to 20 say, the only thing we were doing was listening 21 to his presentation because we had not had a conversation with him. 22 And in that, I'm just 23 going to highlight some parts of it. And that 24 was when he presented the plan that he is going to mine 40 acres, and also he said he will turn 25

it into a park, some of the area, and donate it 1 2 to the city. Mr. Fore's plans for the park, he 3 said, was an open-air pavilion, fence will 4 remain around it, surface walking track, and 5 landscaping. Also he said he would provide a 6 7 performance bond to the city. We had questions 8 from the floor that was there. As I say, at the conclusion of that meeting, what we did was 9 took those minutes from the August 8th meeting 10 and had a community meeting on August the 18th. 11 12 In the community meeting we presented to the community Mr. Fore's minutes from the August 13 8th meeting. And from the community meeting 14 15 that was presented, and also Mr. Fore called me 16 on August the 13th to do an addendum to the 17 meeting that he had before our community meeting to say some more things that he would 18 That was he said he is put in the park. 19 willing to put a 40 acre stocked lake, concrete 20 picnic tables, half mile asphalt walking track, 21 a 40 by 80 open pavilion with cover, 22 23 landscaping, and an electrical aerate system to blow air into the water to create a ripple 24 effect so that mosquito eggs won't hatch. 25

Well, in that meeting from the 1 2 community, from this August 8th meeting, his 3 addendum and everything, the community resounded -- unanimously vote to reject the 4 5 mining of the lake in the community. And we did not just say we don't want a lake, we said 6 7 okay, we have to have reasons why we don't want the lake. We said the safety of our children. 8 9 The park will be surrounded by six residential areas, an elementary school, and churches. 10 This facility will not be kept or manned by the 11 city. The City of Gulfport has, through its 12 own admission, can't support the park it 13 currently has -- the parks it currently has. 14 The future of the community, the 15 area will become a haven for crime because the 16 park is wooded and isolated, and to use for an 17 example the Cloud Point Park. It has become a 18 19 crime haven and the residents are trying to get it closed. 20 This project will cause flooding 21 22 in the Meadowpark edition to the City of Health hazards from the dust in the 23 Gulfport. area, allergies, asthma. There is currently no 24 25 infrastructure in the area. Concern about the

water quality after destruction of the wetlands and the water will be redirected to Brickyard Bayou, and the city is currently having a 14 million dollar buyout for some of the areas surrounded by Brickyard Bayou because of flooding. And the six-feet fence that Mr. Fore is proposing to put up is not adequate to secure the lake from children.

9 On September the 3rd we had a 10 community meeting with Mr. Fore, and in that 11 meeting Mr. Fore presented the map that -- of 12 his proposed site. And he talked about the 13 buffer zone, the sloping and everything, so we had various questions to him. 14 We told him, Number 1, this six-foot fence is not adequate, 15 16 make it eight foot. Also, we asked questions 17 and was concerned about the lake being too 18 close to residential areas. It's 100, by Mr. Fore said, it's 1080 feet from the apartments. 19 20 That's too close when you have children. How 21 far is it from 34th Street? I think that's 22 34th Avenue. It's 100 feet. That's a community that's full of people. 23 24 So, also, the park will not be

supervised, will only be supervised by Mr. Fore

as long as he has it. When it goes to the 1 2 city, that's where supervision stops at. So in that we had various concerns to him and also, 3 Jerry, you were there, you explained DEQ's role 4 in this because there were concerns of -- we 5 are concerned about who is going to look after 6 us if we suffer this park and the lake, who is 7 8 going to look after us once the mine is done, 9 the water is left there and the flooding is 10 there?

11 But also I was told that, okay, Deborah, you all don't want the lake. 12 13 The reality is, permits may be granted and you 14 may get a lake. So you need to get above the 15 point of not wanting the lake and discuss what 16 do you want in the area if there is a lake. 17 Well, we come up with a list for that, too, since you asked us, you know, we were asked to 18 19 come up with that.

But in attendance in our zoning and planning meeting, I must say, we have been misled by the city and by Mr. Fore because we attend the council meetings, and the newspaper article that I read, everything says a park could go there eventually after the lake.

Well, in planning we learned the area is zoned industrial and a park is not allowed there. So what are we going to be left with, just a big open lake and no amenities for us if we're stuck with it.

But being obedient, I said, okay, 6 we will come up with some things if we are 7 8 stuck with it. And some of these things were 9 listed he had agreed to, that is a half mile 10 asphalt walking track with three to four 11 benches strategically placed around it. A 40 12 by 80 open pavilion with cover and with men and women bathrooms and a water fountain. At least 13 two barbecue pits, because it's a park, you 14 want to have fun if you got to go there. 15 Α stocked pond to have fishing. Concrete tables 16 and benches. Lighted park area, landscaping, 17 18 playground equipment, fence and swings, a slide 19 for the children. A water spigot close by the barbecue pits for clearance. The park to be 20 21 manned by city employees for safety, and to 22 keep the grounds cleaned. Before Mr. Fore turn 23 the park over to the city to remove the barbed 24 wire from the top of the fence and clear the 25 woods around the lake area so it can be visible

from the park area to deter illegal activity. Install concrete covers to remove water from the area, and for the beauty of it add a fountain in the middle of the pond and give us something decent.

But that's what we were asked to 6 do is if we have a lake to put a park, but we 7 don't want a lake in this area. It is 8 9 detrimental to the community. We have our children's safety at risk. You have trucks 10 that will be passing there constantly. How can 11 the children learn? This school right here, 12 28th Street School is on that -- below level 13 for the no child left behind. They're Level 2. 14 So and we're going to add that extra noise 15 there, they're still going to be left behind 16 some more. So we don't want it. 17

Also, MDOT have had various 18 meetings, many meetings with this community for 19 the north/south connector road coming through 20 Now, with the north/south connector road here. 21 MDOT has talked to my church, St. John Baptist 22 Church, and that surrounding area there they 23 Well, Mr. Fore's 24 are proposing to buy out. project is going to drastically affect that. 25

1	The community can benefit from an MDOT buyout,
2	because the church is older, the community is
3	older, and we don't want to stand in the way of
4	progress, we don't want that reputation.
5	That's why we say okay, the city needs to grow,
6	we will sell out for MDOT.
7	Mr. Fore wants his project for
8	the city to grow again, but who is going to
9	grow? Mr. Fore is going to grow. With MDOT,
10	MDOT, we will benefit from a buyout, from Mr.
11	Fore we will be hampered by a flood out. So
12	say no. We ask you to say no to Mr. Fore's
13	lake. Thank you.
14	MR. JERRY CAIN:
15	Thank you, Ms. McGee.
16	Councilwoman Ella Holmes-Hines.
17	ELLA HOLMES-HINES:
18	Thank you. I also would like to
19	thank Deborah for those comments. I was able
20	to have one of those community meetings where I
21	was in attendance and there was a resounding no
22	to the, I call it a lake, a pond, a hole, a
23	pit. I mean, it has various names that has
24	changed since its inception. When Mr. Fore
25	came before city hall in this discussion of a

park, this is was over a million dollars that 1 2 would be placed in this park, to my 3 understanding. When there was an interview 4 done by the Sun Herald, it indicated that the 5 city would have to do all of these amenities. 6 Well, being a second-term council person, I'm 7 well aware of the budget constraints with the City of Gulfport. And I know very well that we 8 9 are struggling hard to keep the parks that we do have. We are also struggling hard 10 11 financially. So I know for sure that the City of Gulfport is not in a position at this time, 12 nor do we see based on the water rates that are 13 increasing and based on that we increased 14 15 property tax last year that we will be able to 16 only give consideration to this project. From there, listening, and 17 reading, and understanding what this issue is,

reading, and understanding what this issue is, which we will probably have an opportunity to hear this in a full city council discussion in our second meeting of October, we were told at that time that we would have leisure services to come out and to speak with the community. Well, in two or three letters that I wrote, I never received a response nor did the city

leisure services department meet with the citizens that eagerly came to city hall trying to get their voices heard. And in that meeting they had a very hard time trying to allow them an opportunity to say they did not want this permitting process to take place.

7 With that happening, we decided that we would start meeting in little concepts 8 of meeting, but there was no city discussion 9 from leisure services. I do not feel that the 10 city will be able to place a park there. 11 And that's the reason I offered a motion of 12 13 reconsideration to get the vote for 14 Holmes-Hines out of this picture, because I 15 know we can't afford this. From that discussion has gone on 16 17 from planning, my understanding is that they 18 denied it at this time. Zoning, which approved it, and it will then come before city council. 19

20 My understanding is before you, DEQ, get 21 involved in this, you have to have a vote of 22 confidence from the City of Gulfport; is that 23 correct?

MR. JERRY CAIN:

Well, what we have to have is any

permit issued of local approval. 1 ELLA HOLMES-HINES: 2 At this time you do not have 3 local approval based on our planning 4 commission. And I would hope that once that 5 this hearing is taking place, that we could 6 have an opportunity to give you more comments. 7 I was concerned very much when you said that 8 9 your written comment period will be at the end Why is that such a short period? of this week. 10 MR. JERRY CAIN: 11 Actually there's been a notice of 12 30 days, a 30-day period is when traditionally 13 people submit written comments. 14 ELLA HOLMES-HINES: 15 Can you expand that time? 16 MR. JERRY CAIN: 17 Sure I can. 18 ELLA HOLMES-HINES: 19 It would be most helpful to do 20 Because today you gave a written text, that. 21 of course, that was not in the library for 22 public disclosure and so, therefore, those 23 comments that you gave we would like an 24 opportunity to review those and give comments 25

That would be very helpful. on that. 1 But many 2 citizens are here today stating their 3 opposition. I have already gone on the record 4 and the City of Gulfport we speak through our minutes. And Holmes-Hines in the 5 6 reconsideration vote decided that this is not 7 going to be something that is going to benefit 8 the area since I cannot get a leisure service 9 director or a leisure service person to even 10 come in and speak to the citizens that this is 11 impacting. And that's very irregular in the 12 business of the City of Gulfport. They should be able to have access to that director or to 13 14 the mayer to give those comments, as well as myself and the council which they have not been 15 able, outside of hostility, to give those 16 17 comments. So I would hope that you extend that period at least 14 days would be helpful. 18 And 19 we appreciate -- you are giving that acceptance 20 today? MR. JERRY CAIN: 21 22 Yes, ma'am. I'm comfortable with 23 giving you two additional weeks, so that will be 14 days from now, I don't have a calendar. 24

ELLA HOLMES-HINES:

I greatly appreciate that. 1 On your permitting board, how are they chosen? 2 MR. JERRY CAIN: 3 They are, and I can go through 4 5 and tell you who they are, they are heads of agencies -- first of all, they're established 6 7 by statute. And they are heads of agencies identified as having interest in environmental 8 concern. 9 ELLA HOLMES-HINES: 10 Can you give us those. 11 MR. JERRY CAIN: 12 I can tell you. By law the 13 permit board is composed of the Chief of the 14 Bureau of Environmental Health with the State 15 Department of Health, the Director of Wildlife, 16 Fisheries -- the Department of Wildlife, 17 Fisheries and Parks, the Director of the Office 18 of Land and Water Resources within the 19 Department of Environmental Quality, the 20 21 Supervisor of the State Oil and Gas Board, the Director of the Department of Marine Resources, 22 the Director of the Office of Geology in the 23 Department of Environmental Quality, and the 24 Commissioner of Agriculture and Commerce. 25

ELLA HOLMES-HINES:

1

Thank you. The other comment I 2 wanted to make is Brickyard Bayou. I'm 3 concerned about the selection of the two 4 million gallons water per day. Brickyard Bayou 5 is in an area where I, as a representative, 6 7 have an area called Bayou View West. Bayou View West had to be bought out in the tune of 8 18 million dollars because of the flooding in 9 We started at 8th Avenue and then that area. 10 we moved across Hewes Avenue. But one of the 11 things that was most tragic is that that 12 cleanup process of Brickyard Bayou did not 13 14 assist in those homes bought, buyout. We were told that in order to look at leaving those 15residents near Brickyard Bayou, we would need 16 at least 55 million dollars. 17 So I'm concerned now that we have 18 gone through uprooting over 200 families and 19 now we are saying we are still able to 20 discharge two million gallons per day. 21 Now, if I was the federal 22 government and FEMA, I would be looking for 23 some of the money back, because that tells me 24 that maybe we didn't do our homework well 25

enough because it should not be able to accept 1 2 anymore water based on an 18 million dollar 3 buyout, and now here today we are hearing that 4 two million gallons will be placed into this facility. Have you issued any of the concerns 5 about the water being able to take on this type 6 of excess? 7 8 MR. JERRY CAIN: 9 I think what your question is have we considered whether or not two million 10 gallons a day will contribute to flooding, is 11 12 that your question? ELLA HOLMES-HINES: 13 That's correct. 14 15 MR. JERRY CAIN: Two million gallons sounds like a 16 lot of water. 17 ELLA HOLMES-HINES: 18 The reason that we think it is is 19 20 because we just completed an 18 million dollar buyout, that it cannot take anymore water. 21 MR. JERRY CAIN: 22 But when you look at -- and it is 23 24 a lot of water, particularly in your category. 25 But in terms of total volume that goes into a

stream like Brickyard Bayou, it represents a 1 2 small amount of flow that goes in that bayou. What we will do is reopen this issue. 3 ELLA HOLMES-HINES: 4 Thank you. Well, you've made two 5 concessions and I'm very happy, and I will 6 7 yield but I will have more comments, thank you, sir. 8 MR. JERRY CAIN: 9 I appreciate the decorum 10 everybody is showing, but we have a lot of 11 speakers so if we could limit our thoughts so 12 that we could go on and get out of here before 13 tomorrow. Mr. Rip Daniels. 14 15 **RIP DANIELS:** I would like to yield right now 16 to the folks in the area. I will speak later. 17 I know they want to speak. 18 MR. JERRY CAIN: 19 Representative Frances 20 Fredericks. 21 **REPRESENTATIVE FRANCES FREDERICKS:** 22 Thank you, so very much. I live 23 in the area, I've been living in the area since 24 I'm in walking distance of the proposed 1966. 25

1 park. I was present when we went before the 2 zoning board and the planning board. The zoning board denied us and favored Mr. Fore. 3 4 The planning board denied Mr. Fore and favored 5 us, and I do have copies of that for you. 6 I also have copies to let you see 7 that this area is not zoned for a park. We have been misled. We cannot have a park there, 8 9 it would have to be rezoned. I would like to 10 talk to you for just a minute about the location of the proposed pit. 11 You are going to be mining an 12 13 area parallel to 34th Avenue. If there is 112 14 acres of land, you do not have to mine that in 15 our face. That will put that pit directly in front of Greater Mount Rest Church and all of 16 17 the children who walk up and down that area to school would have to pass that pit which would 18 be very enticing to the children going up and 19 down that area. 20 21 When you look at this area, you are looking at six residential areas. 22 All have a number of children who attend this school and 23 24 who has to pass up and down this road. When we look at this area, also, and you're talking 25

about digging out there for three years, 25 1 2 feet deep, 48 acres wide, that's going to be a 3 lot of dust and trash in our homes. 4 At the same time, we are talking 5 about a port road being built. MDOT is going to come through this same area putting a 6 highway to take the 18 wheelers off of 49 and 7 place them through our area going to Canal Road 8 9 and up to I-10. That's still going to be a lot 10 of traffic, a lot of trucks, a lot of danger for our children that we can't do nothing about 11 in the construction phase. 12 So I'm telling you, I'm speaking 13 against this project. I do not want it. 14 Ι don't think it's necessary, and I will 15 challenge any of you to show me an area in the 16 State of Mississippi where this type mining has 17 18 gone on in a residential area. You say to me that this is surface mining and I will be the 19 first to tell you, I tell Rose every day, I 20 know nothing about the environment, but when 21 you go 25 feet deep, I think you are a little 22 bit below the surface, and I have a problem 23 with that. 24 25 When we look at two million

gallons of water, I challenge any of you to 1 2 walk out of here and go and follow that road 3 around, that ditch around the railroad to go to Brickyard Bayou, there's not a single ditch, 4 5 and they are ditches, sir, there's not a single ditch in this area can carry that much water 6 7 per month, and we're talking about doing it per day, two million gallons of water per day. 8 We 9 cannot handle it. Every home in the Rosalyn 10 yard will flood, my church will flood, all the churches down this road will flood. We don't 11 have any place for that much water to go. 12 When you hear that Brickyard Bayou has been dug 13 out, I challenge you and anybody that says they 14 dug it out or knows where it was dug, when it 15 was dug or how it was dug, to go look today, 16 it's eroding. Go look at it. The reason I 17 know, I went, it's eroding. And if we are 18 going to put that much water in it, it's not 19 going to help things at all. 20 And I'm asking you to please look 21 To look at this 22 very hard at this project. project when you say we are going to give you 23 something, we are going to give you a park. Ι 24

We don't need a park. 1 this area. I also 2 challenge the fact and want to know the answer 3 to when we started out you told me one hole was going to be out there, and now I hear there's 4 going to be three holes out there. 5 So I would 6 like to know how many holes are going to be out 7 there, how are they going to be left, and when they're going to be left, and if we're talking 8 9 about three years, that's a long time. MDOT has not given us a time line. 10 But MDOT is going to give us something for their stay. 11 From Mr. Fore we get a hole, and I think we 12 need more than that if you are going to put 13 14 that type of problem on us. So I'm asking you to look at the 15 hazards, to look at the danger to our children, 16 to look at the health hazard to the people 17 18 living in this area, and please deny this 19 permit. MR. JERRY CAIN: 20 Thank you, Ms. Frederick. 21 Eloise Frederick. 22 Let me apologize for the temperature, apparently this 23 24 is set someplace else and we can't control it. 25 So if it gets hot, feel free to take off your

jacket.

3	Good evening. We as the
4	community have spoke as a body and said we do
5	not want a pond nor a park in our community.

JAMES HARRIS:

My name Is James Harris. I want 12 to ask are there wetlands on this property and 13 how will they be protected? Please deny this 14 15 permit. 28th Elementary School is one of our most beloved schools. We are concerned about 16 the four years that trucks will be interrupting 17 their studies and potential safety issues of 18 our children. Please deny this permit. 19 Appreciate that. 20

MR. JERRY CAIN:

To answer your question, there are seven acres of wetland that are within the mining permit, and those seven acres have been shown to the Corps of Engineers. Since there

17	is going to allow the pollutants, it's the size
18	of the pond that's going to allow the
19	pollutants to precipitate out and theoretically
20	clean water comes out of that pond. It seems
21	to me kind of convenient that we've gone down
22	to 49 acres which has taken us one acre below
23	the threshold, and so I do have some concerns
24	about that.
25	My concern being I don't I

	question the size of that settling pond. Is it
1	-
2	going to clean the water? Is it of an adequate
3	size that allows the dirty water to stay in it
4	for a long enough time? And again, I just want
5	to repeat, it seems very convenient to me that
6	49 acres, I'm sure y'all are more familiar than
7	me about that. But I would like y'all, when
8	you present this to the permit board, to raise
9	that issue. To me they should be held to the
10	standard of a 50-acre pond because they are so
11	close and initially did ask for 55 acres. That
12	can logically only be the reason that they
13	dropped it down to that size is my inference.
14	So on that, I'm also wondering
15	are there going to be aquatic shelves in that
16	sedimentation pond which increase the
17	efficiency of that type of pond, if you have an
18	aquatic shelf. So that's on the ability of
19	that pond to clean the water as it goes into
20	the ditches that are going to carry all of this
21	two million gallons to Brickyard Bayou.
22	My next question is what I'm
23	actually much more concerned about, and that is
24	flooding. And with two million gallons a day,
25	as opposed to considering that much water going

1	into Brickyard Bayou and then flowing into
2	Bernard Bayou, I think that that water should
3	be considered on its impact to the ditches
4	which it will be flowing through every day, an
5	additional two million gallons constantly
6	flowing. If these ditches already have two
7	million gallons in them, then their ability to
8	protect this neighborhood from flooding, which
9	is basically what they're there for, is
10	obviously reduced. So I think that that two
11	million gallons should be looked at in the
12	ditches, not in the bayou, because I'm sure
13	it's fairly able to handle that volume. I
14	don't believe the ditches are.
15	On the flooding issue I know the
16	question I have is as you are introducing two
17	million gallons flowing down the ditches to
18	Brickyard Bayou and out to Bernard, on the
19	Coast here we have the worst storm event we
20	can have is when we have a large tropical storm
21	come in and high tide. This creates tidal
22	flooding. In other words, as opposed to the
23	water flowing to the gulf of to the Sound,
24	the water actually is forced the other way.
25	But once you start digging this pit and start

this engineering and process, these two million gallons are going to be produced. And so I'm very concerned that they're not going to be able to get out, there is just no way during those flooding events, during those storm events, which is what causes flood. So, again, I would like close scrutiny to be put on that to the tidal flooding issue in those ditches.

9 And to keep it brief, the last 10 thing I would like to look at is the economics of this, because I think that y'all do look at 11 the economic benefit versus the environmental 12 impact of this. And to me, economic benefit is 13 negligible for the community, and as a matter 14 15 of fact it's negative. You have folks who live here in Gulfport, we have a nice community, we 16 have schools and homes, residential areas have 17 18 been established for a long time. And now you 19 are going to have large amounts of heavy truck 20 traffic, you are going to have some loud heavy equipment, heavy pumps being worked. 21 This is going to makes this area less attractive to 22 live in for those four years, or maybe three, 23 but the four years is what I was told the 24 project will go on. So to me I see a very 25

negative economic benefit to everyone in the community, and a sole economic benefit, of course, going to the owner with the mining operation.

And my final point is again on 5 economics. It's once this is completed by the 6 owner's admission, the property is basically 7 8 worthless. So once this activity occurs, then 9 whatever else could have been cited there, whatever else value that land could be used for 10 will be gone. We'll get four years of activity 11 and then zero benefit forever into the future. 12 As well, of course, a great deal of cost to the 13 City of Gulfport to maintain this property. 14 So thank you. 15 MR. JERRY CAIN: 16 17 Ms. Arlene Murphy. **ARLENE MURPHY:** 18

19 Good evening. I'm a member of 20 Greater Mount Rest which sits right across from 21 the proposed project you are going to try to 22 build and we are going to try to not get you to 23 build it. Praise God. But anyway, I am 24 opposed to it because of the safety concerns. 25 We do have a large youth department in our

1	church which sits directly across from this
2	project, and our children play out there. In
3	fact, we just had a picnic and we chose, as a
4	body, to have a picnic at a park that did not
5	have a pond, a water, or anything for the
6	safety of the children. Now do you think if
7	we've done that for the children, do you think
8	we want them to have a forever pond or ditch or
9	pit right across from the church? Just think
10	about that. Give it some serious thought.
11	So I'm opposed to this because of
12	safety concerns, the dangers to the children,
13	the proposed community, and everybody that's
14	here tonight.
15	MR. JERRY CAIN:
16	Before I call the next person,
17	let me maybe clarify something to make sure we
18	understand. Department of Environmental
19	Quality is neither a proponent or opponent. We
20	are not vying for the pit. We are not trying
21	to stop the pit. We are trying to apply the
22	rules and regulations of the state to the
23	requested activity. And part of that process
24	is to get public information and input into the
25	record so it can be considered. So please

understand we are neither a proponent or 1 2 opponent of this development. 3 Ms. Martha Magee. Thank you. Okay. I think this says coach -- I'm not sure 4 what it says. 625 24th street, Gulfport. 5 MR. STEPNEY: 6 That's me. 7 I'm going to yield to some of the parent, but I want to make one 8 9 statement and I'm going to come back later. 10 But I want to yield to some of the parents here that's going to affect them because they have 11 children in this area, but I will come back 12 13 later. We think the issue of water 6 quality going into the streams with the testing 7 and monitoring, we think other things should be 8 tested and monitored for just besides PH. We 9 know there is no numerical classification on 10 turbidity of water. If you don't have one 11 established, it needs to be. We understand 12 that most of the waters in this particular area 13 are on the impaired water bodies list. DEO is 14 working to try to establish some CMDLs. Ι 15 don't know if there is one on Brickyard Bayou. 16 I know on Bernard Bayou and some of the other 17 ones turbidity has been a problem. 18

19 Through the recent hearings on 20 DEQ they are trying to de-list the waters in 21 this area. They've been after that for years 22 due to the slow down in economic development. 23 But we have consent decree with EPA and DEQ, we 24 need these waters cleaned up before we permit 25 anymore storm water discharge to continue to

10	issue of polluted water, storm water runoff in
11	a very strict manner. Thank you.
12	MR. JERRY CAIN:
13	Mr. Calvin Jackson.
14	CALVIN JACKSON:
15	Good evening. I am really
16	concerned because I had some comments the other
17	night on this. When you are talking about
18	running that water to Turkey Creek, that's what
19	they said, and that's almost a mile from where
20	the dredging is going to be. And then you are
21	going to Brickyard Bayou. We won't have no
22	wild life within the water. The fish will be
23	gone in Turkey Creek. The fish will be gone in

25	Thank you, Mr. Cain, and the

other members who are here. I'm Deborah 1 I'm a state senator for this area, Dawkins. 2 District 48. I'm vice-chair of the Senate 3 Environmental Committee, and I'm also on the 4 public health committee, and I would argue this 5 is an issue that concerns both of us. Some 6 people have a problem making that connection. 7 And there are health impacts I think that would 8 be associated with this project if it were 9 permitted. However, before I go into that, I 10 know it's not customary to ask questions at 11 these meetings, but this -- I only became aware 12 of this meeting anecdotally. I'm sure that the 13 department advertised it properly, I have no 14 doubt of that, but it must have been in the 15 legal section. 16 MR. JERRY CAIN: 17 First off, you can Yes, ma'am. 18 certainly ask questions and we will try to 19 answer them if we have an answer. We were in 20 direct contact with a lot of community leaders, 21 and I also understand that they made some 22 sorted efforts to get people to be aware of 23 this meeting. And, in fact, to this audience 24 we should mention that there was notice. 25

1	SENATOR DEBORAH DAWKINS:
2	I think that this audience is an
3	indication that the people in the community got
4	notice, but and that you tell me that there
5	was legal notice that was given in the legals,
6	but I would argue once again as I often have to
7	the department, that it would be very useful to

9	of ad that's not in the legals.

23	SENATOR DEBORAH DAWKINS:
24	So just for future record, I
25	would like to be notified whenever there is

1	anything to do with this proposed application,
2	whether it be geology, water quality, or
3	anything else. And I'm sure Representative
4	Fredericks would as we both represent this area
5	at the state level. And I think maybe some of
6	your remarks, and I'm sure you didn't mean to
7	do this, Mr. Cain, but some of your remarks
8	about the permit board might have been
9	misleading. Yes, by statute the directors of
10	those agencies are appointed to the permit
11	board, but you all know here when was the last
12	time you saw those directors there? They never
13	come to those meetings.
14	MR. JERRY CAIN:
15	They send their designee.
16	SENATOR DEBORAH DAWKINS:
17	As they always do.
18	MR. JERRY CAIN:
19	That is
20	SENATOR DEBORAH DAWKINS:
21	Well, I've never seen any of the
22	directors there and I've been going seven or
23	eight years. So if you could provide to the
24	people that you have been providing information
25	the names and addresses of all the members who

1	are the designees at the permit board I think
2	that would be very useful to the community so
3	they can communicate with them.
4	MR. JERRY CAIN:
5	Yes, ma'am, we can.
6	SENATOR DEBORAH DAWKINS:
7	With regards to the surface
8	mining, and I think the comments about that
9	were very pertinent. But I was interested when
10	I went to one of the meetings, which I also
11	found out about anecdotally, that on the agenda
12	this was listed as what I guess it is, a strip
13	mine. And although we statutorily call strip
14	mining in Mississippi surface mining, as
15	Representative Fredericks noted, I don't think
16	technically in my opinion something that's 25
17	feet deep qualifies as a surface mine, it's a
18	strip mine. But, okay, just for the sake of
19	argument let's call it a surface mine. I don't
20	know of any other community in Gulfport where a
21	strip mine would be allowed this close to a
22	residential community.
23	Now, the designees on the permit
24	board are going to read this document and they
25	don't know Gulfport like I know Gulfport and

1 like the people here know Gulfport. But there 2 is no other community in the city, maybe up and down the Coast, where a strip mine would be 3 allowed as close to a school, to churches, and 4 5 let me just tell you something about this school, this is a wonderful school. 6 Until I was elected to office I had never spent any 7 time here. But this is a wonderful school, and 8 it provides not only service to the students, 9 10 but a lot of services to the community. And to impact it negatively in any way from a health 11 aspect, environmental aspects, or any other 12 13 ways, the permit board will not be doing a service that it is supposed to do to the 14 15 community.

I appreciate your extension of 16 the comment period, that's not an uncommon 17 thing, and I think that's the least that could 18 19 be offered to the folks here tonight. One thing that I would like to see addressed by 20 that permit applicant is what are the intended 21 I do not -- I haven't seen hours of operation? 22 the permit application, I probably won't have a 23 I probably won't have a chance to read it. 24 25 chance to deal with this again until it goes

before the permit board in Jackson, which I 1 2 promise you I will be there. But the hours of 3 operation should and must be addressed. This is a residential community and we need to know, 4 5 you know, are they planning to operate around 6 the clock six to six, ten to five, what is 7 their intent. 8 Also, Mr. Cain, I think by statute there are a lot of considerations, 9 10 archives and history should look at this community. This is a very historic community. 11 12 It's one of the first African American 13 communities in the State of Mississippi, and 14 archives and history should evaluate it as part of this permit application. 15 I'm also concerned about the 16 17 roads. If anyone thinks the State of 18 Mississippi can afford to keep up this road or 19 expand it or anything else they are sadly 20 mistaken in this year. 21 I don't know from the permit application, as I haven't seen it, if wildlife 22 23 -- if the Department of Wildlife has fully evaluated it. I've seen marine resources who 24 25 has evaluated what's going to be happening with

the impact to Brickyard Bayou. 1 I assume when 2 you put two million of freshwater a day into brackish water that it changes the salinity 3 4 somewhat, although I'm not a water quality 5 expert. I'm going to yield to some of the folks who are here tonight who live in the 6 7 community, but I do represent the community and I will follow this all the way through. 8 Thank 9 you. MR. JERRY CAIN: 10 Mr. Fore, would you like to speak 11 to the hours of operation? 12 W.C. FORE: 13 Approximately nine to ten hours a 14 15 day. MR. JERRY CAIN: 16 17 Mr. Fore said approximately nine 18 to ten hours a day. MEMBER OF THE AUDIENCE: 19 Too long. 20 MEMBER OF THE AUDIENCE: 21 He said something different or 22 23 his lawyer did at the last meeting. MR. JERRY CAIN: 24 Ms. Rose Johnson. 25

2	Hi, thank you very much. I'm
3	Rose Johnson. I am state chair of Sierra Club.
4	Mr. Fore owns the property, and ordinarily it
5	would be okay for him to do what he wants on
6	his property, but unfortunately, in this case,
7	the impacts of the proposed dirt pit would
8	significantly impact other people's property.
9	Sierra club has great concerns about water
10	quality, and there are also concerns about the
11	proposed dirt pit would create a blight to the
12	community. We are also concerned about the
13	possibility of wetlands destructions, although
14	you say that it won't affect the wetlands, but
15	we want this to go on the record. Wetlands
16	have a significant value in filtering ground
17	water. This project would pump two million
18	gallons of water a day into Brickyard Bayou,
19	which is an impaired water body.
20	We have noticed in the storm
21	water permit that there are only limits set for
22	total suspended solids in the permit. We want
23	to know what's in the water that's going to be
24	discharged into the bayou? There could be
25	pollutants and contaminants that could harm the

birds, the fish, the shrimp, the crabs, and other aquatic life, or even cause them to leave. The seafood industry is very important to our economy.

Because of this proposed dirt pit 5 location and the size, the African American 6 residents are concerned about the increasing 7 flooding from the on-site sediment pond after a 8 heavy rainfall. 24 clarify something. I did not say there would25 be no wetlands destroyed. What I did say was

there are seven acres of wetlands that will be 1 within the pit. If that's excavated, those 2 3 wetlands will be destroyed, certainly. What I told you was the Corps of Engineers says it 4 doesn't require a permit because under the 5 regulations there is no fill. I just wanted to 6 clarify that. 7 ROSE JOHNSON: 8 Thank you very much, we will be 9 watching. 10 MR. JERRY CAIN: 11 Mr. Booker Natson; is that right? 12 BOOKER NATSON: 13 Yes, sir. My name is Booker 14 Natson, and I have a couple of requests that I 15 would like to make if I could. 1 I think it might be worthwhile to reiterate what I said earlier about the 2 3 process. And this process, as I said, is for 4 the purpose of gathering information and 5 getting communities, the public's concerns 6 about this. We are creating a verbatim record 7 by the court reporter. Everything that's said here, everything that's presented, everything 8 that's presented between now and 14 days will 9 10 be presented to each and every permit board 11 member, verbatim. Verbatim. So I just want to 12 make sure that everybody understands that. 13 Because that's really the whole purpose of this meeting is to make sure that this information 14 15 gets to the permit board so that they can have it all to consider as they make a decision. 16 17 Now, in regards to who the permit board members are. JERRY CAIN: 12 Fairley, I'm sorry. 13 MARCEL FAIRLEY: 14 15 Good evening. I own a house in 16 the area, and my daughter lives in that house, and she have a three year old. 17 I do not want that pit. I would like for my granddaughter to 18 be able to go to 28th Street School when she 19 becomes kindergarten, but I do not want that 20 pit for her safety. 21 MR. JERRY CAIN: 22 Is it Edie or Eddie Potts? 23 Russell Boulevard. Elizabeth Potts? 24 ELIZABETH POTTS: 25

1 I just want to say good evening And I was listening to what you 2 everybody. were saying, it's like what you are saying and 3 what we're saying, it doesn't matter because 4 5 you are planning to do what you want to do Now, if it was in your backyard, you 6 anyway. wouldn't want it there either. So now I'm just 7 going to say what I feel because I want to 8 think it's just because y'all come in here and 9 want to take over, do what you want to do, I 10 don't think it's right. 11 Now, I'm going to say it, and 12 like you say, we will get papers back from 13 different things and all of that, but you talk 14 like you are planning to carry on while we're 15 waiting for the papers. So we don't need that. 16 So I didn't say it, I'm just going to say it, 17 because it's not right. Let somebody come in 18 19 your yard and root up where you live and put a big lake there for the kids and things to fall 20 in and get hurt and all of this stuff. 21 Because, see, I don't live down here, but I'm 22 still a part of this. I live a little bit 23 further up the street, but the same thing 24 25 happens to them happens to me whenever there's

a big rain.
MR. JERRY CAIN:
Eugene Hawthorne. Ms. Vertie
Marie Bradley? Ms. Dorothy Wilson? Ms. Carla
Wilson? I said Carla, but it may be Carela
Wilson.
CARELA WILSON:
My name is Carela Wilson, and
I've been here in Gulfport ever since 1958 and
we have had floods. In our floods we lose
things and when storms come we lose things.
And now if this pond be built we sure enough
going to lose things. We're going to lose our
children, and maybe some of us. See, it's
danger. Main thing need building is some
churches to get people's souls saved to go to
heaven. Do that. We will be pleased and God
at our side, not something here to take
people's lives. And if someone be took, won't
even be have time to look up to God ask God
forgiveness. The children won't live to ask
God for forgiveness to go to heaven. That's
what needs to be, is churches. Go around
getting souls saved. He will be pleased in
God's eyesight. And the thing that going on

now, the devil be trying to take over. 1 2 Because he say coming through to destroy and to So that's -- somebody got to wake up, 3 kill. shake up, read the Bible and pray and let God 4 5 lead them what to do, not take on to us, 6 because we are nothing without Christ. We are 7 nothing. Things we do, it's not pleasing 8 Christ. Let him lead, let him guide you. And 9 you will be live right. 10 MR. JERRY CAIN: I hope I have this right, 11 Reverend Laborde; is that right? 12 **REVEREND** LaBORDE: 13 I'm Reverend Oriel LaBorde. The 14 15 first thing I would like to say, we don't want this in the community. Number 2, it's not 16 17 environmentally right. You said that Department of Environmental Protection are 18 sitting on the board to decide this permit. 19 You said that the zoning commission sat on the 20 Wildlife and Fisheries, nothing is 21 board. mentioned of those doing anything about the 22 23 fishery and the wildlife in the lake when it's finished. The environmental, forget it, they 24 25 are totally out of sync. Now when you are

building this thing, which is going to take 1 three years or four years, you are going to be 2 3 having large amount of trucks. There is going 4 to be loud noises that is going to go above the decibel, the allowable decibels for noise 5 pollution definitely. Churches won't be able 6 to hold services, in your home you won't be 7 able to have conversations, then you end up 8 9 with dust pollution. There is no way you are going to be able to -- in a dirt without on 400 10 11 acres without the whole community is going to be filled with dust. Everything is going to be 12 covered with dust. Our cars are going to be 13 covered with dust. Our houses are going to be 14 covered with dust. Our church is going to be 15 covered with dust, we are going to be covered 16 with dust. 17

18 What about the people who has different respiratory problems. 19 There are lot of people with respiratory problems has to be 20 considered. Then the next thing is you are 21 22 going to put -- you have water. A large body 23 of water settling, settling, it breed on --24 Number one, it's no good. That water becomes 25 stagnated, it becomes stinks, and it forms

algae, all these different things form into the 1 2 water. It creates a -- it changes the 3 environmental imbalance in the area, not only water area, but around the area. All of that 4 5 changes. Now during our salvation, during the working period, water is going to be drained 6 7 off to where that's going to the different Now when this water drains, yes, there 8 areas. is one main tributary that's running, but there 9 10 are side streams. These side streams, they are settling holes, breeding holes for mosquitos, 11 not only mosquitos, but snakes, all these 12 different things have to be taken into 13 consideration in granting a permit to do such a 14 You have allowed -- this is a work. 15 residential area close to one of our main 16 highway, our main thoroughfare, which is 49. 49 17 18 on the highway map is listed as a main highway. 19 It's not a small highway. It goes right through town. And you have a large body of 20 water sitting with no protection whatsoever. 21 22 You are just creating danger. You have school areas, we have the children around, and you 23 24 have not given us anything concrete, concrete as to when you are through doing your work with 25

this large body of water sitting here. 1 Now, you supposed to have fenced this water as when 2 3 they build lakes, you know, they build the dams, they put the big large fences around 4 these dams, they have security protection, we 5 wouldn't have any of that. It would be a large 6 -- a big hole sitting there. The bank of this 7 you say you are going to build it and you are 8 going to slope the bank, you may put some 9 landscaping. After a while erosion takes 10 If you go to walk on that walkway that 11 place. they put around the edges of that lake, not 12 13 only the children slipping, but maybe I may slip into there. I may tend to walk on there 14 or walk there and I may slip into that lake. 15 That's one too many. 16 The other problem that I have,

17 the other concern I have is the flooding. This 18 19 area floods. Two years ago we were going to have the Baptist Seminary Conference here at 20 St. Johns. We couldn't have it that same year. 21 It was no major rain, it was just a little 22 We couldn't have it, the place was 23 storm. 24 flooded. We have to go somewhere else. Now 25 you are putting a lake, 49 acres, with all this

water when the rain comes or something, even 1 2 though you build an embankment, that water 3 rises, erodes all the side of the embankment. 4 The next thing you know our house won't be 5 flooded, they will be washed away. I'm speaking as a civil engineer who knows what I'm 6 7 talking about, and environmental concerns. And we got to -- he has left, he has raised a 8 9 concern of sediments in the water. When you 10 build the lake after you have built this thing 11 and you have it, all the water settles on the There are sediments settled inside, bottom. 12 all the dirt and thing that comes and settles 13 on the bottom of that. There is a lot of dirty 14 water that settles there, but you have to give 15 that water enough time to settle itself so that 16 the clearer water can drain off. 17 Now, is there any allowance made 18 There are no allowance made 19 for these things? So I would say emphatically, 20 for these things.

it does not meet the environmental quality, wildlife and fisheries haven't explained themselves as to what they're going to do. Are they going to put some fish in there? Are they going to do different things to keep the

23	and someone making a involved decision. If
24	this board make a decision other than what this

3	make a decision. It's very important, the ones
4	we speaking to here, even though the board is
5	not here. It's very important you take this
6	information back to them in the same way that
7	it have been given to you, because if they make
8	any other decision besides deny this permit,
9	they are immoral, they are wrong, and there is
10	no justice and no cause.
11	MR. JERRY CAIN:
12	Mr. Joshua Anderson. Joshua
13	Anderson. Mr. Mark Lee.
14	MARK LEE:
15	Good evening. My name is Mark
16	Lee and I'm a resident here in the City of
17	Gulfport, and I'm also a member of the Anointed
18	Temple Church of God located right down the
19	street here on behind the trucking company.
20	We are very concerned about this particular
21	project that is being taking place in our city.
22	And our residents have already been spoken and
23	they've been said many, many times here
24	tonight, the reason we don't want this project
25	in our community. My question to the board is,

1	why from time to time you continuously come
2	into the black folks' community and bring
3	problems?
4	MR. JERRY CAIN:
5	Mr. William Young. Mr. Young.
6	WILLIAM YOUNG:
7	I yield. I yield my time, that's
8	my pastor over there to speak.
9	MR. JERRY CAIN:
10	Mrs. Sammie Gray.
11	SAMMIE GRAY:
12	Good evening. My name is Sammie
13	Gray, and my question is strictly to DEQ and I
14	would like to know what has the DEQ said about
15	the state tolls crossing this property, and how
16	far above the water level is this. And to Mr.
17	Fore I would also like to say, Mr. Fore, we
18	live in this neighborhood and it's ridiculous,
19	not just you, but anybody who wants to do
20	anything comes to north Gulfport or any black
21	section of our community and just throw
22	something at us. Now, had this been my company
23	and I went behind Bayou View, I don't think I
24	would have even gotten an application. So I
25	don't think it's right for you all to just do

1 whatever that you want to do when it comes to 2 our neighborhood. And you won't develop it, 3 you won't clean it up, we can't get -- we're overcharged taxes, we're flooding now, we can't 4 afford flood insurance, I mean, I live right 5 around the corner here. My grand babies stand 6 7 out here mornings right here to walk to school. Now you talk about a truck passing by. 8 My daughter got to get up at five to get kids 9 ready, but now you got a truck going to run 10 down the street, so I don't think we even 11 should be considering this because this does 12 not happen in your neighborhood, you won't let 13 it happen at Swan Lake, you won't let it happen 14 15 at wherever, but you want to do it in our neighborhood. If you wanted this property, 16 come out here with some real money, talk to 17 these people, and fix it up so we can leave our 18 house where we pay \$65,000 taxes on \$30,000 19 homes, which we can only sell for 20,000. 20 Now you want to come in here and 21 22 put a big pit. This is not right. This is not And there is no concern given to this 23 right. community at all, whether you be black, white, 24 Asian, or whatsoever, we're not even being 25

considered as human beings the way these people 1 are treating us. That's for the city all the 2 way back to Jackson. I thank you, sir. 3 MR. JERRY CAIN: 4 Ms. Gray, if I may, at the 5 beginning, and I did know understand what you 6 said, you asked what about the state tolls, 7 T-O-L-L-S? 8 SAMMIE GRAY: 9 Tolls crossing this property. 10 The other one was how far above 11 the water table is this project? 12 MR. JERRY CAIN: 13 The water table, as I understand 14 it, is three to five feet below the surface. 15 Three to five feet below the surface. 16 MEMBER OF THE AUDIENCE: 17 What is the elevation right now? 18 MR. JERRY CAIN: 19 I don't know what the ground 20 elevation is. We have that in a file. I don't 21 I do know that the personally know it. 22 groundwater is three to five feet below the 23 surface I understand. Dr. Travis Anderson? 24 TRAVIS ANDERSON: 25

I'm a pastor in this area, and 1 did pastor over here, but I'm a pastor in 2 Gulfport, and what I would like to know is, who 3 is going to pay for all this water? The city 4 is half broke now, if they've got money to pay 5 for this, I would like for them to give me some 6 of my money back. 7 MR. JERRY CAIN: 8 Is your question who is going to 9 10 pay --TRAVIS ANDERSON: 11 This two million gallons of water 12 a day going to cost money? 13 MR. JERRY CAIN: 14 This is not water that comes from 15 the tap or from a pipe, this is water that is 16 produced from the groundwater. As I said, 17 that's three to five feet below the surface, so 18 when you are digging a maximum of 25 feet, 19 which this project is for, so you are going to 20 hit groundwater three to five feet below. So 21 it's going to produce water. And to be able to 22 mine that water will have to be discharged. 23 TRAVIS ANDERSON: 24 Next question I have, why are 25

these projects, as someone else has stated, 1 always coming to the black community? Is there 2 another area other than our area that some 3 holes could be dug, and if there are, why 4 Thirdly, it's good aren't they being pursued? 5 for all of us to be here, but it would be 6 better for us to call 60 Minutes or PrimeTime, 7 This is worse than the worst Dateline, CNN. 8 This is a joke that should never nightmare. 9 I'm happy that have been told. I'm opposed. 10 all of these folks showed up. I hope that they 11 go home, call their different representatives, 12 call 60 Minutes, get on the computer and send 13 some e-mails, maybe we can get some real crowds 14 down here. I think what has happened here is I 15 think you all have stirred up some folks that 16 probably you shouldn't have stirred up. Ι 17 don't think it's going to get no better. Ι 18 think it's going to get a lot worse. And my 19 suggestion would be to the rest of our friends 20 and neighbors is we all bus folks into the next 21 meeting and we all make sure that we get some 22 cameras that's going to stay throughout the 23 meeting and make sure there's some from out of 24 I think folks out of the State of town. 25

Mississippi need to know some of the things 1 we're trying to do to some of our 2 neighborhoods. It's ridiculous. 3 But we're still in the year 2003, 4 what we're still trying to do and pull off in 5 our communities. Snakes and everything else is 6 going to be coming out of there. Who is going 7 to pay for the first child that drowns in that 8 If Mr. Fore would want to make some water? 9 money, why don't he insure that if anything 10 happen, any disaster, any homes flood, any 11 homes washed away, I know this man, anybody, we 12 ought to ask him who is going to pay for this? 13 Is he going to pay for it, or you all, the 14 board that's going to pass this, are they going 15 to have some insurance in case, listen, we're 16 going to do it anyway, but what we're going to 17 do, we're going to be responsible if any child 18 gets drowned in that water, we're going to make 19 sure that family never works again, never have 20 to live in this community. This is a 21 ridiculous act. And I don't know about the 22 other, I think everybody -- I voice the 23 sentiment of everybody, we're outraged. 24 MR. JERRY CAIN: 25

10	there any other dirt pits located within
11	residential areas, and I'm quite sure you know
12	where they are, here in Gulfport.
13	Now, in Orange Grove about three
14	blocks from my house is a dirt pit. And I want
15	to tell you that these dirt pits were put there
16	back when the county, when Orange Grove was in
17	the county. However, they back there, and
18	there's a lot of holes back there. And I think
19	if anybody here would go up there and look at
20	these dirt holes, you wouldn't have to stand
21	around and think long about what the city need
22	to be made about putting a hole in this
23	community. Now what's interesting about these
24	holes, they back up to one of these Wildwood
25	Subdivision, and it's one straight large drop

	and the fast hothing but ground. The
2	kids go over there and play and they've had a
3	lot of incidents. As a matter of fact they had
4	a kid get killed over there on a four wheeler.
5	They had a kid get drowned over there in the
6	lake. And they always having problems, and the
7	residents where these trucks go in and bring
8	out dirt, which happens to be one of Mr. Fore's

13	real serious problem in Gulfport, it's kind of
14	corrupt, you know. Our elected officials down
15	here only don't care about the citizens, only
16	about the dollars. So when they failed last

	week, or week before last to get approval from

20	happen. I've been watching for eight years.

There is no 20 trust here for the government, I can tell you 21 that right now. But to go back and talk about 22 23 the dirt pits that are located over in Orange Grove, consider what you are going to do right 24 here in this community which is a much larger 25

area. Orange Grove where the pits are all kind 1 2 of back in the back, but they all still have to come through the residential area. Here you 3 are putting it right smack dab of all these 4 people, kids, schools, and churches. 5 Doesn't make sense. 6 MR. JERRY CAIN: 7 8 I want to make sure I know where 9 this pit is you are talking about. In the Orange Grove community is near Wildwood 10 Subdivision. 11 12 WALTER THOMAS: Ask Mr. Fore to give you the 13 address, sir. It's on Ladner Road where it is, 14 15 but Mr. Fore can tell you exactly where it. MR. JERRY CAIN: 16 You said it was --17 W.C. FORE: 18 Jerry, I don't own the pit over 19 there against Wildwood. 20 MR. JERRY CAIN: 21 What you said was, what you 22 described, shear cliff, it's what's called a 23 24 high wall. WALTER THOMAS: 25

1 It's an unsightly thing next to a 2 house. And the way that you go up in there and 3 go around in that thing is really not very worthy of -- the people that own the property 4 back there would have a hard time selling the 5 house, no doubt about it. 6 7 MR. JERRY CAIN: 8 Reverend Davis, would you like to 9 speak? **REVEREND DAVIS:** 10 First before I say 11 Thank you. 12 anything, I would like to ask, because I'm a pastor of the Faith Missionary Baptist Church, 13 but also represent the alliance. 14 I would like 15 for the alliance and every minister in the 16 house who would stand, to stand right now, and 17 some who are standing to raise your hand. 18 Thank you, brothers. Now, these brothers are here, as 19 well as myself, because some live in the 20 community, we pastor people in the community, 21 and we are here because we're black. All this 22 23 conversation has been taking place I, like others, have sat here and wondered, is this 24 25 really meaning anything, or is it just a bunch

1	of hot air? Let me ask you, this panel here,
2	you all live here or somewhere else?
3	MR. JERRY CAIN:
4	Everyone here lives in the
5	Jackson area.
6	REVEREND DAVIS:
7	So we already have two strikes
8	against us besides what Brother Thomas said,
9	money. We have people who don't live here.
10	Secondly, we have people here to catch the heat
11	who don't make the decision. I would like for
12	the record to show that when you present this
13	to this board, ask them this question, how many
14	of them would want this in their neighborhood?
15	We would like to question the addressed, also,
16	what's going to happen to the property value of
17	these houses in this neighborhood if Mr. Fore
18	is allowed to do what he wants to do?
19	We understand also that we're at
20	this level right now tonight because the people
21	who are supposed to represent our people
22	continue to do what they always do. I want to
23	say tonight since there are so many of us here,
24	we need to make sure that the folks downtown
25	representing us need to start representing us.

Mr. Thomas had said it's all 1 2 about money and we know that to be true. In fact, we need to start making sure that folk 3 who are black going to represent start 4 There is a question in my representing us. 5 mind, if I understand correctly, this property 6 was not first zoned for what Mr. Fore wants lis 7 that correct? 8 MR. JERRY CAIN: 9 That's my understanding, yes, 10 sir. 11 **REVEREND DAVIS:** 12 All right. If that be true, 13 unless I am missing something, there are 14 15 supposed to be some letters that go out to the citizens of that neighborhood so that if you 16 have an objection to it it can be addressed. 17 What happened to the letter? 18 MR. JERRY CAIN: 19 The department does not make 20 21 those decisions. Zoning is a local issue that's decided by city government. So we're 22 That's a parallel not part of that process. 23 process that goes on locally, and part of the 24 zoning issue and planning is to determine --25

local people to determine the appropriateness 1 2 of an activity in an area. And as you very correctly pointed out, it should be determined 3 by local people, not by people in Jackson. So 4 that's a process that the councilwoman 5 described as going forward, and it will be 6 appealed eventually to the city council. We 7 don't deal with that in Jackson. 8 So I'm not familiar with their 9 process if they send letters out or how they 10 give their notice. I can't address that. 11 **REVEREND DAVIS:** 12 With all due respect to you, sir, 13 I understand you don't know the answer to that, 14 but perhaps Ms. Hines. 15 ELLA HOLMES-HINES: 16 The process should have afforded 17 those residents an opportunity to receive 18 letters that this was a discussion for special 19 exception use for an I-1. It has been upon the 20 discussion of Mrs. Fredericks, Senator Dawkins, 21 and myself to try and run ahead, the reason I 22 say Senator Dawkins is that she has been so 23 helpful with keeping a discussion with the 24 agencies of communication for things that is 25

very helpful as well as Mrs. Fredericks has 1 been untirely running this information to get 2 to get to all of the constituency. That was 3 not her charge, but she did that, Mrs. 4 Fredericks, and paid her money to do that. The 5 notification should have come from the City of 6 Gulfport, and some notification other than 7 legal notice should have come from DEQ. But 8 Mrs. Fredericks and others took upon themselves 9 to notify people that are here today, and 10 that's really very sad. What if we had not 11 gotten involved as what the pastor is telling 12 you, is that you would have had a record that 13 would have been documented by minimally those 14 15 who are in the area. If you don't do the planning as

16 the minimum was done, legal notice for DEQ, the 17 minimum was done for the City of Gulfport, you 18 are not going to get a great population of 19 people who are going to tell you what they need 20 and what they do not want. So it is important. 21 The city did not follow it, I'm very sure of 22 that, and we have a tendency to do that quite 23 often of not notifying adjacent areas, but we 24 also have in our ordinance a discussion that 25

makes it very limited to those who are 1 accessing the particular discussion of zoning 2 and planning, which is not correct. JERRY CAIN: 4 There is no requirement for an 5 environmental impact study. What we are 6 reviewing is whether or not the application 7 submitted to DEQ for the activity is complying 8 with the law. The law does not require an 9 environmental impact study. 10 RIP DANIELS: 11 Is it proper for the citizens of 12 this area to request that a study be done on 13 this area prior to any approval of a permit for 14 this project? 15 MR. JERRY CAIN: 16 It's certainly proper to ask the 17 question and we would consider that. 18 RTP DANTELS: 19 I asked the question, I know, but 20 that's not what I said. Is it proper for the 21 North Gulfport Civic Club to request a study on 22 this area, environmentally, before any 23 consideration is given to the approval of a 24 25 permit?

And I'm familiar with 14 the specific project you are talking about. 15 All I can say is that we have a limited number 16 of resources, we're trying to issue permits as 17 quickly as we can for those facilities that 18 already have permits and have insured that 19 they're within compliance, and I'm going to be 20 completely honest with you, with the limited 21 resources we have we literally cannot be on 22 every day, on every project. So we have to 23 rely on the public to tell us when they see 24 things, and then we, I can assure you, that we 25

investigate every complaint we receive. Every single one. And sometimes there's merit, sometimes there's not, but one of the tools we use -- because Mississippi is like every other state, we can't just fund everything we would like to have. We would like to have twice the staff we have, but there are other priorities in the state.



Just a couple things real quick. 14 I've heard over and over again this is a 15 decision that's been made. I believe 12 Mr. Fore owns some 100 acres over there in 13 Edgewater Estates, if I'm correct, building a 14 subdivision there. I live in Edgewater 15 There is no way in the world those Estates. 16 white folks would let him cover over there and 17 dig some holes in that ground. In District 4, 18 according to CDC has it's Number 2 in the state 19 Right over here in lead poisoning of children. 20 in Turkey Creek, the Navy base, and DEQ did the 21 testing, dioxin spilled from the Navy base that 22 flowed through Turkey Creek. Whenever Turkey 23 Creek overflows they have dioxin sediments 24 float into the community. Most people don't 25

know that over here. Now we're adding another 1 problem to this area, and someone said stressed 2 3 area. I would like to see DEQ, and I'm 4 going to call Ms. Tatum, Gloria, when I get 5 back to the office, because this is as much as 6 anything an environmental justice issue, and it 7 is an injustice to the community. 8 Now, EPA need to be involved, and 9 I believe people in this community are prepared 10 to sue Fore and DEQ and anybody else if 11 necessary because it has to stop. This project 12 will not go through, Mr. Fore. This thing, again, I will repeat 21 myself, this is an environmental justice issue, 22 we already have a lead problem here, we have 23 dioxin problems over here with Turkey Creek 24 overflowing, and now they want to put a big 25

trash hole right in this community. Believe me 1 I say tonight it will not happen. 2 3 And we want DEQ, we want the EJ department which has really not done anything, 4 I hate to say it, but it is one of the sorriest 5 environmental justice departments in the 6 7 country, in our DEQ, it really is. So we will be contacting Ms. (INAUDIBLE) for the EPA, I 8 will be calling her tomorrow. 9 I want them to 10 get involved in this project because what is 11 happening here is wrong, and again I say 12 emphatically, it will not happen. MR. JERRY CAIN: 13 Yes. 14 JUANITA MAYS: 15 16 Hi, my name is Juanita Mays and I 17 live in the area. I bought a home here three 18 years --MR. JERRY CAIN: 19 20 Juanita Mays? JUANITA MAYS: 21 22 Yes. I bought a home here three years ago, and it's a nice area for me and my 23 children, but I also suffer from a breathing 24 problem, as do a son of mine, and a grandchild. 25



And I would ask Mr. Fore, please do not put 1 your pit in our neighborhood. 2 MR. JERRY CAIN: 3 I want to see if there is anybody 4 else who has not spoken yet? Yes, ma'am, and 5 then you will be next, ma'am. 6 PATRICIA SPHINX: 7 My name is Patricia Sphinx. Ι 8 just want to agree with the gentleman who said 9 that we need to put a face to these words and 10 this transcript. I would like to be entered 11 into the official record. The tape that Walter 12 Thomas is now making of the proceeding, so that 13 the permitting board can see the people who are 14 speaking these words. 15 MR. JERRY CAIN: 16 If Yes, ma'am, that's fine. 17 that's provided to us. 18 MEMBER OF THE AUDIENCE: 19 We will do that. 20 MR. JERRY CAIN: 21 Ma'am. 22 MEMBER OF THE AUDIENCE: 23 I just want to say I was born and 24 raised here in Gulfport. I walked these 25

streets when I was a child. The area he is 1 trying to put it in is called the old Rosalyn 2 yard, I lived there, (INAUDIBLE) there's 3 several different places here that we lived 4 played when we were a kid. And we feel 5 invaded. We feel like what we're saying is --6 nobody's listening. And my children was raised 7 up here, went to this same school, and it's 8 just, to me, I feel like it's worse than 9/11. 9 When 9/11 come, you all were scared to death, 10 but that's the way we feel right about now, but 11 we're scared in a different way, because we 12 know like Reverend Davis said, the money. We 13 may not have the money, but we have God in our 14 life, and we have faith. We have faith that 15 you can't even measure. And, you know, this 16 town, this area is our home. We have memories 17 here, my kids have memories here, I have 18 memories here. And what Mr. Fore is trying to 19 do is wrong. And he need to go home and pray 20 and ask God is this what you will have me to 21 do, because there's too many people here crying 22 Somebody needs to hear. out don't do this. 23 And if he turn a deaf ear to this, that's blood 24 on his hands, because the first kid that get 25

So that's, you 15 know, we worked with the CB Base, we worked 16 with the community for a number of years, done 17 an awful lot of analysis, so we think we 18 understand where it is and where it isn't. 19 BILL MAGEE: 20 Okay, but have there ever been a 21 study done in Meadowpark. 22 MR. PHIL BASS: 23 I'm sorry, but I can't sit here 24 and tell you yes it has, and no it hasn't, but 25

doing it analytically, you've got to remember, 1 it's awful expensive. I don't have a price of 2 dioxin now, it's been a number of years, up to 3 \$2,000 a test. So you follow the trail, you 4 don't go out, you know, if the trail leads to 5 the left, you don't go off to the right. 6 Once 7 you establish by a systematic study that this is where the trail is leading, you follow the 8 trail and that's what we've done with the 9 dioxin issue because it's very specific with 10 this particular kind of dioxin. 11 BILL MAGEE: 12 Let me tell you where I'm leading 13 with my question. You say you are not 14 concerned about the amount of water, correct? 15 MR. JERRY CAIN: 16 I didn't say that we were not 17 What I told you is we don't have concerned. 18 regulatory authority. 19 BILL MAGEE: 20 Because the way the Meadowpark 21 water discharge, it's going to meet right there 22 at the southeast corner of Mississippi Power 23 and right where Mr. Fore's water is going. 24 When it backs up, you know what happens to 25

14	newspaper, that mention the north Gulfport
15	Turkey Creek area. We would like more
16	resources pumped into this area.

So 4 we hope that your board down there is going to 5 do a lot better job than ours. This is how 6 elected officials in Gulfport do, because they 7 never read it what they get. 8 MR. JERRY CAIN: 9 Our permit board takes this 10 seriously, these issues. And really and truly, 11 as you might imagine, this is going to be quite 12 a voluminous transcript. And as I have to 13 present things to the permit board and answer 14 questions from them, it's obvious if you read 15 this stuff. I can't say that every permit 16 board member reads every word, but I can say 17 that I feel when I stand before them they have 18 considered the issue. 19 MEMBER OF THE AUDIENCE: 20 I might just have one word, my 21 president left before I got a chance to speak. 22 MR. JERRY CAIN: 23 Can you state your name? 24 EDDIE HARTWELL: 25

My name is Eddie Hartwell, I'm a 1 pastor of the St. James Baptist Church, and I 2 3 have members of our church that live in this community. 4 I know it's probably an ugly 5 thing to even have to say in this day and time, 6 but on sometimes on issues like this, this 7 group of people are not fairly represented. 8 There are times when things come into our 9 community and it's shoved right straight down 10 our throat, I know y'all heard it a while ago. 11 There is a thing, I don't know exactly how to 12 define it, as environmental racism. It looks 13 like the dirty projects wind up in our 14 communities. This development, Mr. Fore owns 15 property all over Harrison County, I know, I 16 serve on the Harrison County Zoning Commission. 17 We pass good projects, you know, for him, and 18 sometimes with opposition, sometimes without 19 opposition, but we always way it and do it 20 fairly. But each one of those times we've 21 never had the kind of outcry against a project 22 from the community like we have with this one. 23 Your organization that you all 24 are representing here tonight is possibly our 25

1	last resort. Possibly our last resort. And we
2	would wish you all would remember the golden
3	rule, the one that sits on the higher board
4	than any of us will ever sit on says, love your
5	neighbor like you love yourself. Do unto
6	others as you would have them do unto you.
7	None of you would want your children exposed to
8	the things, the dangers and the hazards and the
9	detriment to your community overloading the
10	infrastructure that's already vastly
11	undermaintained, the funds, the councilwoman
12	has just said we don't have the funds to
13	maintain it in the shape that it's in.
14	So how in good conscience, how in
15	good conscience could we issue a permit to
16	bring about further detriment, further
17	deprivation than is already here. I pray that
18	you all will indeed hear the hearts of these
19	people. We're not against development. There
20	is nobody in this town that knows that we need
21	money and jobs anymore than those of us that
22	have been in this room tonight. But we just
23	don't need it to further tear down the little
24	bit that's already here. Thank you.
25	MR. JERRY CAIN:

I want to talk about next steps, 1 but before I do that I want to know if there is 2 anybody that would like to add anything else 3 before we go on? 4 The next steps. Well, obviously 5 the next steps are that this record will be 6 developed by the court reporter, we will 7 continue to receive written comments. I didn't 8 look at the calendar, but whatever 14 days is 9 October 14th, that's an easy one. 10 from now. And so if you want additional 11 written comments to be received they need to be 12 received in our office by close of business on 13 October 14th. 14 Once that record is completed, 15 the staff will begin the work of reviewing all 16 the comments that you've made. And we will be 17 for sure identifying those issues that are 18 clearly environmental, and those issues that 19 are technical, and those issues that go to 20 quality of life and community concerns. 21 As we identify those, we will 22 flush out wherever it goes in terms of 23 providing an adequate response to the permit 24 board to consider. We will give -- once 25

completed, this matter will be scheduled before the permit board. I do not know at this date which permit board meeting it will be. I do not know how long it is going to take to go through this process.

I will tell you that we will 6 insure that the community representatives that 7 have been identified through this hearing will 8 be notified in advance, typically two weeks is 9 what we try to do, ten working days, so that 10 you will have an opportunity to be present if 11 you care to at that meeting. Again, but I need 12 to be genuine with you, the next meeting of the 13 permit board is not a hearing. It is a meeting 14 where we will tell the permit board the results 15 of this hearing and, of course, they will have 16 the record and then they will decide whether 17 they want to make a decision on the issue or 18 (INAUDIBLE) whatever it is. 19

What the permit board typically allows for is for a representative of both sides of the issue to make a brief presentation, generally five to ten minutes, before the permit board. And I think in large part it's done just for the very reason that

you said, so that some of the compassion, the feeling, emotion can be shared with the permit board. But again, it is not a hearing. And this is something that the permit board traditionally does.



NWP No. 36, *Boat Ramps*, is authorized by this certification for a period of five years from its effective date provided the project complies with the following complies with the following conditions:

- 1. Boat ramp parking areas with impervious surfaces (concrete, asphalt) that have a surface area equal to or greater than one acre shall provide for storm water management. The first 0.5 inch of storm water runoff from impervious parking and road surfaces shall be treated using OPC approved best management practices before release. NWP No. 41, *Reshaping Existing Drainage Ditches*, is authorized by this certification for a period of five years from their effective date, provided projects comply with the following conditions

- 1. The side slopes of banks and spoil disposal areas shall be 3:1 (horizontal:vertical).

Oulfport contractor wants to build park

GULFPORT — Gulfport contractor W.C. Fore plans to build a lakeside park and donate it to the city.

He would build the lake, too.

Fore owns 115 acres north of 33rd Street and east of 34th Avenue. He will excavate enough dirt from the property to fill a 60-acre expansion project at the State Port at Gulfport that his company is contracted to perform.

He plans to turn the resulting hole into a lake surrounded by a 40-acre park.

Fore said he would install a fence around the property, provide landscaping and build vilion.

for other amenities, such as tennis courts or ballfields, he said.

Asked what the park project would cost him, he replied, "To tell you the truth, it's a wash."

He said he would have little use for the \$1 million property once the dirt is excavated and he believes the surrounding communities would benefit from a park.

"A hole in the ground doesn't have any value," he said. "A park has value."

The 28th Street Park is the only city park in the area.

The City Council gave the plan preliminary approval earlier this month. The property is located in Councilman Jimmie Jenkins' ward.

"I'd like to see it used as place where people could go to relax and have a picnic or barbecue," Jenkins said, adding that the city could build a walking track around the lake's perimeter.

Fore said the park won't be completed for three to five years.

Fore's Proposed Construction

Meeting called to order by Rep. Frances Fredericks. Invocation by Rev. Lawrence Collins. Chris Laganre, from Gene Taylor's office, told both sides to get together to work out differences. Correction by Deborah McGhee stating the purpose of this meeting is to hear Mr. Fore's plans for the construction and this group will conduct a larger community meeting to present today's proposes to.

Mr. Fore yielded the floor to Bobby Gavin to present his proposed construction. He stated Mr. Fore has made application for a permit to mine \pm 48 acres. The project will be divided in three phases. Phase I will cut the pit. The water leaving its natural state mining a ditch. Currently 100% of the water in the site drains into Turkey Creek. Phase II and Phase III the water will stay in its natural state. In these phases the water will go through a limestone velocity break and will cross 33rd with discharge particles to natural ditch that runs parallel to the railroad track. The water will then go to Brickyard Bayou. They will clear right of way to the pit and install a 6' high safety fence with one access. Access to the mining area will be on 33rd with 2 -12' fences with lockable gates. North existing wetlands will stay a minimum of 300 ft away from the wetlands. There will be a 100' buffer between 33rd and a 150' buffer between the burn centiment pond. He will clear only enough land around the perimeter to install a 6' ft. There will be environmental controls to prevent runoff. When this area is completed, he will then start Phases 2 and 3. The surface water will be taken in stillen basins that has a baffel in it, then the water will cross 33rd and follow Fore's property line and dump into the existing ditch. The distance to residential area is 900'. This project will pump 2 million gallons of water a day.

Mr. Fore's plans for the park

open air pavilion fence will remain surface walking track landscaping

He will provide a Performance Bond to the city to guarantee this work will be performed.

He also stated he saved the city \$18 million. He was the only local company that bided on this project. The other company's bids were \$28 million and \$39 million.

Questions from the floor:

Frank Hubiak, U. S. Army COE, asked the depth of the pit? Response: The depth of the pit will be 20', you will be able to walk all around before you get in deep water. It will be topsoil and grass to walk out to the pond.

Howard Page asked the depth of the natural water table. Response: 2-4'. All environment issues addressed to the Core of Engineers. It will take 3 to 4 years to complete the project, and at that time the property will be deeded to the City of Gulfport. The city has plans to use the area as a recreational park.

It was asked what will he (Mr. Fore) do with the remaining acreas? Response: The remaining 35 acres south of 33rd, and he emphasized that this is just a thought, but he's seen on the news that there's a great need for affordable housing in this area.

What material will go to the port? Response: All upland material will go to the port. Wetland material can't go to the port.

Rev. Collins asked the name of the project? Response: The "Harreld Pit"

Rep Fredericks asked how will the water get to Brickyard Bayou? Response: There's currently an elevation pipe by the railroad that's 25' with a difference of 9'. And with the difference he will connect at that point and redirect the water.

Chris Laganre asked has all permits been secured? Response: Currently has a permit from the COE and the permit from the DEQ is in limbo.

Permits

Ron Krizman stated the COE issued a permit to the city for expansion dirt to come from the uplands. They now will have to retract that letter and Fore has to explain that he can avoid using wetlands in this project. It was stated that the elevated dike 3' around the pit, then you are filling wetlands and need a permit. Mining permit was issued with conditions: local approval, other environmental approval and if the mining site is changed then the permit has to be modified. Mr. Fore needs to complete the water permit application. Permit with DEQ is conditioned upon completed application, public hearings and all appeals has to be addressed.

It was asked who oversees the project once all permits are acquired? Response: DEQ oversees everything in their permit, waste water and mining oversees their areas and the city will have to enforce safety.

Rep Fredericks asked who determines the value of the Performance Bond? Response: The bonding company determines the value of the bond depending on the work stated to be performed.

Meeting adjourned with prayer by Rev. Collins

Community Meeting

Rep Fredericks opened up by stating we will have an invocation and two people will talk about the environment, Rose Johnson and Howard Paige. Invocation Dec. Donald Garrett.

Rose Johnson stated she's chairman of Sierra Club and she's here to lend support and will take up legal action. Howard will discuss environmental issues. Sierra Club wants to work with community on this project. If the community is in support of the project they will support that decision, and if they want to stop it, they will support that to.

Howard Paige: His fear is the city doesn't have money to maintain the park. We want a "Surety Bond" because you don't have to take it to court. Whereas, a Guarantee Bond you have to sue him to get the work performed. Six foot fence is inadequate, this will be unmonitored. Keep an eye on this project, this will have a major affect on the community.

Dale McGhee: How much of this land is wetlands.

Howard Paige: Not a lot, but enough for him to get COE permit.

Rep. Fredericks: Pumping 2 million gallons of water everyday through the pipe. How will that affect the community?

Howard Paige: The settling pond will take mud from the water and pass clean water through the pipe. We want this answer from DEQ.

Question: Do most people here want to oppose the lake?

Majority of people present said they want to oppose the lake.

Rep. Fredericks: Mr. Fore goes before the Planning Commission on th 21st and told everyone to speak freely.

Reading of Minutes from August 8, 2003 meeting. In addition to the August 8th minutes, I, Deborah McGhee, was contacted on August 13th by Mr. Fore to discuss what he's willing to put in the park, so I read that list. Mr. Fore stated he wrote a letter to Jim Simpson and told him he's willing to put:

48 acre lake stocked 1/2 mile asphalt walking track landscaping

concrete picnic tables 40X80 open pavilion w/ cover Electricial areate system (blows air into the water to create a ripple effect so mosquitoes eggs won't hatch)

He said this is an opportunity to give something back. Also, he's willing to give a gift over a one year period of \$20,000 to sick children or sick adults.

After the reading of the minutes, a vote was called to oppose the lake. It was unanimously voted to oppose the lake.

Mrs. Fredericks: We can't just say, we don't want the lake, we have to state reasons why.

Reasons to oppose the lake:

• Safety of the children. The park will be surrounded by 6 residential areas, an elementary school, and churches. The facility will not be upkept or manned by the city. The City of Gulfport by its own admission can't support the parks it currently has.

• The future of the community. The area will become a haven for crime because the park is wooded and isolated. (Ex. The "Clower Thornton Park" has become a crime haven and the residents are trying to get it closed.)

Will cause flooding in the Meadow Park Addition to the City of Gulfport.

- Health hazards from the dust in the area, ie, allergies, asthma
- There's currently no infrastructure in the area.
- Concerned about the water quality after the destruction of the wetlands.

• The water will be redirected to Brickyard Bayou and the city is currently having a \$14 million buyout for some of the areas surrounded by Brickyard Bayou because of flooding.

• Six feet fence not adequate to secure the lake from children.

September 3, 2003

Community Meeting with Mr. Fore

Meeting called to order by Mrs. Fredericks and invocation offered by Dec. Shelton Buckley.

Floor yielded to Mr. Fore. Mr. Fore presented a map that shows the proposed lake area. He said the buffer zone, the green belt won't be seen. The pink slope, is the sand slope and you can walk around the lake. The purple is the water settlement pond. First water comes in and have settlement of mud and particles then clean water will discharge to the second pond. He states that the outfall outside the large ditch starts on his property and falls on the west side of the railroad. No houses in danger of flooding. The city engaged in a \$1.5 million cleaning of the Brickyard Bayou canal. He did the work, the cleaning of the canal, and Brickyard won't flood anymore. His project will take water away from Turkey Creek because Turkey Creek water runs east and he will divert water west to dump into Brickyard Bayou.

Question: Mrs. Fredericks: You said there will be so many trees you won't see the lake from the road. We want the trees removed, and the 6' hurricane fence make it 8'. Will the fence be permanent?

Ans: Mr. Fore: Eventually, when the property is deeded to the city it will include the fence.

Mrs. Fredericks: How far north from the lake to residences? Mr. Fore: 1080' from the apartments Mrs. Fredericks: How far from 34th Street Mr. Fore: 100'. Buffer zone east line of 34th street is 100'.

Mr. Fore continues. The first pond have 4' or 5' of water at all times because you want the settlement to settle to the bottom of the pond. Also, will have a baffel, that is, if he wants the water to run out, he will pull the board, and to let water in, he will put the board in. Fear of park being isolated according to previous minutes, the reason for leaving the green belt is to contain the dust, and when the city gets the land they can destroy the green belt. He says this will be an adult park, you can swim, fish, walk on the track. He doesn't feel like you can drop your kids off and go shopping.

Question: Will the park be supervised?

Mr. Fore: As long as he has it, it will be.

Mrs. Fredericks: What will Mr. Fore turn over to the city?

Mr. Fore: All buffer zones represent 65-70 acres, pavilion, paved walking track, landscaping (ex: Bradford pears), park bences.

Mrs. McGhee: We want bathrooms and water fountains.

Councilman Jimmie Jenkins: This can be a win win situation. We have to consider what the people want as opposed to what the developer want. We're looking at 2 full time people to man the park, opening and closing time. What's best for the majority of the people and what the city can maintain. Along with what the city and county can do. Mr. Fore plan to build affordable housing on 48 acres. The park referenced (the Clower Thornton Park from Aug 18, 2003

community minutes) in Councilman Teston area is not well lighted.

Dorothy Jackson: How deep of a hole and land to dig up?

Mr. Fore: 48 acres, from side to pink area. Asking in permit for 25' deep lake, but it will probably be closer to 20'.

Charlene King: Will you put something in the park for children?

Mr. Fore: Don't know what the city will do with it. But he's putting what he mentioned earlier. Dorothy Jackson: You will be digging 5 years?

Mr. Fore: Slope has to be made and DEQ require standing grass.

Dorothy Jackson: What's to stop you from digging dirt and doing nothing else?

Mr. Fore: I'm willing to put up a bond in favor of the City of Gulfport. The city will call the bonding company and say what work not done.

Deborah McGhee: We want a Surety Bond.

Rep. Fredericks: My concern is you're talking about what you will do. But, we as citizens don't have assurance. We need something in writing. (She addresses Councilman Jenkins and say) the city not telling they will light this area.

Mr. Fore: Willing to let his attorney (Rep. Atty. Jim Simpson) put this in writing.

Rep. Atty Jim Simpson: We're not to that point yet. That's why we're talking to see what the people want. If we would have come here tonight with something in writing it wouldn't had a lake stocked with fish, bathrooms, and water fountain because we didn't know that.

Rep. Fredericks: (addressing Jerry Cain from DEQ) 2 million gallons of water pumped daily, how long will this area stay wetlands?

Jerry Cain: There's few areas in purple. This doesn't require a 404 permit for the wetlands in this area. The port can't receive material from wetlands.

Rep. Fredericks: If he dig this pit, how much erosion from area after it's dug?

Jerry Cain: DEQ role in this is neither a proponent or against. Role is to enforce laws to see if the project meets it. DEQ has three roles:

1) Office of Geology mining permit. Purpose mine minerals how the mine will be left afterwards. Insure they mine as they say, and they have to put bonds up. Before the bond is released the site have to have vegetation. Plan describe angle around slop, vegetation. When the site is left, its left in a stable situation, not an eyesore and safe.

2) Wetland 404 Permit. COE send documents to DEQ, in this case 404 not required.

3) Regulate discharges to surface water to protect state surface water. This case will have discharge process water generated from mining. Will define quality water and storm water, if anything disturbs the ground, you have to regulate storm water. The process is: Application made, mining permit issued. There has been a footprint change in this case and the permit has to be modified. Will have a public hearing on the 30th, with a court reporter, we will listen to anything and will answer questions that we know the answer to. Will provide to the permit board questions and responses.

Dorothy Jackson: What assurance will the city give to the community that what we can't get Mr. Fore to do, the city and county will do. For instance, lighting.

Councilman Jenkins: City hasn't discussed with Mr. Fore what he will do.

Question: What keep water moving to avoid moisquitoes?

Jerry Cain: Wind action, different peaking circulation, and make sure the banks stay clear.

Mary Wilson: Concerning putting park and fence, that's another haven for drunks and drug

addicts.

Rep. Atty Jim Simpson: We can't point in time when we can convince you. First satisfy you he has to put up his bonds.

Councilman Jenkins: Will call public meeting with principle and people to hear their voices. He hasn't heard anyone say they don't support this. except, for Hines (she's not here). City has to put up safeguards for people not getting drowned. Things the city can do to make it safe, Question: Who patrol? City police

Rev. Luther Fairley: Have you considered another site for this project? Seems like minority communities is the first sought for major projects?

Mr. Fore: This is private property. I didn't target minority area. This particular material is sand and meets ASTM classification. I will leave a bond, leave to someone a million dollars. I can give it to St. John or any group. There's not a law against building a lake in the city. My vision is to leave something beautiful for the city.

Meeting adjourned.

The Mississippi Department of Environmental Quality (MDEQ) has received your Notice of Intent (NOI) for coverage under the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Mining General Permit for the discharge of storm water from a mining site located in Section 33, Township 7 South, Range 11 West, Harrison County, Mississippi. MDEQ staff has coordinated internally with MDEQ's Office of Geology (Geology) and externally with federal agencies in a review of this NOI. This review has revealed a number of apparent inconsistencies in the description of the project as you have proposed it to these various entities. Because of these inconsistencies, we are unable to ascertain the details of the project that is being proposed and what permits or approvals may be required. It is absolutely imperative that the project be clearly defined and that every reviewing agency is reviewing the same set of facts. We strongly suggest that after reviewing this correspondence and consulting with your engineer, you meet with MDEQ staff to be sure that we have effectively communicated on these issues.

Review of the information regarding this proposed project indicates that an individual NPDES permit will be required instead of a general permit. As with all individual NPDES permits, public notice of the permit prior to a decision by the Mississippi Environmental Quality Permit Board (Permit Board) is required and, depending on the level of public interest, a public hearing may be required.

Specifically, our review of the various submittals has generated the following concerns:

1. The Storm Water Pollution Prevention Plan (SWPPP) submitted indicates that a sedimentation basin is to be located in the northwest corner of the property outside of the mining area. The Surface Mining Permit Application (Mining Application) submitted to Geology indicates that a sedimentation basin is to be located in the northeast corner of the property within the mining area. Please address this inconsistency.

- 2. According to the Gulfport North USGS topographic map, a perennial stream bisects the planned mining area. Chapter 3, Section IV.3.a.2 of the Wastewater Regulations requires a minimum of a 150 foot buffer distance between the mining area and the upper banks of perennial streams. Please provide documentation that W.C. Fore Trucking, Inc., will comply with this regulatory requirement.
- 3. According to the NOI and the Mining Application, dredging will not be part of the mining operation of this site. However, these documents also indicate that groundwater is at a depth of five (5) feet below natural grade and that the final depth of the mining operation will terminate at approximately 25 feet below natural grade. These facts appear to indicate that dredging and accompanying discharges will be required to mine the site. Please provide MDEQ with an operations plan that specifically details the method(s) to be employed to mine this site.
- 4. Section C of the Mining Application indicates that the site will be reclaimed through the establishment of grass cover. Information presented through media outlets and obtained by Geology indicates that the mined area will be converted to a large lake/pond. Additionally, the site plans provided to Geology do not account for the presence of the perennial stream located on site. Therefore, please provide a specific reclamation plan for this mining site. Please be aware that the reclamation plan must be amended through Geology, which is a separate submittal from your response to this letter.
- 5. MDEQ is aware that the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (Corps) has made a determination that no wetlands dredge and fill permit is required for your planned activities at this site. The project described by the Corps in its determination letter, however, does not appear to be consistent with the project for which you have made application to MDEQ. Please provide MDEQ with a copy of all information submitted to the Corps regarding the wetlands permit. Please be aware that although the Corps did not require a permit for the mining of the wetland area, all surface waters, including wetlands, within the State of Mississippi are waters of the state and are regulated as such. Therefore, you may be informed of other regulatory requirements with which you must comply regarding the mining of the wetland area upon MDEQ review of the requested documentation. Also, the Corps' own analysis may change once MDEQ and the Corps are supplied with consistent and complete information on the project.
- 6. Pursuant to Chapter 1, Section I.C.2.a of the Wastewater Regulations, all wastewater treatment facilities must be at least 150 feet from the property boundary. Any sedimentation basins located on site must comply with this regulatory siting criteria. Furthermore, Chapter 1, Section I.C.1.d of the Wastewater Regulations requires that all wastewater treatment facilities otherwise accessible to the general public must be made inaccessible and identified by signs posted in a reasonable manner. Please provide MDEQ with a plan for compliance with these criteria.
- 7. Based on information provided by MDEQ's Water Quality Assessment Branch, the proposed receiving stream, Turkey Creek, is currently listed as an impaired water body on the state's Clean Water Act § 303(d) list. As such, discharge of any type of wastewater may not be permitted to the Turkey Creek without a site-specific assessment of the stream.

- 8. The discharge of mixed storm water and groundwater is not allowed through a storm water general permit. Therefore it appears an individual NPDES Discharge Permit application will be required for the discharge of mixed stormwater and groundwater. Please find enclosed EPA Form 1, EPA Form 2D and EPA Form 2C for your consideration (you will need to complete and submit Form 2C six months after permit issuance). This individual permit is required in addition to storm water discharge coverage as storm water may leave the site without going into the sedimentation basin first.
- 9. The submitted SWPPP appears to be generic in nature and does not specifically address the environmental issues at this site. Please prepare and submit a site-specific SWPPP that addresses the protection of wetlands, site security, perennial stream protection, specific storm water flow control for each area of the site, including all access roads to and from the mining area, storm water/process wastewater receiving stream identification, and the discharge route from the sedimentation basin to the receiving stream.
- 10. Please provide MDEQ with a scaled site map that indicates the location of all anticipated sedimentation basins, anticipated points of discharge from the sedimentation basins, location of the rain gauge, planned location of all storm water controls to be implemented at the site, property lines, specific mining areas (including acreage amount) within the total property acreage, planned storage and stockpile areas, buffer distances for all surface waters and storm water control measures, and all anticipated access roads into the total property. Additionally, please include the storm water flow direction for each area of the site to further indicate the points of discharge from the site.

Upon receipt of this information, the Environmental Permits Division will continue the permitting process for your project. Please be advised the discharge of storm water or process water without written notification of coverage or issuance of an individual NPDES Storm Water Permit is a violation of state law. MDEQ suggests that a meeting may be beneficial in order to discuss and, if possible, to streamline these issues prior to permitting.

Additionally, please find enclosed a copy of a request for an evidentiary hearing before the Permit Board regarding your surface mining permit filed by Representative Frances Fredericks and a copy of MDEQ's response to that request, noting that any evidentiary hearings concerning the project will be consolidated after all pertinent permitting actions are taken by the Permit Board.

This agency is in receipt of your June 18, 2003 letter to Charles Chisolm requesting an evidentiary hearing regarding the surface mining permit issued to W. C. Fore to mine an area within your district and within the City of Gulfport. As we discussed on the telephone last week, this project requires additional permits from this agency's Office of Pollution Control (stormwater and, possibly, water discharge permits). MDEQ also is in contact with the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers concerning wetlands issues on the site.

Because this project ultimately will require multiple permits from the Mississippi Environmental Quality Permit Board, and because mining at the project cannot begin until all permits are issued, we will hold your request for an evidentiary hearing during the Permit Board's consideration of these additional permits. We will keep you informed of any public comment period or public hearings scheduled on those permits. If the applicant obtains the other permits it needs for this project, we will then consolidate any additional requests for evidentiary hearing with your request. In this way, the Permit Board can hold one evidentiary hearing regarding the project instead of several.





The Office of Geology has informed us that you have filed a permit application for the referenced surface mine. Federal Storm Water Regulations, 40 CFR 122.26(b)(14)(iii), require mines with storm water discharges to have NPDES storm water permit coverage. Therefore, operating a mine without the needed coverage violates State Law, sections 49-17-1 through 49-17-43, which includes significant penalties.

Enclosed is a Mining Notice of Intent (MNOI) form that can be used to apply for coverage under our Mining Storm Water General NPDES Permit, copy enclosed. This MNOI form must be filed at least 30 days prior to the commencement of mining or 15 days if a Storm Water Pollution Prevention Plan (SWPPP) is already on file. If you are operating without coverage, you may be operating in violation of the storm water regulations and subject to potential enforcement action. Therefore, you should submit the enclosed MNOI and a SWPPP, as described in the permit, within 15 days of receipt of this correspondence.

The minimum requirements for a SWPPP are discussed in Part III and Part IV of the Stormwater Mining General Permit (copy enclosed). If your mining operation can be maintained in such a manner that impacted stormwater from this operation does not leave your site nor enter a defined drainage pathway please provide a demonstration and certification of this in lieu of obtaining stormwater coverage.
