MISSISSIPPI COMMISSION ON ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY OFFICIAL MINUTES NOVEMBER 15, 2019

The regular monthly meeting of the Commission on Environmental Quality was held on Friday, November 15, 2019, in the Commission Hearing Room, 515 East Amite Street, Jackson, Mississippi, beginning at 9:00 a.m. Commissioners present were:

Commissioner Brenda Lathan was not present.

Others present were: Gary Rikard, Executive Director; James Matheny, Thomas Wallace, Kim Caviness, staff of MDEQ; and other staff members and visitors whose names appear elsewhere in these minutes.

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Winstead and after Mr. Van Devender led the invocation, the following business was transacted:

Election of Officers for Fiscal Year 2020 (July 2019 - June 2020)

On a motion made by Mr. Phillips and seconded by Mr. Van Devender, the Commission voted to elect John Dane III to serve as Chairman and Brenda Lathan to serve as Vice-Chairman of the Commission for Fiscal Year 2020. No other nominations were made.

Notice of Meeting

The Commission was informed that the legal Notice of Meeting concerning the time, date, and place of this meeting had been posted publicly as required by law and also posted on the MDEQ website. The Notice of Meeting read as follows: "Please take note that the regularly scheduled meeting of the Mississippi Commission on Environmental Quality for November, 2019, will take place on Friday, November 15, 2019, at 9:00 a.m. This meeting will be held in the Commission Hearing Room at the offices of the Mississippi Department of Environmental Quality at 515 East Amite Street, Jackson, Mississippi. As always, the public is invited to attend." This notice was posted in the lobby of the MDEQ offices in Jackson on October 17, 2019.

Approval of Minutes

On motion made by Mr. Winstead, seconded by Mr. Johnson, the minutes of the August 22, 2019, telephonic meeting were approved and adopted as the Official Minutes.

Establishment of the Lignite Mining Fee for Liberty Fuels Company, LLC for the Liberty Mine in Kemper County for State Fiscal Year 2020;

Establishment of the Lignite Fee for the Mississippi Lignite Mining Company for the Red Hills Mine in Choctaw County for State Fiscal Year 2020;

Establishment of the Lignite Fee for the Mississippi Lignite Mining Company for the Red Hills Mine Area 3 in Choctaw County for State Fiscal Year 2020

On behalf of MDEQ staff, Mr. James Matheny recommended the Liberty Fuels Company, LLC Lignite Mining Fee for the 2020 state fiscal year be set at \$125,000, which is the same as for state fiscal year 2019. Mr. Matheny also recommended that the Mississippi Lignite Mining Company Lignite Mining Fee for the 2020 state fiscal year be set at \$125,000, which is a decrease of \$50,000 from the fee for state fiscal year 2019. In addition, Mr. Matheny recommended a new Lignite Mining Fee of \$50,000 for the proposed Mississippi Lignite Mining Company, Red Hills Mine Area 3. This fee is necessary to cover the additional staff resources/costs associated with an application review related to a new surface coal mining application.

These amounts will cover approximately 50% of the anticipated costs of administering the federally-approved coal mining program in Mississippi; the remaining approximately 50% of the costs will be covered by a federal Office of Surface Mining Reclamation and Enforcement grant. These fees will cover 100% of the anticipated cost of administering the program above the amount of the federal OSMRE grant. Following staff presentation and deliberation, on motion made by Mr. Phillips and seconded by Mr. Van Devender, the Commission unanimously voted to set the Liberty Fuels Company, LLC Lignite Mining Fee for the 2020 state fiscal year at \$125,000 and set the Mississippi Lignite Mining Company Lignite Mining Fee for the 2020 state fiscal year at \$125,000. In addition, the Commission unanimously voted to approve the new Lignite Mining Fee of \$50,000 for the proposed Mississippi Lignite Mining Company, Red Hills Mine Area 3. The Commission also authorized Orders setting these fees be executed by the Executive Director.

Commission Approval of Brownfield Agreement

On behalf of staff, Mr. Thomas Wallace recommended that the Commission approve the Brownfield Agreement between the Commission and Everest, LLC regarding the remediation of brownfield property located at 800 Central Street in Water Valley, Mississippi. The administrative record for this environmental response project is referred to as the former Water Valley Manufacturing site. The proposed Brownfield Agreement Site previously operated as a textile manufacturer. Assessments detected the presence of chlorinated solvents in the groundwater beneath the site and asbestos containing material within onsite structures. Therefore, remediation of the proposed Brownfield Agreement Site is necessary. The proposed use of the Site after completion of all remediation will be a school as an expansion site for the Base Camp Coding Academy. The staff of the MCEQ evaluated the Brownfield Agreement and believes that, with the conditions and restrictions contained within the Brownfield Agreement, the Site will be in compliance with applicable State and Federal laws and standards and will be protective of the public health and the environment. Following staff presentation and deliberation, on motion made by Mr. Van Devender and seconded by Mr. Winstead, the Commission unanimously voted to approve the Brownfield Agreement between the Commission and Everest, LLC regarding the remediation of brownfield property located at 800 Central Street in Water Valley, Mississippi.

Triennial Review of Mississippi's Water Quality Standards (WQS): Revising Waterbody Classifications for Mississippi's Surface Waters

Ms. Kim Caviness provided a briefing to the Commission on Water Quality Standards (WQS) for Mississippi's Surface Waters. Designated uses are one of the three components required by the Clean Water Act to be included within the state's WQS regulations. These classifications describe the goals or expectations of a waterbody based on how that waterbody is used. Mississippi's current waterbody classifications include Fish and Wildlife Support, Recreation, Public Water Supply, Shellfish Harvesting, and Ephemeral Waters. In an effort to more accurately characterize the waterbodies within our state, three additional classifications have been developed for addition to the state's WQS as part of the current triennial review. The addition of these new classifications will allow MDEQ to more accurately categorize our state waters and set appropriate goals for restoration and/or protection of these resources. In response to a question by Mr. Phillips, Ms. Caviness explained that staff is still working on the process in which to nominate a waterbody for a certain classification or reclassification. Executive Director Gary Rikard reiterated that these new classifications would enable MDEQ to be more flexible in characterizing waterbodies of our state but that there would be no changes to the classifications in the WQS regulations without the Commission's approval. Staff is currently working to finalize language and procedures for these additional classifications. A public comment period is scheduled to begin in early or mid-January. After any public comments received have addressed (if needed), the final proposed changes to the WQS as part of the triennial review (including the new classifications) will be brought back to the Commission for their approval and adoption. This briefing was for informational purposes only, requiring no action by the Commission.

Modification of Hinds County Solid Waste Management Plan

Hearing Officer Doug Levanway reported that a Motion hearing was held on September 16, 2019, and an evidentiary hearing was held on September 19, 2019, before Hearing Officer Levanway, regarding a challenge to Commission Order No. 6772-17, which approved the modification of the Hinds County Solid Waste Management Plan to allow for the expansion of the Faircloth Class I Rubbish Site. At the evidentiary hearing, MDEQ staff recommended that Commission Order No. 6772-17 be affirmed. Pursuant to Miss. Code Ann. Section 49-17-33, Hearing Officer Levanway recommended to the

Commission that they affirm the Order approving the modification of the Hinds County Solid Waste Management Plan allowing for the expansion of the Faircloth Class I Rubbish Site by an additional 26.55 acres. The Commission was previously provided with the record for review which included the Petition for Hearing, the transcript of the Motion Hearing, the transcript of the Evidentiary Hearing, exhibits to the transcripts (including pre-filed testimony submitted by the parties-William G. (Bill) Moore-Petitioner, Hinds County Board of Supervisors-Intervenor, Faircloth Rubbish Landfill, Inc.-Intervenor and MDEQ), Motions to Intervene, Motions in Limine, Responses to Motions, witness lists, and the Hearing Officer's Findings of Fact and Recommended Decision. Following Hearing Officer Levanway's presentation and, after deliberation, on motion made by Mr. Van Devender and seconded by Mr. Johnson, the Commission unanimously voted to accept Hearing Officer Levanway's recommendation to affirm the Order approving the modification of the Hinds County Solid Waste Management Plan.
