MISSISSIPPI COMMISSION ON ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY OFFICIAL MINUTES February 23, 2023

The regular monthly meeting of the Commission on Environmental Quality was held on Thursday, February 23, 2023, in-person in the Commission Hearing Room at the offices of the Mississippi Department of Environmental Quality, 515 East Amite Street, Jackson, Mississippi, beginning at 9:00 a.m.

Commissioners present were: John Dane, III, Patrick Johnson, Jr., Brenda Lathan, Chat Phillips, Billy Van Devender and Jack Winstead.

Commissioner Jamie McRee was not present.

Others present were: Chris Wells, Executive Director, Melissa Fortenberry, Roy Furrh, staff of MDEQ; and other staff members and visitors whose names appear elsewhere in these minutes.

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Lathan and after Mr. Winstead led the invocation, the following business was transacted:

Approval of Minutes

On motion made by Mr. Phillips and seconded by Mr. Johnson, the minutes of the December 12, 2022, meeting were approved and adopted as the Official Minutes. Mr. Dane abstained from voting.

FY 2024 Title V Program Fee Recommendation

Ms. Melissa Fortenberry stated that a copy of the draft report containing the Title V Advisory Council's Title V program fee recommendation for upcoming FY 2024 had previously been forwarded to the Commission for review. On behalf of staff, Ms. Fortenberry requested Commission approval to hold a public hearing to receive comments regarding the proposed fee schedule and to proceed with public notice of the hearing. After the public participation process is completed, staff will bring the fee recommendation back before the Commission for final action. Following staff presentation and after deliberation, on motion made by Mr. Winstead and seconded by Mr. Van Devender, the Commission unanimously voted to approve holding a public hearing to receive comments regarding the proposed fee schedule and to proceed with public notice of the hearing.

Asbestos Certifications

On previous authority delegated to the Head, Office of Pollution Control, the staff reported that 193 asbestos certifications had been issued since the last report.

Lead Paint Certifications

On previous authority delegated to the Head, Office of Pollution Control, the staff reported that 91 lead paint certifications had been issued since the last report.

Underground Storage Tank (UST) Certifications

On previous authority delegated to the Head, Office of Pollution Control, the staff reported that 5 certifications to those who install, alter, or remove underground storage tanks had been issued since the last report.

Wastewater Operator Certifications

On previous authority delegated to the Head, Office of Pollution Control, the staff reported that 85 wastewater operator certificates had been issued since the last report.

Emergency Clean-Up Expenses

On previous authority delegated to the MDEQ Executive Director, the staff reported the Emergency Clean-Up Expenses incurred since the Commission's last meeting. A list of these expenses is made a part of these minutes and is filed in the Official Minutes File.

Administrative Orders

On previous authority delegated to the MDEQ Executive Director, the staff reported that 7 Administrative Orders and 1 Amended Order have been issued since the Commission's meeting on December 12, 2022. A list of these orders is made a part of these minutes and is filed in the Official Minutes File.

Other Business

Executive Director Chris Wells informed the Commission that MDEQ asked the Mississippi legislature for a \$7 million dollar increase in general funds to go toward employee salaries and to fill vacancies within the agency. There was some brief discussion between Mr. Wells and the Commission about MDEQ vacancies and the labor market. Mr. Wells also stated that both the Mississippi House of Representatives and the Mississippi State Senate drafted bills to add an additional \$40 million dollars to the Municipality County Water Infrastructure program to help fund wastewater, drinking water and storm water projects. These bills are making their way through the legislative process and have passed from both the House and Senate appropriations committees. Finally, Mr. Wells presented the Commission with some specimens of the Mississippi Opal and stated that MDEQ is spearheading an effort to have the Mississippi Opal designated as the state's official gemstone. MDEQ geologists were the first to discover the Mississippi Opal during the course of their work and bills have passed through both the House and Senate tourism committees.

Setting of Meeting

The Commission decided to meet next on March 23, 2023, beginning at 9:00 a.m.

There being no further business to come before the Commission, on motion made by Mr. Dane and seconded by Mr. Van Devender, the meeting was adjourned.
