

MISSISSIPPI COMMISSION ON ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY  
OFFICIAL MINUTES  
JUNE 27, 2019

The regular monthly meeting of the Commission on Environmental Quality was held on Thursday, June 27, 2019, in the Commission Hearing Room, 515 East Amite Street, Jackson, Mississippi, beginning at 9:00 a.m. Commissioners present were:

Commissioners John Dane III, Brenda Lathan, and Billy Van Devender were not present.

Others present were: Gary Rikard, Executive Director; Melissa Fortenberry, Thomas Wallace, and Chris Hawkins, staff of MDEQ; and other staff members and visitors whose names appear elsewhere in these minutes.

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Winstead and after Mr. Phillips led the invocation, the following business was transacted:

Approval of Minutes

On motion made by Mr. Johnson and seconded by Mr. Phillips, the minutes of the February 28, 2019, meeting were approved and adopted as the Official Minutes.

FY2020 Title V Fee Recommendation

On behalf of MDEQ staff, Ms. Melissa Fortenberry stated a public hearing concerning the FY2020 Title V Permit Fee was held on April 11, 2019, and that no comments were received. Staff recommended the Commission set the Title V fee at the proposed rate of \$47.00 per ton of regulated air pollutants, with a minimum fee of \$250.00, which is the same as the previous year's fee. Following staff presentation and after deliberation, on motion made by Mr. Phillips and seconded by Mr. Johnson, the Commission unanimously voted to set the FY2020 Title V permit fee at \$47.00 per ton of regulated air pollutants, with a minimum fee of \$250.00. The Commission further authorized that an Order setting this fee be executed by the Executive Director. Executive Director, Gary Rikard, informed the Commission that though air emissions are down, there is still a cost to run the Title V program. Therefore, the Title V Advisory Council may recommend an increase to the Title V fee next year and there may also be some statutory changes. Ms. Fortenberry further stated the Title V Advisory Council created a work group to gather ideas from affected facilities on how to fund the program in the future.

Environmental Covenant for Scott Petroleum

Mr. Thomas Wallace stated pursuant to the Commission's delegation regulations (11 Miss. Admin. Code Pt. 1, R.1.1.Y.), the Executive Director of MDEQ approved the Environmental Covenant between the Commission and Scott Petroleum regarding the remediation of property located at 942 North Broadway Street in Greenville, MS. Scott Petroleum operates at this location and Environmental Site Assessments revealed a release petroleum hydrocarbons impacting soils and groundwater at concentrations in excess of Target Remediation Goals (TRGs). Therefore, remediation of the site is necessary. Staff of the MCEQ evaluated the proposed Environmental Covenant and believes that, with the conditions and restrictions contained within; the site will be in compliance with applicable State laws and standards and will be protective of the public health and the environment. This briefing was for informational purposes only, requiring no action by the Commission.

Commission Approval of Brownfield Agreement

On behalf of staff, Mr. Thomas Wallace recommended the Commission approve the Brownfield Agreement between the Commission and Military Lee, LLC regarding the remediation of brownfield property located at 1815 Military Road in Columbus, Mississippi. The administrative record for this environmental response project is referred to as the Lee Middle School site. The proposed Brownfield Agreement Site

previously operated as either a high school or middle school from the early 1950's until 2011. Assessments detected the presence of asbestos containing material and lead based paint within onsite structures. Therefore, remediation of the proposed Brownfield Agreement Site is necessary. The proposed use of the Site after completion of all remediation will be commercial, residential, and/or a green space in nature. Staff of the MCEQ evaluated the Brownfield Agreement and believes that, with the conditions and restrictions contained within the Brownfield Agreement, the Site will be in compliance with applicable State and Federal laws and standards and will be protective of the public health and the environment. Following staff presentation and after deliberation, on motion made by Mr. Phillips and seconded by Mr. Johnson, the Commission unanimously voted to approve the Brownfield Agreement between the Commission and Military Lee, LLC regarding the remediation of brownfield property located at 1815 Military Road in Columbus, Mississippi.

#### Commission Approval of Brownfield Agreement

On behalf of staff, Mr. Thomas Wallace recommended the Commission approve the Brownfield Agreement between the Commission and the Lincoln County Board of Supervisors regarding the remediation of the former Keystone-Seneca Wire Cloth Company site located at 905 Industrial Park Road NE in Brookhaven, MS. The administrative record for this environmental response project is referred to as Keystone Seneca Wire Cloth (Agency Interest No. 10252). This proposed Brownfield Agreement Site operated as an aluminum wire and woven screen manufacturing operation and other secondary operations from 1956 to 2007. Environmental assessments detected the presence of 1,2,4-Trimethylbenzene, 1,3,5-Trimethylbenzene, and Naphthalene in groundwater in excess of Target Remediation Goals. Therefore, remediation by Monitored Natural Attenuation (MNA) of the proposed Brownfield Agreement site is necessary. The proposed use of the Site while MNA is ongoing is commercial or industrial in nature. Staff of the MCEQ evaluated the Brownfield Agreement and believes that, with the conditions and restrictions contained within the Brownfield Agreement, the Site will be in compliance with applicable State and Federal laws and standards and will be protective of the public health and the environment. Following staff presentation and after deliberation, on motion made by Ms. Martin and seconded by Mr. Phillips, the Commission unanimously voted to approve the Brownfield Agreement between the Commission and the Lincoln County Board of Supervisors regarding the remediation of the former Keystone-Seneca Wire Cloth Company site located at 905 Industrial Park Road NE in Brookhaven, MS.

#### High Cotton Oil Company, Inc.

Pursuant to Miss. Code Ann. Section 49-17-33, an evidentiary hearing was held on February 27, 2019, regarding violations of the Commission's Underground Storage Tank Regulations by High Cotton Oil Company, Inc. The hearing officer in this matter, Trey Smith, stated that this case involved a failed tank tightness test in the fall of 2017. High Cotton Oil Company, Inc., did not report this failed test to MDEQ as required and later removed the tanks without providing the required Notification of Closure to MDEQ. MDEQ staff recommended a penalty in the amount of \$53,600.00 related to the violations. After hearing the evidence and because of the difference in staff testimony regarding the penalty recommendation versus what the calculation was in writing, hearing officer Smith recommended a reduced penalty in the amount of \$50,600.00. The Commission was previously provided with the record in this matter which included the transcript of the hearing, exhibits to the transcript and the hearing officer's Findings of Fact and Recommended Decision. Following the presentation and after deliberation, on motion made by Mr. Phillips and seconded by Mr. Johnson, the Commission unanimously voted to accept hearing officer, Trey Smith's reduced penalty recommendation in the amount of \$50,600.00, relative to the violations of the Commission's Underground Storage Tank Regulations by High Cotton Oil Company, Inc.

#### Notice of Proposed Amendments to Administrative Procedures Act Rules - 11 Miss. Admin. Code Pt. 7, Ch. 1 Water Use and Protection Regulations

Mr. Chris Hawkins stated the Permitting, Certification and Compliance Division in the Office of Land and Water Resources is working on amending the Water Use and Protection Regulations to include provisions on requirements applicable to applications for wells to withdraw water from the Mississippi River Valley Alluvial (MRVA) aquifer for the beneficial uses of aquaculture, irrigation, and enhancement of wildlife habitat. All MRVA groundwater withdrawal permits, both permit renewals and new permits, are issued for 5 years, instead of 10, to facilitate timely changes in permit conditions if needed to respond to a continuing negative trend in aquifer levels. Beginning in 2011, groundwater withdrawal permits for irrigation, aquaculture, and wildlife require MRVA groundwater permittees to implement water conservation practices. To assure that permit conditions requiring implementation of water conservation and irrigation efficiency practices are met, consistent with Mississippi Code Annotated Section 51-3-25 (d), an application to obtain a permit to divert, store, or withdraw waters from the MRVA for irrigation, aquaculture, or enhancement of wildlife enhancement

needs additional requirements for accurate well location, applicant and land owner contact information, irrigated acres, beneficial uses, and acceptable agricultural water efficiency practices. The proposed amendments will be available for public comment as soon they are finalized in coordination with the Yazoo Mississippi Delta Joint Water Management District (YMD), and a public hearing will be scheduled thereafter. After the conclusion of the public hearing staff will take into consideration any comments received and then present the proposed amendments to the Commission at a future meeting with a recommendation for adoption. This briefing was for informational purposes only, requiring no action by the Commission. Ms. Martin stated she would like staff to consider further shortening the term of all MRVA groundwater withdrawal permits to help better protect the aquifer. In response, Mr. Hawkins provided comments on how changes in the regulations should help with permitting compliance. Mr. Phillips asked Mr. Hawkins to briefly touch on compliance efforts that are ongoing to assure the implementation of the conservation practices. Mr. Hawkins briefed the commission on the compliance efforts and stated that the Agreed Orders on the agenda today from the Office of Land and Water Resources are responses to non-compliance and provide compliance schedules for permittees to meet the requirements of the permit terms and conditions. Executive Director Rikard provided additional comments on the new proposed requirements and stated it is a department priority to ensure this resource is sustainable for the future. Mr. Winstead asked for more information on permit term limits at the next briefing.

#### Other Business



Setting of Meeting


