

MISSISSIPPI COMMISSION ON ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY  
OFFICIAL MINUTES  
FEBRUARY 22, 2018

The regular monthly meeting of the Commission on Environmental Quality was held on Thursday, February 22, 2018, in the Commission Hearing Room, 515 East Amite Street, Jackson, Mississippi, beginning at 9:00 a.m. Commissioners present were:

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Winstead, and after Mr. Van Devender led the invocation, the following business was transacted:

Welcome of New Commissioner

Chairman Winstead introduced and welcomed, Patrick L. Johnson, Jr., the newest member to the Commission on Environmental Quality.

Approval of Minutes

On motion made by Mr. Van Devender and seconded by Mr. Dane, the minutes of the November 17, 2017 meeting were approved and adopted as the Official Minutes.

Commission Approval of Brownfield Agreement Modification

Ms. Lynn Chambers stated the Commission issued a Brownfield Agreement (#6662-16) with Hernando Town Properties, LLC, on June 23, 2016, for the remediation of the Reliable Equipment facility in Hernando, Mississippi. Reliable Equipment facility is contaminated with Total Petroleum Hydrocarbons – Gasoline and Diesel Range Organics in the groundwater and soils at levels in excess of the Target Remediation Goals (TRGs). Therefore, remediation of the Brownfield Agreement Site was determined to be necessary. The initial Brownfield Agreement included the planned demolition and removal of the building. The Brownfield Agreement Modification requested the building remain and be renovated and reused. Since the building will be renovated instead of demolished, Commission approval is needed. The staff of the MCEQ evaluated the Brownfield Agreement and believes that, with the conditions and restrictions contained within the Brownfield Agreement, the Site will be in compliance with applicable State and Federal laws and standards and will be protective of the public health and the environment. Following staff presentation and after deliberation, on motion made by Mr. Phillips and seconded by Ms. Lathan, the Commission unanimously voted to approve the Brownfield Agreement Modification with Hernando Town Properties, LLC.

FY 2019 Title V Fee Recommendation - Approval to Proceed to Public Notice of Hearing

Mr. Chad Lafontaine stated a copy of the draft report containing the Title V Advisory Council's Title V fee recommendation for the upcoming fee year was previously forwarded to the Commission. On behalf of staff, Mr. Lafontaine requested approval to hold a public hearing to receive comments regarding the proposed Title V fee at \$47/ton and to proceed with public notice of the hearing. After the public participation process is completed, staff will bring the fee recommendation back before the Commission for final action. Mr. Phillips said he noticed the Title V billable ton had decreased and wanted to know what caused this result. Mr. Lafontaine responded that increased regulation and advanced technology have caused the billable ton to go down, but in order to balance the Title V program, the Council may need to discuss increasing the Title V fee. Following staff presentation and after deliberation, on motion made by Mr. Dane and seconded by Ms. Lathan, the Commission unanimously voted to proceed to public notice for a hearing on the Title V fee recommendation.

Commission Briefing on Proposed amendments to 11 Miss. Admin. Code, Part 2, Chapter 1 with an Associated Revision to the State Implementation Plan for Control of Air Pollution

Mr. Chad Lafontaine stated the Commission was previously provided with information on a public notice for comment on proposed amendments to the Commission's regulations, 11 Mississippi Administrative Code, Part 2, Chapter 1 and an associated Revision to the State Implementation Plan for Control of Air Pollution (SIP Revision). The proposed amendments and SIP Revision will incorporate amendments of the Mississippi Environmental Quality Permit Board's administrative regulations to directly align requirements of the Permit Board's makeup with requirements of the Federal Clean Air Act. This action will allow EPA to remedy partial-disapprovals of recent state plan submittals to address requirements for the National Ambient Air Quality Standards under the Clean Air Act. The 30-day public comment period began February 2, 2018 and will conclude with a public hearing to be held on March 5, 2018. Following the conclusion of the public participation process, staff intends to bring the proposed amendments and SIP Revision to the Commission for approval at the March 22, 2018 meeting. After Mr. Lafontaine addressed the Commission, Executive Director Rikard provided the Commission with a little background on the proposed amendments and SIP Revision. This briefing was for informational purposes only, requiring no action by the Commission.

Commission Briefing on Oil Spill Restoration

Mr. Chris Wells provided the Commission with a brief summary on the three main funding streams in Restoration: NRDA, RESTORE and NFWF, along with an overview of some of the projects in each funding stream. Several Commissioners had questions and suggestions which resulted in some discussion.

#### Approval to Enter into Executive Session


