

MISSISSIPPI COMMISSION ON ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY
OFFICIAL MINUTES
DECEMBER 12, 2022

The regular monthly meeting of the Commission on Environmental Quality for December, 2022, was held on Monday, December 12, 2022, in-person in the Commission Hearing Room at the offices of the Mississippi Department of Environmental Quality, 515 East Amite Street, Jackson, Mississippi, beginning at 9:00 a.m.

Commissioners present were: Patrick Johnson, Jr., Brenda Lathan, Billy Van Devender and Jack Winstead.

Commissioners John Dane, III, Jamie Martin and Chat Phillips were not present.

Others present were: Chris Wells, Executive Director, Thomas Wallace, Roy Furrh, staff of MDEQ; and other staff members and visitors whose names appear elsewhere in these minutes.

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Lathan and after Mr. Van Devender led the invocation, the following business was transacted:

Notice of Meeting

The Commission was informed that the legal Notice of Meeting concerning the time, date, and place of this meeting had been posted publicly as required by law. The Notice of Meeting read as follows: "Please take note that the regularly scheduled meeting of the Mississippi Commission on Environmental Quality for December, 2022, will take place on Monday, December 12, 2022, at 9:00 a.m. This meeting will be held in the Commission Hearing Room at the offices of the Mississippi Department of Environmental Quality at 515 East Amite Street, Jackson, Mississippi. As always, the public is invited to attend." This notice was posted on MDEQ's website and in the MDEQ offices in Jackson, MS on October 27, 2022.

Approval of Minutes

On motion made by Mr. Winstead and seconded by Mr. Johnson, the minutes of the October 27, 2022, meeting were approved and adopted as the Official Minutes.

Commission Approval of Brownfield Agreement

Mr. Thomas Wallace stated that the administrative record for this environmental response project is referred to as the Pascagoula Ice Plant located at the northeast corner of US Highway 90 and Pascagoula Street in Pascagoula, Mississippi. The site consists of 7.24 acres and has a long history of different commercial and industrial uses going back as far as 1909, including: a former oil house, a foundry, an auto repair shop, a filling station, and an ice manufacturer. Assessments revealed the extent of contamination in the groundwater and soil at levels in excess of the Target Remediation Goals for petroleum substances and ammonia (used for refrigerant in the ice manufacturing process). Therefore, remediation of the Brownfield Agreement Site is necessary. The proposed remedial actions consist of excavating soils containing petroleum substances and an Environmental Covenant to prevent the use of groundwater due to ammonia in the groundwater. The proposed use of the Site after completion of all remediation will be a mixed-use development including a restaurant, possible apartment complex, a bank, and other commercial businesses. The staff of the MDEQ evaluated the Brownfield Agreement and believes that, with the conditions and restrictions contained within the Brownfield Agreement, the Site will be in compliance with applicable State and Federal laws and standards and will be protective of the public health and the environment. On behalf of staff, Mr. Wallace recommended that the Commission approve the Brownfield Agreement between the Commission and In Sync Holdings, LLC regarding the remediation of the Pascagoula Ice Plant brownfield site. Following staff presentation and after deliberation, on motion made by Mr. Van Devender and seconded by Mr. Winstead, the Commission unanimously voted to approve the Brownfield Agreement between the Commission and In Sync Holdings, LLC regarding the remediation of the Pascagoula Ice Plant brownfield site.

Commission Approval of Underground Storage Tank Fee for Fiscal Year 2024

Mr. Thomas Wallace stated that the Underground Storage Tank (UST) Advisory Council and the staff of the MDEQ met on September 8, 2022, to discuss the current status of the UST program and for the UST Advisory Council to provide a recommended tank fee to the Commission for the Fiscal Year 2024. Fiscal Year 2022

expenditures and accomplishments and the expected expenditures for Fiscal Year 2023 were provided in the UST report previously provided to the Commission on the UST program. Mr. Wallace also stated that a law which was passed during the 2022 legislative session, allows MDEQ to move up to \$1 million dollars from the State Trust Fund to the UST program to cover any operational shortfalls. Executive Director Chris Wells stated the bill was supported by the Petroleum Marketers Association and it provided MDEQ with much needed program flexibility. On behalf of staff, Mr. Wallace recommended that the Commission approve the Advisory Council's recommended \$150 tank fee for fiscal year 2024, which is the same as last year's fee. Following staff presentation and after deliberation, on motion made by Mr. Johnson and seconded by Mr. Van Devender, the Commission unanimously voted to approve the Advisory Council's recommended \$150 tank fee for fiscal year 2024.

Commission Approval of Environmental Response Action Contractor (ERAC)

Mr. Thomas Wallace stated that MDEQ staff reviewed an application from a consulting firm requesting to be listed as an Environmental Response Action Contractor (ERAC) and determined it to be complete and acceptable. On behalf of staff, Mr. Wallace recommended that the Commission approve the following firm as an ERAC:

Following staff presentation and after deliberation, on motion made by Mr. Van Devender and seconded by Mr. Johnson, the Commission unanimously voted to approve Leaaf Environmental, LLC, of Gretna, LA, as an ERAC.

Asbestos Certifications

On previous authority delegated to the Head, Office of Pollution Control, the staff reported that 77 asbestos certifications had been issued since the last report.

Lead Paint Certifications

On previous authority delegated to the Head, Office of Pollution Control, the staff reported that 55 lead paint certifications had been issued since the last report.

Emergency Clean-Up Expenses

On previous authority delegated to the MDEQ Executive Director, the staff reported the Emergency Clean-Up Expenses incurred since the Commission's last meeting. A list of these expenses is made a part of

these minutes and is filed in the Official Minutes File.

Administrative Orders

On previous authority delegated to the MDEQ Executive Director, the staff reported that 13 Administrative Orders and 1 Amended Order have been issued since the Commission's meeting on October 27, 2022. A list of these orders is made a part of these minutes and is filed in the Official Minutes File.

Executive Director Chris Wells highlighted Administrative Order # 10 for the Commission and stated the pre-treatment facility involved was operating without a permit and discharging waste into the sewer system. The penalty was the result of a joint effort between the Mississippi Department of Environmental Quality and the EPA's Criminal Investigation Division and was the largest pre-treatment penalty ever received by MDEQ.

Other Business

Executive Director Chris Wells briefed the Commission on a couple of items MDEQ would like to bring before the legislature. Mr. Wells stated he would be asking the legislature for additional agency funding to cover raises that have been given to employees, which was necessary to compete with other state agencies and to retain good workers. Mr. Wells also stated that MDEQ would be proposing to have the Mississippi opal designated as the state's gemstone. The opal is the only gemstone found in Mississippi and Mississippi is one of just a couple of states that does not currently have a designated gemstone.

Approval to Enter into Executive Session

After a brief discussion lead by Executive Director Chris Wells, Mr. Winstead moved to close the meeting to discuss whether to go into executive session to discuss pending and potential litigation regarding a claim under Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 pertaining to the City of Jackson. Mr. Van Devender seconded the motion. The Commission voted unanimously to close the meeting. General Counsel Roy Furrh requested the public clear the Commission hearing room other than the Commission members, the Executive Director and MDEQ attorneys. The Commission, on motion by Mr. Winstead and second by Mr. Van Devender, voted unanimously to go into executive session to discuss the matter and Senior Attorney Donna Hodges announced the Commission's decision to the public that had left the Commission hearing room and gathered in the lobby. After discussion, Mr. Winstead moved to end executive session and return to open session and Mr. Van Devender seconded the motion. The Commission unanimously voted in favor of the motion. Ms. Hodges invited the public to return to the Commission hearing room as the Commission returned to open session. Mr. Wells announced the Commission took no action during executive session.

Setting of Meeting

The Commission decided to meet next on January 26, 2023, beginning at 9:00 a.m.


